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
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# **The Front Cover**

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#### WHAT DOES THE LEGION DO?

#### **Veterans** | **Remembrance** | **Community**

The Royal Canadian Legion (RCL) defines a Veteran as any person who is serving or who has honourably served in the Canadian Armed Forces, the Commonwealth or its wartime allies, or as a Regular Member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), or as a Peace Officer in a Special Duty Area or on a Special Duty Operation, or who has served in the Merchant Navy or Ferry Command during wartime. The RCL serves Veterans and their families by providing support, referrals, representation, advocacy and financial assistance free of charge, Legion member or not.

The RCL is made up of three essential pillars - Veterans, Remembrance & Community

**Saskatchewan Command** is the Saskatchewan division of the Royal Canadian Legion. The Saskatchewan Command head office is located in the city of Regina and works closely with its Executive Council, 165 Provincial Branches, members and communities around the Province to support Veterans, Remembrance and Community.

#### **Veterans**

Veterans are encouraged to reach out to their local Legion Branch for any kind of assistance or support that is needed. This can refer to something physical, medical, environmental, emotional, psychological and much more. Through the Branch, the Veteran will be put in contact with a Branch Service Officer. Any information shared with a Service Officer is and always will remain confidential. Veterans can also contact the Provincial Service Officers (PSO) located at the Sask Command's head office in Regina at 306-525-8739 or toll-free 1-866-471-8387. Service Officers conduct needs assessments based on each Veteran's individual situation. Next a plan is developed working with the Veteran to help him or her move forward in their life. This often



includes a community and team effort of businesses, health professionals and other service organizations. A plan could include a Service Officer helping a Veteran fill out paperwork or make a claim through Veterans Affairs Canada, connecting a Veteran to health or mental health professionals, help with moving or finding housing, financial assistance with bills or groceries. They also help to provide essential items that can improve a Veteran's quality of life such as hearing aids or a wheelchair. A Service Officer can simply be a friend to talk with.

Provincial Service Officers will liaise with Veterans Affairs Canada to assist Veterans in receiving benefits they are entitled to. Our service is free of charge and available to all Veterans whether they are a Legion member or not.

Here are the Programs that are currently available through Saskatchewan Command;

**Leave the Streets Behind** – This is the Legion's National homeless Veterans program. The program's mission is to reach out to homeless Veterans and those at-risk of homelessness and provide them with immediate financial assistance and support. It also connects them with social and community services to establish a long-term solution to meet their needs. Sask Command works closely with Veterans Affairs Canada, shelters and community organizations to get Veterans off the street and into temporary and/or long-term accommodations. Through the Poppy Fund, housing support is provided through financial assistance for items such as first and last month's rent, rental arrears and furnishings.

**Wellness Program** - This new program was designed to assist Veterans in their journey to wellness. While insurance plans and Veterans Affairs Canada can offer treatment benefits for psychiatric and physical conditions, rarely will they cover activities that are not of a medical nature such as a gym pass, yoga class or use of a sweat lodge. There is a never-ending list of wellness activities and initiatives that could be beneficial to someone based on their needs. The assistance provided in this program helps the Veteran by reducing their symptoms. Taking better care of wellness can help to result in reducing symptoms such as stress, anxiety, depression and PTSD.

**PAWS** for Veterans – PAWS for Veterans serves two main purposes; to raise funds to provide Service Dogs to Saskatchewan Veterans and raising public awareness and education about Service Dogs. Through this program the Legion sponsors trained service dogs and assists to pair them with qualifying Veterans and their families. As the use of service dogs expands into many medical areas, there is a growing need for the general public to understand the role of these highly specialized dogs with their handlers. Some types of specialized training can include; PTSD, seizure, mobility assistance, diabetic alert, hearing assistance, heart attack & stroke and much more.

**Mental Health First Aid Veteran Community** – This thirteen-hour Course focuses on the basics but is also tailored to the needs of Veterans and the people who care for, and about them. The program is designed to help members of the Veteran Community developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis. It does not train people to become counsellors or therapists and just like with physical first aid, we need to ensure that those most in contact with members of the Veteran Community can identify an emerging mental health problem and respond effectively in the event of a crisis. Who should become certified in this course? Veterans, family members, relatives, friends, volunteers and other caring community members, former RCMP members, health professionals and providers of Veteran services

**OSI-CAN** – OSI-CAN is an Operational Stress Injury/Post-Traumatic Stress Support Initiative. Created in January 2016, as a partnership between the RCL Sask Command and the Canadian Mental Health Association Sask Division. This network of service supports includes such things as; referrals into Centres of Excellence, professional counseling, lifeskills training, addictions programs, equine-assisted therapy, service dogs, PTSD Coach Canada Mobile App, psychosocial rehabilitation, vocational training, pharmacist assistance, recreation programs, housing supports, family preservation services, veterinary support for service dogs, supportive websites such as Mood Disorders Canada, PTSD support, phone in support and much more. The network of supports continues to grow as individual needs are identified.

**Poppy Campaign** – Every year, from the *last Friday of October to November 11* <sup>th</sup> tens of millions of Canadians wear a Poppy as a visual pledge to honour Canada's Veterans and remember those who have sacrificed for the freedoms we enjoy today. While the Poppy is distributed freely to all who wish to wear one, the Legion gratefully accepts donations to the Poppy Fund. The Poppy Campaign is very much a local initiative, conducted by Legion Branches in cities, towns and communities across the country. Donations collected during the Poppy Campaign are held in Trust at the Branch level to directly support Veterans and their families within their community and to help ensure Canadians *'never forget'*. The RCL, since its inception in 1926, has become known for its annual organization of the November 11<sup>th</sup> Remembrance Day Services and Events. The



**Poster & Literary Contest** – For over 50 years, the RCL has sponsored annual Poster & Literary Contests that are open to all students in the Canadian School System. The students who participate in these contests continue to promote the tradition of Remembrance amongst Canadians. Contests start at the Branch level in October, with winning submissions moving up the Legion ladder. Eventually fourteen entries from Saskatchewan Students are submitted to The Legion Foundation in Ottawa for judging. The names and entries of the National winners are published in a booklet sent out by Dominion Command. First Place Winners are displayed in the Canadian War Museum from July 1<sup>st</sup> until May 1<sup>st</sup> of the following year. Second Place Winners and any honourable mentions are displayed in the foyer of the House of Commons during the annual Remembrance Day period. The Legion also sponsors a trip to Ottawa for the Senior Winners to attend the National Remembrance Day Service where they can place a wreath on behalf of the youth of Canada. During this time, students are given the opportunity to meet and visit with the Governor General.

**Teaching Guide** –The RCL has created the Teaching Guide to assist Primary and Secondary Schools with teaching students about the tradition of Remembrance and our Military History. The Guide is there to help Canada's Educators develop an understanding and appreciation for Remembrance Day and encourage youth to participate. The Guide includes concise notes on Canadian Military History, notes on the RCL, important Canadian symbols, stories, songs and poems containing a Remembrance theme, information about the Poppy Campaign and how the money donated is used, National Poster and Literary Contest information, as well as suggested School Remembrance activities.

**R.E.D. Shirt Friday** – Join us every Friday as we show support for our troops by wearing RED. T-Shirts and Hoodies are available to purchase through your local Branch or at the Saskatchewan Command head office. Sizes Small to 5X-Large are available.


The Military Service Recognition Book - All Veterans, families and branches are encouraged to submit pictures and short stories for inclusion in one of these commemorative books, free of charge. Please consider completing a form on your loved one and send it to our head office along with a picture of the person to be included. A Provincial telephone appeal also takes place on a yearly basis to request support for this project. Businesses will be asked to purchase advertising space and private citizens will be contacted as well to request support for this important initiative of the Sask Command. Proceeds raised will be used by the Legion to improve services to Veterans and the more than 200 communities that they serve throughout the Province.

**Last Post** – Legion Magazine publishes the Last Post annually during the Remembrance Day period. This free service recognizes those who have served their Country and allows readers to learn of the passing of Comrades with whom they served. Last Post is reserved for Ordinary Members of the RCL at the time of death, RCL Life Members who were previously Ordinary Members and Canadian War Veterans who were not Legion Members at the time of their death. The RCL relies on Branches to provide the Last Post information. Entries are also added to the searchable Last Post database at <a href="https://www.legionmagazine.com">www.legionmagazine.com</a>.

**Thomega Entertainment Presents: Canada Remembers** – Thomega's Premier Documentary (one of seven war related) produced since 2000, *Canada Remembers: A Veterans Reunion* aired nationally on various productions. This project has earned recognition nation-wide for its in-depth and sensitive approach to our Canadian War Veterans. The program was endorsed by the Deputy Prime Minister Herb Gray with a special public presentation made to the producers. The program is now a key curriculum tool in Schools across the Country. During 2002-2005, Thomega Produced a thirteen-part Television Series (49 shows total), titled *Entertainment West*.

Branches also continuously promote Remembrance by maintaining the many Cenotaphs, Monuments and Graves of Veterans throughout the Province.

#### **Community**

**Track and Field Camp –** This five-day Summer Camp welcomes up to 200 High School aged Athletes from across the Province. Qualifying athletes can then go on to compete at our National Camp hosted by Dominion Command. Our Track and Field Camp begins with introduction sessions, followed by training in two specialty areas before the camp starts. The camp includes daily team building sessions, group warm-ups, group cool-downs and various classes. The camp fee includes accommodations, as well as meals and a banquet on the last night. Legion Opening and Closing Ceremonies are held on the first and last morning of the event. Athletes also have a chance of having their camp fee sponsored through a local Legion Branch.



**Scholarships and Bursaries** – Branches have the option to offer their own Scholarships and Bursaries. Saskatchewan Command offers the *Jack Moore Scholarship* and *Burgess Bursary* to qualifying Students entering their first year of Post-Secondary Education. Applying students must be a child, grandchild or great grandchild of a Veteran. These Scholarships and Bursaries can help students further their educational goals.

**Branch Sports** - Branches may offer Sports such as; Bowling, Cribbage, Curling, Darts, 8-ball Pool and Golf. Through Provincial Command, Branches can apply to host Zone, District and Provincial level sporting events. It is a great opportunity for members to stay active, compete and socialize.

Our Branches continue to support their local communities by volunteering, donating funds, hosting various events and many other diverse activities. Legions throughout the Province with a building continue to rent or lend out space to local groups/activities.





ways of the world outside the reserve. This shift in perspective has forever changed the way we see ourselves as a community.

In the second half of the 20th century, two agreements—Asimakaniseekan Askiy in 1988 and the Treaty Land Entitlement (TLE) Trust in 1992—led to the growth of Muskeg Lake. These agreements generated a need for the community to reach outward to surrounding governments and municipalities and bring us into a process of community consultation, something which had never before happened. The TLE Trust led to the acquisition of urban and agricultural lands, which fostered economic development for the community through land leasing and entrepreneurial growth.

The Table of a Fallen Soldier is set in the hall or dining room, where guests can see it, but where it will not be in the way.

# The table is smaller than the others

symbolizing the everlasting concern and remembrance for our fallen comrades.

# The white tablecloth

draped evenly represents the purity of their motives while answering the call of duty.

# The empty chair

representing the missing comrade.

# The single place setting

represents your wish that the fallen men and women of the armed forces could be present at the happy occasion with you.

# The white candle

representing the light of hope/light of life.

# The single red rose

represents the blood shed/the families who love and keep faith with the men and women who serve.

### The ribbou

represents loyally in waiting for those who are serving away from home, while a red ribbon symbolizes the memory of and search for those missing in action.

## The slices of lemon

on the bread plate represent the bitter loss of the life of the fallen soldier.

## The salt upon the bread plate represents the tears of their families.

# The inverted wine glass

placed to the right of the plate, represents the fact that the fallen comrade will not be able to participate in the happy toasts at this event.





Great God of battle steel their heart, Who serve by land, and air and sea; With honour let them play their part, With duty let their service be, Gainst cruelty and wrong we fight, O God arise put forth Thy Might. O god of pity be Thou nigh, Where lurks the sunk death-dealing mine, Where blazing roof-trees flush the sky, In recking trench and shattered line , For Motherhood and King we fight, O God arise maintain the right. C God of mercy be our shield And hear our dear ones far away; For them we stand on blood stained field, For us they wait at home and pray, To Thee we turn, to Thee we cry, C God lead on to Victory. Amen.

This poem was first recited at a Service, 13 May 1917, only three weeks after Vimy Ridge: 10th Battalion, First Canadian Division. This hymn was found in the personal possessions of Brigadier-General Danial Mowat Ormond. At this time he was still a Lieutenant-Colonel, 10 Battalion, CEF.

A museum quality replica was donated to Saskatchewan Command by Dr. Paul Kavanagh in an effort to provide the best opportunity for everyone to view it. The original copy of the hymn is held at the Canadian War Museum.



# Davidson Branch 51 Erects New Monument

Approximately twelve years ago, the Davidson Branch No. 051 decided to sell their Legion Branch, but all the photos, plaques, etc. were put into a Legion Museum. Davidson Branch got into a room in their local town library where they now have their meetings. It was decided that the remainder of the money from the sale of the building belonged to the men and women that had served the Branch over the years. 
#### **ADAIR, William Rosce**


**WWII**

He joined the Army in 1940 and trained in Regina, SK, and Guelph, ON. He spent two years overseas, where he got hurt and was sent home, and was discharged in 1944. He bought two quarters of land through the Veterans Land and farmed until 1956, when he moved to Prince Albert, SK. He passed away in Saskatoon on November 1, 1986 and is buried in the Legion Plot of the Canwood North Cemetery. He belonged to the Canwood Legion for fifteen years.

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### **AGNEW, Charles Roy**

Charles was born in 1917 in the Coolidge District of Saskatchewan, where he went to school. He joined the Army in 1940 and served first in Canada and then in the Artillery in England, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was injured in Germany and returned to Canada on a hospital ship. He was hospitalized and then went back to Birch Hills to live with his parents and farm. Charles passed away in 1990.

### **ALEXANDER, David James Heslop**

WWII

David was born in Wheatstone, Saskatchewan, on April 15, 1922. He joined the NRMA, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion Rocky Mountain Rangers, North Nova Scotia Highlanders on January 8, 1943 serving in Canada, Kiska, Britain and Northern Continental Europe. He was wounded at the Falaise Gap on September 17, 1944. While recuperating, he wrote a poem "The Fighting North Novas." He married in Scotland and was discharged on March 22, 1946, returning to Canada to farm. David and his sons received the Saskatchewan Angus Gold Show Commercial Producer Award in 1996. He passed away on March 8, 2001.



**ALLAN, Lessel** 

WWI

Lessel was born in Lumsden, Scotland, in 1890. He enlisted in 1916 with the 116<sup>th</sup> Saskatchewan Battalion and transferred to the 58<sup>th</sup> Battalion, serving in England and France. He married Isabella Mutch in Scotland in 1916. He was wounded at Arras, France, in August 1918 and spent four years in hospital in England, Winnipeg and Moose Jaw. After the war, he farmed in the Florentine district in Saskatchewan, and raised three boys and three girls. Lessel belonged to the Tisdale Legion Branch 50 for many years. He passed away at Sherbrooke Nursing Home in Saskatoon in 1981 at the age of 91.



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### ANDERSON, Johann Peter

WWI

Johann was born in Logberg, Saskatchewan, in 1894. He enlisted in the Army and served with the Canadian Machine Gun Corps in Canada, England, France and Belgium during World War I. He was wounded at Passchendaele Ridge and suffered a mustard gas attack. He was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal. Johann returned to the family farm but due to damaged lungs could not work in dust. He became a Postmaster in MacNutt, SK, for sixteen years. Johann passed away in 1946.

### **ANDERSON, Wayne Morris**

### **PEACETIME**

Wayne was born on October 1, 1943 in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, to George and Olive Anderson. He enlisted in the Army in 1959 and was stationed at Camp Gagetown, New Brunswick, for three years, where he trained as a cook. Upon discharge, Wayne became a cook at the Saskatchewan Hospital, and then worked in several maintenance departments throughout the North Battleford Health Region. 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












### **ANTONIO, Johnny**

He joined the Canadian Army in December of 1915, training as a signaller with the 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion, serving until 1919 in England, France, Belgium and Germany. He was discharged in 1919 and then farmed from 1919 to 1929 in Tilney, SK, and from 1930 to 1967 in Rouleau-Weilcox, SK. He was a Legion member from 1925 to 1991 with the Rouleau Branch 44. William passed away in April 1992.

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### **ARKSEY, Stanley Herbert**

Stanley was born in 1922 in Rocanville, Saskatchewan, and enlisted with the Canadian Army (Active) serving in Canada, Britain and Northwest Europe. He received the 1939-1945 Star, the France and Germany Star, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and the War Medal 1939-1945. Stanley passed away in 2003.

### ARNOLD, George

**WWII** 

George was born in Stalwart, Saskatchewan, in 1924. He enlisted in the Air Force in 1942. He did basic training in Toronto and was posted to Winnipeg, Davidson and Yorkton. He worked in the fire department and crash truck. George was discharged in 1946 at Portage la Prairie. He worked in Portage and Stalwart as Coalmine-Crowsnest Pass Mechanic before retiring in 1964. He spent three years in Imperial, farmed, was an Elevator Agent, sold insurance with Saskatchewan Government Insurance and was a Fleet Supervisor with Yorkdale School Unit. George was Past President of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 77 and is a Life Member.



### ARNOLD, William Bradley

William was born in Kelleher, Saskatchewan, on May 26, 1925. He enlisted in the Canadian Army on December 6, 1943 and served at Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, until his discharge on September 7, 1945. Roy was born in Grey County, Ontario, on October 19, 1893. The family moved to Michigan, USA, in 1898, then to Ceylon, SK, in 1906. In 1915, he joined the 49<sup>th</sup> Battalion CEF in Edmonton and served in England and France. On February 22, 1919, he was discharged and went on to farm in Ceylon. He then took his family to Michigan, where he worked in the auto industry. Roy passed away on April 15, 1961.

### **BAGAMERY, Casper Timothy Scott**

### **PEACETIME**

Casper served with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry from October 1995 to 1997. He then served with the 691 Hawk Squadron RC (Air)C from October 2001 to 2007. In 2007, he transferred to Rank Force. From July 2008 to 2013, he served at 15 Wing in Moose Jaw, SK, and from July 2013 to 2016 in recruiting in Regina, SK. Since March 2016 to the present, Corporal Casper Bagamery is attached to 1 Canadian Air Division CFB Winnipeg, Manitoba. In July 2012, he went to RIMPAC in Hawaii. From June 14 to July 17, 2018, he served on Public Duties with the Queen's Guard in London, England.

His job as a Radar Mechanic was to build and modify radar stations in India, Burma, Ceylon, and England during World War II. At the age of 98, he wrote a book called The Road Burma in which he describes his years during the war and subsequent life as the City Engineer for the City of Regina. He received the following medals: 1939-1945 Star, Burma Star, Defence of Great Britain, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, Medal for Service - countries of India, Ceylon, Great Britain, and a Citation from the British Air Ministry for good work during the Battle of Britain. He served for four years and 254 days in the Air Force with the rank of Sergeant. Robert passed away in 2017. He was a Life Member of The Royal Canadian Legion Silton Branch 33.



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


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### BANKS, Verne

WWII

Verne was born in Brancepeth, Saskatchewan in 1922 and enlisted with the Royal Canadian Air Force Ghost Squadron. He earned a commission in the RCAF with the rank of Flying Officer. He had been on 118 sea-mining and night bombing missions over the North Sea and Germany. On the night of April 13, 1945, his aircraft was hit by German anti-aircraft fire. F/S Vardy, Mid-Upper Gunner from Bancroft, Ontario, had not been seen since he walked to the hatch. A German Red Cross boat came after eleven days and fifteen hours afloat, and the RCAF crew found themselves as Prisoners of War in a German hospital. Verne passed away in 1968.


### BARKER, Cort Curtis SPECIAL DUTY AREA & PEACETIME

Cort was born in Estevan, Saskatchewan, in 1979. He enlisted in the Army with the Lord Strathcona's Horse Regiment. Cort was trained specifically for the Coyote Reconnaissance Vehicle and served in Bosnia in 2000 and 2003, and as a Medic in Afghanistan in 2006. Upon coming home, he and his wife Staci had three children and he started his own airfield business. Cort is a five-year member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 60.



#### **BAYNTON, Marcel**

Marcel was born on January 8, 1956 in Rosthern, Saskatchewan. He joined the Navy on December 8, 1973 and served with the Maritime Command. He was stationed at the following Canadian Forces Bases: Cornwallis, Nova Scotia; Borden, Ontario; and Strathcona Nova Scotia. He also served on HMCS Ottawa and HMCS/M Okanagan. Marcel received an Honourable Discharge on May 15, 1977.







### David Beattie and Elsie Fish A Canadian Veteran and His War Bride



David and Elsie Beattie on August 26, 1944

David Beattie was born on June 14, 1919 on the family farm, four miles south of Anerley, Saskatchewan. His parents were Robert and Margaret Beattie. David had seven siblings: Walter, Robert, John, Andrew, Joe, Madge and Betty. After leaving school, David worked on the family farm and other local farms. He enlisted in the RCAF in 1939, and after one month of training at Camp Dundurn was sent to Patricia Bay. Before he was sent overseas, he was granted leave to help with the harvest. His troop arrived in England on Christmas Day, 1941, where they were fed tripe for dinner. He was stationed at an RAF heavy bomber base in Yorkshire called Topcliffe. The RCAF played a key role on the base until the final mission on April 25, 1945.

Elsie Fish was born on September 20, 1921. Her parents were Jack and Margaret Fish. She joined the Women's Auxiliary Air Force and worked in the ammunitions area, loading belts with bullets. Elsie was described as "an attractive spunky English gal from Tottington."

Elsie and David Beattie met at the base and hit it off from the start, going on bike rides and to base dances. They were married on August 26, 1944 in Tottington and enjoyed a brief honeymoon at Loch Lomond.

When David returned to Canada, he worked at the War Records Office in Winnipeg until Elsie was able to join him in February 1945. A typical war bride, Elsie travelled by ship to Canada to meet David in Winnipeg. From there, they travelled by train to Anerley in February 1945, where they farmed on Nithsdale farm near Dinsmore, and raised their three daughters: Josephine, Marlene and Judy.

In his sixties, David took up water and downhill skiing. He and Elsie retired to Outlook where he died on January 1, 2011 at the age of 91. David was a long-time member of The Royal Canadian Legion.

Elsie passed away on March 28, 2013, also at the age of 91, and is buried in Hillcrest Cemetery southeast of Dinsmore.



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### **BECKWALL**, August Leroy

Leroy was born on August 23, 1922 to John and Hilda Beckwall. He was the nephew of August Alfred Beckwall who died on November 3, 1918 while serving with the Canadian Infantry (Saskatchewan Regiment). The Beckwalls farmed northwest of Radville until 1931 when Hilda moved to Radville. She was an efficient and esteemed midwife who assisted with the births of 208 babies, in many cases without a doctor being present. She saw both of her sons, Leroy and Walter, enlist with the RCAF.Not much is known about Leroy, but Mr. McKay, the high school principal, wrote a stellar letter of recommendation for this young man, indicating Leroy had been Troop Leader for the Radville Boy Scouts. He was also King's Scout with a considerable number of proficiency badges. Mr. McKay also mentioned that Leroy was a good athlete. On December 5, 1942, Leroy was with Ferry Command in Dorval, Quebec, and was killed when his Hudson aircraft stalled and crashed on landing in Houlton, Maine. He was ferrying planes from Maine, USA, to England. Sergeant Beckwall was twenty years old. He was buried at Radville Laurier Cemetery. Walter survived the war.

### **BEDWELL, Charles Douglas**

Charles was born in Marchwell, Saskatchewan, on July 31, 1917. He enlisted in the Canadian Artillery in Yorkton on September 7, 1939 and went overseas in 1940. In 1942, after D-Day, Charles married Mary Bradley from Dartford, Kent, England. He was trained as an artillery soldier and qualified as a driver of wheeled vehicles and as a first-class truck mechanic on all types of army trucks. Charles attained the rank of Sergeant with a total service of 72 months, with 61 months overseas in the UK, Sicily, Italy, Holland and Germany. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, 1939-1945 Star, Italy Star, France and Germany Star and the Defence Medal. In September 1945, Charles was discharged from the army. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Oyen Branch 208. Charles passed away in 2001.





### **BENNETT, John Irwin "Jack"**

**WWII** 

Jack was born on April 10, 1922 in Carlyle, Saskatchewan. In January 1942, he went to Regina and volunteered for active service. He was sent to Ottawa for basic training and then to Shilo, Manitoba, for advanced training. He went overseas in June 1943. Early in 1944, he was sent to the Mediterranean and joined the 1st Canadian Armoured Brigade, a division of the English Eighth Army. This was just prior to the fall of Mount Casio. In February 1945, Jack moved to the Western Front, driving through France, Belgium and into Holland by VE Day. He returned to Canada in August 1945 and was discharged that October. Jack passed away on July 6, 2000.









### **BERGER, Charles Richard**

WWII


Charles was born in Langenburg, Saskatchewan, in 1915. He enlisted on May 14, 1942 with the Royal Canadian Navy as an electrical artificer. In 1944, he married Barbara, who he met in British Columbia. Charles was assigned to HMCS Cheboque and sent on convoy duty between St. John's, Newfoundland, and Londonberry, Ireland. On October 4, they were torpedoed in the Atlantic. Charles retired in 1980 and was a founding member of the Langenburg Branch of The Royal Canadian Legion and honoured as a 50-year member in 1996. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, the 1939-1945 Bronze Star and the War Medal 1939-1945. Charles passed away on March 30, 1998 in Langenburg.

### BERGER, Edward J. "Ed"

WWII

Edward was born in Langenburg, Saskatchewan, in 1904. He joined the RCOC 1<sup>st</sup> Division RCEME in January 1940 and went overseas with the 1<sup>st</sup> contingent. He spent nearly five years in England as a Staff Sergeant with the RCEME and was involved in providing emergency lighting units during blackouts in England. Ed was due to be repatriated in a few months when he was killed in 1944. He is buried in Brookside Cemetery in England. He has a geomemorial called Berger Lake in northern Saskatchewan. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp and the War Medal 1939-1945.





#### BERGER, Rene Joseph

WWII

Rene was born on February 17, 1920 on the family farm at Fife Lake, Saskatchewan. He joined the Army in 1941 and trained in Regina, Saskatchewan. After basic training he was on leave for family obligations. Both his parents had died and he became the sole provider for his siblings. He was discharged for this reason in 1945. Rene took up farming full time in Fife Lake. He was married to Hazel DeClair and they had three children. He was a tenyear member of The Royal Canadian Legion Willow Bunch Branch and Assiniboia Branch. Rene passed away in 1999.



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### **BESSEL**, Leo Norman

WWII

Leo was born in Langenburg, Saskatchewan, on March 10, 1922. He enlisted on September 9, 1942, with the 10<sup>th</sup> A. A. (General) and was released on April 4, 1943. After the war, Norman returned to Langenburg and farmed his father's homestead until 1978. He married Leah in 1944 and they had one son. They retired to Langenburg, where he built a new home in 1978. Leo passed away in 2006.

### **BETSKAL**, Michael

WWII

Michael was born in Hafford, Saskatchewan, on November 11, 1918. He enlisted with the Canadian Army on July 24, 1941, and was discharged on March 9, 1946, after serving in Canada and the UK. He received the 1939-1945 Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star, the Defence Medal, and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp. He farmed in the Hafford area and was a member of the Knights of Columbus. Michael passed away on May 25, 1991.





**BINKLEY, Doug** 

WWII

Doug was born in April 1923. After graduating in 1941, he joined the Air Force. He received his wings in 1942 and was posted overseas and flew with #6 RCAF Bomber Command until near the end of the war. He went back to Canada and graduated from the College of Pharmacy in 1950. The horrors of the war were with him his entire life. Doug passed away on March 9, 2009.

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### BIRD, Benjamin Harold

WWII

Benjamin was born in Tiger Hills, Saskatchewan, in 1912. He joined the South Saskatchewan Regiment and was killed in action at Nieuwpoort on September 11, 1944. He is buried at Adegen Canadian War Cemetery in Belgium. His father and mother, John Edward and Mary Katherine (Halcro) Bird, moved from Poplar Point, first to the Halcro District and then to homestead S.W. 36-45-25-W.2. They were first living in a tent while their house was being built. Ben was one of twelve children and attended Harmony School.

### **BIRD, Chester Alvin**

Chester was born on May 19, 1919, the eldest son of nine children born to Colin and Caroline Bird of the Tiger Hill District in Saskatchewan. He attended Tiger Hill School and worked for various farmers and relatives, as well as learning to play the violin, guitar, banjo, piano and the organ. He married Marjorie Dubray in 1941 and soon after, he enlisted in the Army with the Royal Canadian Engineer Corps. He trained at Dundurn, SK, Kitchener and Petawawa, ON, then back to Regina where he worked in an office. Chester received his Honourable Discharge in 1945. Marjorie and Chester had nine children. He worked at Churchill for the National Harbor Board in the summers, loading ocean freighters with grain. Chester passed away in 1964 and is buried in St. Saviours Cemetery, southwest of Birch Hills.





BIRD, Kenneth


WWII

Kenneth was born in March 1923 in Kyle, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Canadian Army in 1943 and stationed in England and then to Germany as a truck driver transporting troops to Holland and Belgium. He passed away in April 2003.

WWII



The unit followed the convoys for protection, flew floatplanes (Stranraer) which had three Gunners and carried bombs and delivered floatplanes from the East Coast to Vancouver Island. Russell was discharged in August 1945. He farmed, was a Contract Manager with Matheson Brothers Construction for Yorkton Regional High School, Composite High School, Columbia, Ukrainian Orthodox Church and Infrastructure in Churchill, Manitoba. Russell married Sylvia Bartley in 1943 and they had four boys. He rebuilt a Cornell Training Plane and flew it to Moose Jaw in 1991. ### **BODNARYK**, Fred

Fred was born in 1921 in the Hampton District of Saskatchewan. He enlisted in the Army in 1943 and took his basic and advanced training in Victoria and Vancouver, BC, where he worked Guard Duty at the Lions Gate Bridge, ammo dump. He then worked with the B-4 Army at the Claybank Dominion Fire Brick and Clay Company for 36 cents/hour. He was drafted overseas but was not called. He then worked at the ammo factory in Hamilton, Ontario, until his discharge in 1943. He returned to farming in the Hamton, Saskatchewan district which he worked at until his retirement. Fred married Elsie Mozilisky and had a son and daughter. He had been an active member of the communities where he lived, serving on the Municipal Council and after moving to Yorkton, had volunteered with the Heart and Stroke, Cancer and Sunrise Health. He raised the most money in Canada for the Alzheimer's Society. He was a 45-year member of The Royal Canadian Legion Alexander Ross Branch 77 in Yorkton. Fred passed away in 2017.





### BRADSHAW, James Douglas Haig "Jim"

Jim was born in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, on January 16, 1917 and grew up in the Milden-Rosetown area. He joined the Army Medical Corp and served in Canada and England during World War II. Upon his discharge, he took up pharmacy at the University of Saskatchewan. In 1948, he moved to Herbert, SK, and spent 21 years in a drug store there. He and his wife, Toni, had three children. He retired to Saskatoon and finally Elbow, SK. Jim passed away in 1994.

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
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#### **BREADNER**, Harold

Harold was born on July 8, 1934 on the family farm near Armley, SK, and was able to see many parts of Canada and Europe. His service with the Canadian Armed Forces as an air frame mechanic took him from Saskatoon, SK, to Prince Edward Island, Germany and Moose Jaw, SK, where he came to retire. He was proud of his career and his most discussed highlight was that of being Ground Crew Chief for the Snowbirds aerobatic team. Beyond his service to Canada, Harold worked with Eaton's and Mayfair United Church. Harold and his wife, Berta, enjoyed 63 years of marriage before he passed away on May 29, 2019.

#### **BROWN**, Eric Harry

WWII

Eric was born in North Battleford, Saskatchewan in 1922. He enlisted in the Army and served during World War II as a Private in Canada, England and France. According to a telegram, he was missing in action. Next, word came by letter about the day he was captured. Panther tanks came over a hill and mowed the soldiers down like wheat. He and another comrade stopped to assist a soldier shot in the leg and could not run. All three were captured, had injuries and were sent to a hospital in Paris. The nuns in the hospital did the best they could with the few supplies they had. They warned the men when the Germans were coming for an inspection. If you were well enough you were sent to a concentration camp. Eric was told by the doctor he could not live on the prairie with the cold winters, as he had little feeling in his arm wound and it would quickly freeze. His father sold the farm and the family moved to Kelowna, BC. After service, Eric worked in an orchard which greatly improved the strength in his arm to a point where he received very little pension and was able to make his own living without it. Eric then took up a fourteen-acre parcel of land through the Veterans' Land Act and had an orchard of his own. He passed away in June 2017 at the age of 95.





#### **BROWN, Gordon Charles**

WWI

Gordon was born on April 23, 1899 in St Croix Falls, Wisconsin, USA. He moved to Canada at age two. Gordon enlisted with the original 229<sup>th</sup> South Saskatchewan Regiment on March 17, 1916. He was transferred to the Field Unit overseas and served as a Private with the 46<sup>th</sup> Canadian Infantry Battalion before being discharged on January 7, 1919. Gordon was a Life Member of The Royal Canadian Legion for over sixty years, and once held the position of President. He passed away on April 20, 1992.









#### **BRUCE**, Rupert Milton

WWII

Rupert was born in the Sturgeon Valley District in Saskatchewan on November 3, 1918 and attended Brant School. After that, he worked as a farm hand until he joined the Army on March 16, 1940, taking his basic training in Canada then going overseas to England, Sicily, Italy, France and Holland. He received the Italy Star, France and Germany, Holland Medal, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and two Defence Medals. He returned home five years to the day that he left for overseas and was discharged on July 19, 1946. Rupert married Mary Ernst of Sturgeon Valley on June 16, 1950 and they raised a family of eight children. He received the half section of land in the Deer Ridge District for farming. He passed away at his home from a heart attack on September 5, 1989.

#### **BULMER, Peter Emery**

#### **WWII & KOREAN WAR**

Peter was born in Outlook, Saskatchewan, on April 22, 1924 to John and Gertrude Bulmer. He grew up in Outlook, where he participated in the local Scout Troop. Peter left Outlook at age 17 to join the Royal Canadian Navy where he saw action on various vessels as an Able Seaman during World War II. He also served three tours on HMCS Sioux in Korean waters between 1951-1953. He had served at CFB Esquimalt for thirteen years when he was tragically killed in an automobile accident on May 13, 1954. Peter and his wife, Edith May, had five children: Fred, Donald, Margaret, Joan and Judy.



#### **BURANT, Andrew August**

Andrew was born in Othon, Saskatchewan, on December 24, 1938, the youngest of ten children. The family moved to Yorkton, SK, when he was four years old. He went to Simpson School from grade one through grade eight, then attended Yorkton Collegiate Institute. He played basketball and was a member of the Air Cadets and belonged to the 53<sup>rd</sup> Field Regiment Reserve Army until 1961. He worked for Eaton's in Yorkton for three years. 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#### **BURGE, James Winthrop "Jim"**


WWI






#### CARSON, Carl Evans

Max was born in Marsden, Saskatchewan, in 1908, the son of Howard Harry Cayford and Alice Carrie Cayford of Neilburg. Lance Corporal Max Cayford of the Royal Canadian Engineers was killed in action in Belgium on September 14, 1944. While repairing a bridge, which had been damaged by the enemy, he was hit by a sniper and died. This was at the start of the liberation of Belgium and the Netherlands and the advance into Germany in September 1944 to May 1945. Max is buried at Adegem Canadian War Cemetery in East Flanders, Belgium.

#### CHANT, Roderick "Rod"

WWII

Rod was born on July 19, 1921 to Dr. and Mrs. R. H. Chant in Foam Lake, Saskatchewan. He served during World War II. Retired since 1985, Rod had time to enjoy some travel, curling, golfing and volunteering. Rod passed away on November 12, 2010 at age 89.



#### CHAPMAN, George F.

WWII

George was born on November 30, 1923 in Estevan, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the RCAF in December 1942 and was posted to No. 1 Manning Depot in Toronto in 1943. This is where he completed a course in Radio Telephone Operation at No. 1 Wireless School in Montreal. He attained the rank of Leading Aircraftsman. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and the War Medal 1939-1945 for his service. He was very active in The Royal Canadian Legion, first at Estevan Branch 60, and later at Branch 306 where he served as President, Secretary and Deputy Zone Commander. George passed away in December 1985.

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## **CHAPMAN, Robert Henry**



My wonderful father, Robert Henry Chapman, was born in Osmotherley, England, on March 15, 1914. His mother's name was Emma and his father's was George Chapman. Emma and George already had a four-year-old girl named Elizabeth. They went on to have two more babies. George Jr. was born in 1916. When Emma was pregnant with her fourth child, World War I broke out. Emma gave birth to a baby girl, Nora, while her husband was fighting for their peace and liberty. He never did get to see his new daughter. Sadly, he was killed while marching with his troop along a gravel road in France. He stepped on a land mine that was hidden by the enemy under the gravel on the road. Emma was left to raise her four children alone. She taught them at a very young age why their father risked and gave his life for them – for England.

When Robert was fourteen years old, two Canadian men came to his school in Northumberland, England, to promote farming opportunities in Saskatchewan. The speakers described it as a beautiful country with majestic Rocky Mountains and miles and miles of prairie lands ready to be farmed, they were told that they could get land if they were willing to go to Canada and work the land. Robert and two buddies boarded a ship bound for Canada as soon as they turned fifteen. The boys arrived in Halifax, at Pier 21, from there they boarded a bus. It stopped at Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. The year was 1929, when the boys were told they


had arrived, they looked about and saw dirt blowing so thick they couldn't see in front of them. Where were the golden prairies they were told about? The Dirty Thirties were blowing their way in. Robert's two buddies felt deceived and were returning home. Fortunately, Bob had an uncle, Walter Coates, who took him to Macrorie, Saskatchewan, to help on the farm, where he worked for about ten years. His plan was to work on his uncle's farm and eventually get a piece of land of his own.

Then, World War II broke out. Robert, like his father, felt it was his duty to defend his country's peace. He went to Saskatoon and signed up as a soldier to train at the Dundurn Military Camp. He soon became a machine gun instructor and a Sergeant. Robert Henry Chapman signed up with the Saskatoon Light Infantry. He packed a wee bible into his army uniform and carried it all through the war. Robert prayed for, and with, individual men in his troop. He also carried a harmonica. He led the soldiers in hymns when they needed comfort and strength. He played fun songs when they needed to relax and laugh.

While on the Island of Sicily, his battalion received orders to march into Italy northward. Italy's leader, Mussolini, needed the help of the Canadians and Americans who were nearby. Mussolini had been fighting off the Nazi soldiers for months. The plan was that the Canadian soldiers would camp in the valley just south and below an old castle on a mountain nearby. Sadly, the Italian leader, Mussolini had just surrendered to the German Nazis. The Canadian soldiers didn't know it, but the German enemy soldiers had been setting up their machine guns to prepare for a sudden attack on the men sleeping down in the valley below them. The poor Canadian and American boys were asleep when the sound of machine guns awakened them at 4:00 a.m. Robert and Harold Ashley, a comrade in the tent, ran for cover in the grape vines nearby. Robert and his friend hid and kept still and quiet for three days. Eventually Robert and his buddy met up with their army's tanks. It was an event that shook Robert Chapman to his core. He and Harold became friends for life. All of those soldiers who were killed in that attack were buried right in that very valley where they died. Many tombstones said, "Died at age 20". Many boys were from Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.

A most amazing thing happened when the troupes were liberating Holland! It was near the end of the war when Robert arrived there. The Canadians fought valiantly to liberate the Netherlands and free the Dutch people. The

Canadian army tanks were driving up and down every street declaring that the war was over, and the people were finally coming out of hiding. Robert knew he had to go down into the dark basements as some people were too scared to come out into the sunlight.

In the basement of one war-damaged building, Robert discovered a small boy crying all alone. His parents had died. The little boy was scared of Robert. He didn't know an enemy from a friend. Robert gave the boy a leftover partial stick of gum. Robert carried the little boy to the tank outside. They dropped the little boy off at the rescue nursing station which was setting up nearby. Robert said good-bye to the little boy and gave the boy the small bible that had been in Robert's pocket all through the war. He pointed out that on the inside front cover was his full name, service number, regiment number and name. He said, "My name is Robert" as he

pointed at himself. The child replied, "Vim", as he pointed at himself. That was the only verbal communication they had. However, the bond between them was felt, it was an emotional parting.

Robert returned from the war, back to Saskatoon. There, Robert met a wonderful woman named Myrtle Moncrief. They married on August 3, 1946. They had a daughter, Lorraine Roberta, on December 19, 1949, and a son, Dennis Robert, on October 28, 1957.

Robert received a letter in the mail one day from Holland. It was from Vim! Twenty-four years had passed since Robert saved Vim, who had always cherished that little bible that the kind soldier gave to him that day. Inside the front cover of that little pocket-sized bible was the soldier's name and it also said Saskatoon Light Infantry and it had Robert's ID number and his regiment numbers. With research, the grown-up Vim (actually named H. William Dekker) was able to contact Robert Chapman. Very soon after the phone calls, Vim of Amsterdam, Holland, brought his wife, Anne, to Canada to visit Robert and his wife, Myrtle.

Robert always reminded his children that he went into that war to make a better world for them and their mother. Robert valued his freedom and right to be happy and to enjoy peace. Democracy for Canada. That is what the poppy means to us now. Robert and all the soldiers fought to defend and protect our freedoms and rights. Let's recognize our wonderful Canadian life and let's make Canada a good safe place for all. Let's always remember the Veterans past and present. A poppy means 'Lest We Forget'.

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
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#### **CHESTNUT, Guy Alexander**

WWII

Sergeant Pilot Guy Alexander Chestnut of the RCAF was born in Tyndal, Manitoba, on August 24, 1917. His parents were Dr. William Alexander Chestnut and Mrs. Lena Catherine Chestnut. Dr. Chestnut, originally from Ireland, practiced medicine in Moosomin, SK, for many years, beginning in 1919. Guy graduated from Moosomin High School in 1934 and worked for the Royal Bank in a number of communities before he enlisted with the RCAF in Regina on June 4, 1940. He served with No. 609 West Riding Squadron. Chestnut's Spitfire was hit by enemy flak when he was attempting to return to base at Manston, England, on June 11, 1941 after a mission over France. His plane crashed into a cliff near Ramsgate, and his body was never found. He was 23 years old. He is commemorated at Margate Cemetery, Kent, and at St. George's Royal Air Force Chapel at RAF Biggin Hill. Guy's brothers Jack and Harold also participated in World War II. His sister Margaret Helen Campbell lives in Outlook.

#### **CHORNEYKO**, Athanazie

Athanazie was born in Arran, Saskatchewan, on February 25, 1918, the son of Elias and Alexandra Chorneyko of Arran. He graduated grade 12 in 1936 at Arran School. He joined the Army in 1941 and was discharged at Brandon in November 1941. He enlisted in the Air Force, trained as a pilot and a Rear Gunner. He left Halifax in January 1943 for England and further training as Rear Gunner. Athanazie died on October 22, 1943 and is buried at Schoonselhof, Antwerp, Belgium.



#### **CHRISTIE**, Thomas Anderson

WWI

Thomas Anderson Christie, who was born on November 10, 1889 in Whithorn, Wigtown, Scotland, listed his occupation as banker when he enlisted with the 28th North West Battalion in Moose Jaw on October 24, 1914. Thomas was living in Broderick at the time. He served in France from September 17, 1915 until his death from severe gunshot wounds to his back and legs on June 8, 1916 at Courcelette. By that time, he had risen to the rank of Company Sergeant Major. He died at Casualty Station No. 17. He is commemorated at Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery in Belgium.




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#### COBB, Irvin "Bud"

Irvin Cobb was born on August 25, 1917 to George and Agnes Cobb of Outlook, Saskatchewan. He attended school in Outlook, contracting polio as a child. Irvin was working for the Canadian Pacific Railway when he enlisted on November 6, 1941. He served with the 11<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> Field Companies as a Sapper, building bridges and roads, and clearing mine fields throughout France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. During his service, he was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, the 1939-1945 Star, the France and Germany Star and the Defence Medal. When he was discharged on December 5, 1945, he had attained the rank of Corporal. Irvin returned to Outlook, where he and his wife Agnes had a son, George, and a daughter, Catherine. He worked for the CPR until his retirement. Irvin was a member of Branch 262 of The Royal Canadian Legion. He died at the age of 77 and is buried in the Outlook Cemetery.

#### **COLES, Donald Lewis**

#### **WWI & WWII**

Donald was born on February 5, 1898 in London, England. He joined the British Army in 1914 and was in Somme, France, when he was wounded and taken as a Prisoner of War until the Armistice. After the war, he went to the Foxdale District of Saskatchewan and started farming. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force on July 2, 1944 as a Corporal and was stationed for a time in Calgary before being sent overseas. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Shellbrook Branch 111 from 1923 until his passing away in July 1946.



#### COLTON, Gordon


#### WWII

He served in France with both the Divisional Supply Column and the Canadian Corps of Signals. On June 3, 1919, prior to his discharge in September, he received the Order of the British Empire Award. Following the war, he spent 45 years in the banking business. Cyril was living in Victoria, BC, when he passed away of a heart attack on January 31, 1947. He had three siblings: Arthur, Violet and Dorothy.

#### CONVERSE, Carl Vincent

Carl was born in 1914 in Nipawin, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Navy during World War II. He served aboard the HMCS Frigate Beacon Hill in England and Ireland. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion SK Hospital Branch 349. Carl passed away in 2005.






#### COOK, Daniel J.


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#### COOTE, Leslie D.

He was a proud lifelong member of The Royal Canadian Legion. Kendall passed away in 1986.

Bill was born in 1906 in Scotland. He immigrated to Canada in 1931 from Barr Head, Scotland. In 1937 they moved to the Parkman, Saskatchewan, area and he took up dog training. 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
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#### **COURCHENE**, Wilfred

WWII



In September of the same year, he was transferred to Italy with the same unit where he remained until the end of the Italian Campaign in March 1945. He then served in Holland; from there he was returned to England for repatriation. He was discharged on November 10, 1945. Wilfred passed away on August 18, 1978.

#### CRANG, William Reginald "Reg"

Able Seaman William Reginald Noel Crang was born to Leslie and Ethel Crang on July 3, 1923. The family lived in Wilkie, SK, but later moved to Outlook, SK, where his father worked for the Canadian Pacific Railway. Reg enlisted in Saskatoon on August 12, 1942 and became a member of the decorated Canadian Motor Torpedo Boat Unit. It involved dangerous work in small boats patrolling, usually at night, for enemy submarines. The flotilla was refueling on the afternoon of February 14, 1945, in Oostende Harbour in Belgium. Fuel spilled onto the water and ignited, demolishing five torpedo boats and killing 62 seamen, including 26 Canadians, many of whom were sleeping aboard the crafts. Reginald Crang, whose body was never recovered, is commemorated at the Halifax Memorial for servicemen lost at sea, and also at the Oostende Naval Memorial. Reginald was survived by his parents and three siblings: Robert, Edith and Ethel.





#### **CROMARTIE**, Peter Andrew

**WWI** 

Peter was born in 1894. He enlisted with the Army during World War I and served until he was killed in action in 1917.





#### **CROSS, Robert Tracy**

WWII

Tracy was born on December 5, 1923 in Yorkton, Saskatchewan. He spent his childhood in Crescent Lake and Yorkton, Saskatchewan. He joined the RCAF in 1942 and trained as an aero-engine mechanic at Moose Jaw, SK. He took his basic training at Lachine, Quebec. In 1944, he was posted to #11 SFTS air base in Yorkton, SK, where he serviced twin motor Cessna Crane aircrafts. Later that year, he was posted overseas to Middleton, St. George, England, where he serviced Lancaster bombers. In 1945, he went to various locations in Europe. The 666 Squadron was disbanded in 1945 so he was posted to Uetersen, Germany, where he worked on the spitfire fighter aircraft. He returned to Winnipeg, Manitoba, in 1946 where he was discharged. He returned to Yorkton, Saskatchewan, in 1951 and worked for the International Harvester company and IHC dealers until his retirement in 1989. He married Eve Rees at Armstrong, British Columbia in 1953. He and Eve had two children. Tracy still lives in Yorkton, Saskatchewan where he is an active member of The Royal Canadian Legion Alexander Ross Branch 77.

#### **CROWE, Ernest Walter "Ernie"**

WWI

Ernie was born on December 11, 1899 at the community of Cochrane Ranche, District of Alberta, NWT. With the war raging in Europe, he enlisted in the 10<sup>th</sup> Battalion in late December 1915, very shortly after his sixteenth birthday. After training in England, Ernie soon found himself in the trenches in France. He survived Vimy Ridge at the age of seventeen. At the Battle of Hill 70, however, a bullet entered his right forearm and which eliminated his elbow upon exiting. Bleeding profusely, he crawled to his comrades. He was later shipped to Canada with his elbow consisting of stainless-steel wire. In later life, Ernie married Wilhelmina, daughter of Burpee and Mary Anderson of Silton, SK. He was a founding member of The Royal Canadian Legion in Cochrane, AB, and was a member for over sixty years. Ernie passed away in 1989.





#### CRUICKSHANK, George Wesley


WWI

George Wesley Cruickshank was born in Parkhill, Ontario, on February 25, 1891. His family moved near Bratton, Saskatchewan, in 1906. Wesley was the second son in the family. The family struggled with farming and supplemented their income by doing other jobs like hauling lumber, delivering mail and working in a grain elevator. When World War I broke out, both Wesley and his brother John (Jack) enlisted in the Army on April 26, 1915. Wesley served sixteen months in France with the 53rd Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force. He was part of the overall effort to take famous Hill 70 when he was injured in trench warfare on July 13, 1917. He suffered wounds to his arms, face and legs from a trench bomb. His left leg was amputated above the knee. He was awarded the Good Conduct Badge on July 14, 1917. He was sent back to Canada to convalesce at hospitals in Regina and Moose Jaw before he received his discharge on July 25, 1919. Despite his injuries, Wesley worked in a hardware store in Macrorie for some time.














#### CRUICKSHANK, John "Jack"

WWI

John Cruickshank was born in Parkhill, Ontario, on March 18, 1892. He was living on the family farm near Macrorie at the time of his enlistment in Saskatoon on December 10, 1915 at the age of 23. He was a member of the 45<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force. He embarked for duty from Halifax aboard the Empress of Britain and was stationed in Bramshott, UK, until his deployment to France where he suffered injuries at the Somme on November 10, 1916. Like his brother Wes, who was also injured in France, John had to be sent back to Canada to convalesce in hospitals in both Regina and Moose Jaw. His injuries prevented him from continuing to serve and he was discharged on August 20, 1917. He and his wife, Ivy Gladys Cruickshank, were living in Saskatoon when John died suddenly in 1968.

#### **CRUICKSHANK, John Reid**

WWII

John was born in 1915 in Foam Lake, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Artillery in England and Europe until his discharge. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Foam Lake Branch for forty years. John passed away in 2002.



#### **CURRELL, Ernest Arthur**

WWI

Ernest Arthur Currell was born in Benson, Oxfordshire, England, on September 18, 1895. He arrived in Outlook in the spring of 1913, where he worked in construction and at a flour mill until 1914. Four days after World War I started, Ernest enlisted in Humboldt, SK. He was transferred to Valcartier, Quebec, where he trained with a little-known branch of the Armed Forces, the Canadian Corp of Cyclists Battalion. Ernest served nine months on the front in France, beginning on March 27, 1916. He and his comrades specialized in signalling, traffic control, range-finding, sapping, mining, listening stations, and as battalion runners and dispatch riding officers. Ernest was injured by gunshot wounds on September 15, 1916. In total, he served four years and one month before his discharge in Regina on January 10, 1919. He married Sophie Hart and they had two daughters. He worked for the Canadian Pacific Railway and as a caretaker at a bank in Outlook. Ernest passed away in 1986 and is buried beside his wife in the Outlook Cemetery.



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#### CURRELL, George William


#### **WWI & WWII**

George William Currell was born on April 19, 1890 in Berrick, Oxfordshire, England. He arrived in Outlook at the age of 21 in the spring of 1911. He worked at the Outlook Flour Mill until he enlisted in the Army in Outlook on December 16, 1915. He served with the 128th Battalion and later the 46th Battalion in England and France. George suffered a gunshot wound to his right leg on April 21, 1917. He was discharged in Regina on June 10, 1919. 





#### **CURRIE, Donald Laird**

#### **CURRIE, Erle Douglas**


WWII

W. M. Currie was born on January 31, 1883 in Mount Forest, Ontario. He enlisted with the Veterans Guard of Canada on January 8, 1943 and was stationed at Prisoner of War Camps in Southern Alberta until his discharge on February 26, 1946. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Penzance Branch. He passed away on December 30, 1962.



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#### **CYRENNE**, George

WWII

George was born in Ponteix, Saskatchewan. He joined the Army in 1944 in Montreal and was sent overseas six months later aboard the troop ship Lutania. After two months in England, he was sent to the front lines in Holland, Belgium and Germany until the end of the war. He returned to Canada in 1946. He did not talk much about the war but he did say that the closest he ever came to being a casualty was a bullet hole in his helmet. He had a German 45 Luger Revolver which he had brought back illegally from Germany. George passed away in June 2000.

Roger was born on June 15, 1917 and was raised on a farm and attended Notre Dame East School. After quitting school, he worked as a farm laborer both at home and in the surrounding district. On July 12, 1941, he enlisted in the Canadian Army, 4<sup>th</sup> Division Petrol Company in the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps. After training in Canada, he embarked for England in 1942. On Invasion Day, June 6, 1944, he landed in Normandy, France. He served as Dispatch Rider in France, Holland, Belgium and Germany until VE Day on May 8, 1945. Roger passed away on March 19, 1978.





#### DAHL, Berthold

WWII

Berthold was born in Ringbu, Norway, on September 16, 1905. He immigrated to the USA with his family when he was six months old. They later moved to the Pelly, SK, area. He enlisted in June 1943 and was sent overseas in April 1944, stationed with the Westminster Regiment. He served in Italy and on the Western Front. He came home in January 1946. He received his discharge and was awarded the 1939-1945 Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and the War Medal 1939-1945. Berthold passed away on October 1, 1957.



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

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#### **DAVIDSON, David Robert Joseph**

WWII

David was born in 1920 in Ponteix, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army in February 1943 in Regina, SK. He joined the Royal Canadian Ordinance Corps and went from Regina to Vancouver, to Prince George and then onto Prince Rupert for a few months. He went overseas to England, then to Belgium, Holland and Germany. He joined the Regina Rifle Regiment in Holland. He came back from overseas in 1946 and was discharged in February. He was married in June 28, 1947. David passed away on February 5, 2008.

#### **DAVIS, Ace James**

WWI

Ace James Davis was born in 1895 in Whitchurch County, Ontario. He served in World War I with the Canadian Expeditionary Force (CFA), 70th Battery. Ace was a driver for the 16th Brigade. A driver in World War I rode on a team of horses which pulled wagons, cannons, guns, ambulances, equipment, etc. Usually a team had six horses, three pairs of two. The lead driver would ride one horse, the second driver would ride his horse on the opposite side of the first driver, and so on. Each driver was responsible for his two horses' feeding, shoeing, vet care, etc., and teamed up with two other drivers to pull the wagon. Drivers were responsible for delivering supplies, food, ammunition and equipment to the front line in several feet of snow. The enemy targeted the drivers by machine guns to prevent supplies from getting through, a very dangerous job. He served in Canada, England, and Northern Russia. Ace passed away in 1966.





#### DAVIS, Clayton Sherven

WWII

Clayton was born in 1924 in Naicam, Saskatchewan. He served in the RCAF in World War II from 1941 to 1946. He was a Wireless Air Gunner and paratrooper that trained the Gurkha's in Burma with Squadron 436. He flew countless missions over enemy territory in India, Burma and Europe. After the war ended, Clayton was still in the Air Force on transport missions in and out of Europe throughout 1946. He then went back to Saskatchewan, ran the Hotel in LeRoy until 1963, and eventually moved to Saskatoon starting Bazaar & Novelty in 1977 with his wife and children. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 306 in Leroy, SK. Clayton passed away in 1985.



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#### **DAVIS, Robert James**

Aubrey Dayman was born on June 7, 1915 in Broderick, Saskatchewan, to Charles and Lizzie Dayman. He and his siblings, Thelma, Allan, Loye and Jean, grew up on the family farm. Because the family lost the farm in the Depression, Aubrey sought work at a number of farms in Alberta. In the spring of 1942, Aubrey was hired by the military to survey telephone lines in northern British Columbia. He later trained in Kingston with the Signal Corps and was stationed in England and France. Near the end of the war, he served during the Liberation of Holland. Following the war, he was employed by the BC Government Telephone and Telegraph System. He met his wife, Jean Quail, a telephone operator, in Fernie. They married on July 15, 1950 and had three daughters: Wendy, Pam and Susan. Aubrey retired in 1980 and passed away on April 23, 1981.

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






#### **DEMERAIS, Louis Ray**








#### **DENNIS, Harold James**














#### **DENNIS, Robert Lawrence**

WWI



He received head and hand wounds from shrapnel and was hospitalized before being returned to Canada for demobilization. After the war, he became a farmer. 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






#### **DEWAR, Duncan Alexander**



#### **DEWEY, William Joseph**








#### **DICKSON, George Albert**


#### **DODGE, Francis Everett**






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#### **DUSYK**, Michael






#### **ELVIN, Ernest William**

The fateful Schweinfurt raid was his seventeenth operation. He was awarded the 1939-1945 Star, Air Crew Europe Star, Defence Medal, General Service Medal and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp. The Operational Wings were awarded posthumously on January 4, 1947.



#### FELTON, Walter Kitchener "Dick"






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FLAIG, Abe WWII

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
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#### **FLAWN, Fredrick Charles**






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
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#### **FOSTER, Andrew Edwin**



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
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
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#### FRANKLIN, Albert E.




#### FRIESEN, George

He was N.C.O. in charge of various guard houses for four years. He embarked Halifax for the United Kingdom on June 2, 1944, serving in the United Kingdom and Continental Europe for 21 months. He was discharged on April 26, 1946, with the rank of Sergeant. Ken passed away on June 5, 1970.



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#### **GARINGER, Victor Clare "Vic"**

Vic was born on May 30, 1920, at Brooksby, Saskatchewan, to Norman and Luella Garinger. His siblings were: Alfred, Harold, Kenneth Evan, Earl, Norma, Elmer, Helen and Cecil. He enlisted in the Canadian Army on January 10, 1942. Following his training and service in Canada, he embarked overseas in September 1942 where he served with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Heavy Anti-Aircraft Artillery regiment in the United Kingdom, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was discharged on November 10, 1945 with the rank of Lance Bombardier. Vic passed away on May 1, 1990.

GARRY, Glen WWII

Glen was born in 1916 in Hamilton, Ontario. He enlisted with the Army and served with the #5 Bomber Recon Squadron on Atlantic Patrol. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and the Victory Medal for his service. Glen passed away in 2002.

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


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#### **GARUK, Michael Murray**

Their children grew up in Outlook. Jean died in 1971 at the age of eighty. Lemuel Hobbs Gavel died on June 14, 1988 in Regina at the age of 102.





#### **GENT, Robert Frederick**

Robert was born in 1924 in Halbrite, Saskatchewan. He joined the Army with the Royal Winnipeg Rifles on December 2, 1942. He took his training in Shellbrook, Quebec, and Camp Borden in Ontario. He embarked for England on April 29, 1944. While in England, he trained women for ambulance drivers. He left for Belgium on October 6, 1944 and was wounded on February 21, 1945 in Reichwald Forest. He returned to Canada and was discharged on November 24, 1945. He married Sylvia Colvin in December 1947 and they raised six children. Robert passed away on January 1, 2007.














#### **GEORGE, Albert Ronald**

WWII

Albert was born in May 1910 on the homestead in Willow Bunch, Saskatchewan. In 1942, Albert joined the Army and served overseas with the Perth Regiment. He was killed in action in northern Italy on December 10, 1944 at the Senio River. For most casualties, this is their second grave having been recommitted from a battlefield site to a Commonwealth Cemetery after the end of World War II. His memorial headstone reads "Greater Love Hath No Man Than This - That A Man Lay Down His Life For His Friends". His eternal rest is Plot 6 Row E Grave 5. Ravenna was taken by the Canadians in December 1944 and many burials reflect the fighting for the Senio Line. Following the fall of Rome to the Allies in June 1944, a series of successive stands were made by the retreating Germans. The cemetery's location is Lat.44.441525 Long.12.107673. It is open permanently and may be visited at any time.

#### **GERMAN, Beanus Michael**

Beanus was born in Kerrobert, Saskatchewan, in 1919 and grew up on a farm in the Luseland District. He enlisted in Regina on April 9, 1942 and was discharged on February 4, 1945. According to the Canadian Pension document, the reason for discharge was due to Bronchial Asthma which pre-existed prior to his enlisting. He injured his back in the army when he rolled a jeep. Beanus' rank was Private and served as Infantry Rifleman. He took basic training in Dundurn, SK, and served in Nanaimo, BC. Beanus passed away in 1984.



#### **GERMAN, Bernard Steven**

SPECIAL DUTY AREA

Bernard was born in Kerrobert in 1937. He enrolled in the Royal Canadian Air Force on October 12, 1955. He took his basic training at Saint-Jean RCAF station in Quebec and at Camp Borden in Ontario. He signed up for three years initially but signed up for an indefinite period in 1965. His first posting after training was to RCAF Station Saskatoon (406 Squadron) in 1956. His next posting was to RCAF Station Rockcliffe in 1961. Next, he was posted to CFB Station Rivers in 1964, CFB Portage la Prairie in 1970 and CFB Comox in 1977. He was promoted to the rank of Corporal on October 1, 1966; to Master Corporal on May 1, 1973; and to Sergeant on June 8, 1978. Bernard died of a heart attack on November 1, 1979, in his last year prior to retirement. He was awarded the Canadian Forces' Decoration and Bar for his years of service. He was an Aero-engine Technician. He didn't serve overseas. The closest he came was in 1959 when he was part of a crew that ferried a fleet of expeditors over to our bases in Germany and spent a short time in the Azores. He was always willing to support his fellow servicemen to the point of counselling them in a difficult situation.







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#### **GETTIS, Duain George**

Duain was born in Govan, Saskatchewan, in 1922. He served with 13 RCA, Army, 22 Field Battalion in England, France, Germany, Holland, Belgium and Canada during World War II. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 108 in Semans, Saskatchewan. Duain passed away in 1997.

GETTIS, Faye WWII

Faye was born in Govan, Saskatchewan, in 1924. She served in Canada and in England with the Women's Service. She has been a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 108 in Semans, Saskatchewan.



#### **GETTIS, Jay Clifford**

WWII

Jay was born in Govan, Saskatchewan. He enlisted in the Army and served with the Ontario Tank Regiment in Canada, the United Kingdom, France, Italy, Holland, Belgium and Germany during World War II. He has been a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 108 in Semans, Saskatchewan.













#### **GETTIS, Robert M.**

#### **PEACETIME**

Robert was born in Govan, Saskatchewan, in 1928. He served with 408 Squadron of the RCAF in Canada. He was the technician in charge of Shoran Geodetic Station in Northwest Territories. There is a lake called Gettis Lake (73° 32' N, 120° 25') in memory of Robert on Banks Bow Island. Robert passed away in 1959.

#### **GETTIS**, William

William was born in Govan, Saskatchewan, in 1926. He served in the Air Force during World War II. William has been a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 108 in Semans, Saskatchewan.



#### **GILBERT, Edward James**

WWI

Edward was born in Petrolia, Ontario, on December 15, 1889 to Carleton and Annie Jane Gilbert. His parents, originally from England, moved from Ontario to homestead near Bratton in 1906. Edward was attending Regina College when he enlisted in Regina on March 9, 1916 with the 203rd Overseas Battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Force. He served in the Signal Pool in France. Edward was also a member of the Signal Company Concert Party, one of about thirty troupes that entertained front line soldiers in France. The Canadian War Museum reports that by the Battle of the Somme in 1916, military authorities were encouraging and organizing concert parties for the soldiers during their periods of rest. By war's end, almost every division had its own entertainment troupe, as well as performers in many of the units and formations. Soldiers were entertained by songs, skits, and cross-dressing vaudeville acts. Edward arrived home in Halifax on June 13, 1919 and was discharged on June 16, 1919.



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
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
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#### GILCHRIST, James R.

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
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#### **GOLDBECK, Alvin**

WWII




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#### **GOLLMER, Harold William**

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














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#### GRAY, Howard

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


#### **GREENHOUGH, Challoner Lloyd "Charlie"**

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
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#### **GREENWOOD, Malcolm Bennett**


WWII

Malcolm worked in the Broderick General Store as well as serving as Postmaster until he and Norma moved to Vancouver in 1943 where they continued to operate small corner grocery stores. Malcolm passed away in 1958.





#### **GRINDLE, Clifford Morton**

Clifford Morton Grindle, son of Arnold and Ella Grindle, was born on March 10, 1922 in Macrorie. His parents arrived in the area in 1913 where they farmed and ran the local hotel. Clifford was working as a well driller when he enlisted in Regina on January 5, 1943. He served with the Lincoln and Welland Regiment. He was killed at Wouwse Plantage on October 24, 1944 at age 22. His regiment was part of a fierce assault that successfully drove the German army from the Scheldt and allowed the Allies access to the vital port at Antwerp. 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




















#### **GRUNERUD**, Allan


WWII

Allan Grunerud was born in the Red Cross Hospital in Broderick on September 5, 1925, and attended Wheat Plains, a one-room school near the family farm south of Broderick. Allan was farming when he enlisted in the Canadian Army. However, he was still in training when the war ended in 1945. Following the war, he returned to farming. He married Rose Jersak in 1947 and they had two children: Brian and Gail. He subsequently worked at several jobs but the one that he enjoyed most was the six years that he worked as caretaker at the Wadena School. He retired due to health problems. Howard passed away on June 15, 1977 and is buried in the Green Valley Lutheran Church Cemetery right across the road from his family home south of Broderick.



#### GRUNERUD, James Albert

James was born on December 11, 1917 in Waseca, Minnesota, and moved with his parents Mina and Albert Grunerud to a farm south of Broderick when he was six months old. He attended the Wheat Plains one-room school. He served Canada in World War II with the First Armoured Regiment (Royal Canadian Dragoons) from 1940 to 1945. He saw action in virtually all of the European Theatre of Operations (UK, Sicily, Italy, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany). Following an Honourable Discharge, he enrolled at the University of Saskatchewan in 1946 and earned BA and BEd degrees. He married Muriel Morton on May 1, 1946. They had one son, Terry. Moving back to the USA in 1950, James earned an MA and a PhD. He had a distinguished career as a professor at St. Cloud University in Minnesota. He enjoyed wood carving, oil painting and genealogy. James Grunerud passed away on January 13, 2010.



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
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#### **GRUNERUD, Otto**

Matthias was born in 1893 in Iceland. He enlisted with the Canadian Army on September 15, 1915 in Yorkton, Saskatchewan. He served in Canada, England, France and Germany. He was wounded at the Battle of Vimy Ridge and was hospitalized for nine months. He returned to active service in the Motor Machine Gun Brigade and was in Bonn, Germany, when the war ended. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Foam Lake Branch 16 for 56 years. Matthias passed away in 1982.





#### **GUSHULAK**, John

WWII

John was born in 1918 in Burgis, Saskatchewan. He enlisted on July 3, 1941 at the age of 22. His branch of service was the Canadian Army Postal Corps. He trained in Ottawa and at Ottawa's Post Office. He was promoted from Corporal to Sergeant and he transferred letters, parcels and newspapers. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Lumsden Branch 234 for 45 years, serving as President in 1962, before moving to Regina in 1985. 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







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#### **GUSHULAK, William George**

#### HARDIE, Willis

Willis was born in Kandahar, Saskatchewan, on April 9, 1921. He enlisted in the Army on July 30, 1943. He worked on the family farm prior to his second try for enlistment in Regina having been rejected in Saskatoon due to a heart condition. He served in World War II with the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada, Regina Rifles, Unit 8 in England, France and Germany. He was killed in action at the Falaise Gap on August 8, 1944 by enemy sniper. He was awarded the 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star, Defence Medal, War Medal 1939-1945 and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp. The Memorial Cross was given to his mother, Lydia Hardie.

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












#### HARDY, Joseph Alexander

WWII

Joseph was born in St. Leonard, Quebec, on February 11, 1904 to John Baptiste and Angelina Hardy. Alex's military career started on August 4, 1942 when he enlisted as a Leading Seaman Mechanic with the Royal Canadian Navy. He spent his military career at the Cornwallis, Digby and St. John's naval bases. He was discharged from Military duties in 1945. He returned to his family at Mondou, Saskatchewan, and lived and worked in the area for the rest of his life. He met an untimely death on July 30, 1955. Alex Hardy was buried in the Elrose Cemetery with full Military Honours.

#### HARPER, A. B.

WWII


A. B. Harper is the son of Jim and Nell Harper who came from Aberdeenshire, Scotland, before the First World War. His father was Reeve of the RM of Cote. He was killed in action on June 23, 1942 and is buried at Sage War cemetery near Oldanbury, Lan Niedersaschen, Germany. Buchan's Wellington was shot down at Wittmund. His geomemorial is Harper Lake, west of Stony Rapids, SK.



#### HARPER, Alexander Milton

WWII

Alexander is the son of Jim and Nell Harper who came from Aberdeenshire, Scotland, before the First World War. His father was Reeve of the RM of Cote. He was killed in action on December 20, 1942 and is buried at New Eastern Cemetery, Amsterdam, Netherlands. Milton's Lancaster was shot down over Duisburg, Germany, but crashed in Amsterdam. He is the brother of A.B. Harper, the boys farmed with their father before enlisting. His geomemorial is Harper Lake, west of Stony Rapids, SK.



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




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#### HARRINGTON, John "Jack"

WWII

John was born in Outlook, SK, on August 31, 1921, the son of John and Winnifred Norah Harrington of Glenside. His father was a World War I Veteran and recipient of the Military Medal. After initial training in Mossbank, he served as an RAF Rear Gunner in the Short Stirling Pathfinder 7<sup>th</sup> Squadron, engaging in numerous raids and sorties over land and sea in Northern and Western Europe. His plane was reported missing in action off the coast of East Anglia on June 12, 1943. Despite a thorough land and sea search, no trace was ever found. Warrant Officer Harrington is commemorated at Runnymede War Cemetery near London, England, a memorial for airmen who died with no known grave.

#### HARRINGTON, John

WWI

John was born at Beckermet, Cumberland, England, on October 4, 1882. He joined the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force on December 25, 1915. John Harrington served with the 46th Saskatchewan Regiment, the 10th Brigade Division and the 128th Battalion at Passchendaele. He suffered from 'trench foot,' a condition that was to plague him for the remainder of his life. John Harrington was awarded the Military Medal, which his family still treasures. Following the war, John returned to the Glenside area where he was known for his community-mindedness, serving the Municipality of Rudy council for thirteen years both as a councillor and reeve. He passed away on March 12, 1963 and is buried in the Glenside cemetery.





#### HARRINGTON, William

WWII

William was born in 1919, the son of William and Jessie Fraser Harrington of Glenside. He enlisted in June 1940 with the Saskatoon Light Infantry and was sent overseas in August. He took part in the invasion of Sicily and later in Ortona, Italy. He and 25 of his comrades were ambushed in a hail of gunfire near the City Hall. They sought shelter in a nearby building where they all died at the hands of the German Army on December 29, 1943. William was just 24 years old. He is buried at Moro Canadian War Cemetery, San Donato, near Ortona.



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
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#### **HARRIS, Herbert Thomas**

WWI

Herbert Thomas Harris was born in Myrtle, Idaho, USA, on November 16, 1897. His parents were Thomas Henry and Myrtle Harris. He was farming at Wiseton when he enlisted in Saskatoon on August 24, 1915 at the age of 18. As a member of the 31st Battalion (Quebec), he sailed from Montreal on September 25, 1915. His service in France began on March 8, 1916 as a member of the 31st Canadian Infantry. He was killed in action near Courcelette on September 15, 1916, and his body was never recovered. The battle was part of the Somme Offensive which resulted in thousands of casualties. It also marked the first time that tanks were used in warfare. Private Herbert Thomas Harris is commemorated at the Vimy Memorial near Arras, France.

#### **HARTLEY, George Richard**

WWII

George was born in Estevan, Saskatchewan, in 1916. Five days before Canada declared war, he volunteered for service in Regina, SK, on September 5, 1939, with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Corps Ammo Park RCASC CASF. On December 12, 1939, he was transferred to the Saskatoon Light Infantry where he remained with the regiment in its entirety until his return to Canada and demobilization on August 1,1945 as Sergeant. With the Saskatoon Light Infantry (MG) he participated in the Home Defence of England from 1939 to 1943, Sicily and Italy including Ortona, Moro River, Monte Cassino, Hitler and Liri Valley, Gothic Line and the Po Valley from 1943-1944 and Northwestern Europe and the Liberation of Holland (Rotterdam and Apeldoorn) in 1945. He was a six-year member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 60 in Estevan. George passed away in 1986 and is buried in the Estevan City Cemetery.





#### HARVEY, Bruce

WWII

Bruce was born on September 22, 1924 to Jim Sr. and Margaret (Smith) Harvey, who lived north of Carlyle, Saskatchewan. After finishing school, he joined the Canadian Army. After being discharged, Bruce married Pat Benders of Arcola and they farmed north of Carlyle. After a few years of farming, Bruce took the position of manager of Carlyle Lake Resort. From this position they moved to Whitehorse, where Bruce was employed as superintendent of Parks and Historic Sites for the Yukon. After his untimely death in 1982, many tributes were given for his work, including the naming of a mountain in his honour. "Mount Harvey" is situated near the Chilcoot Pass. Bruce and Pat raised two children, Jean and Rob.



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#### HAWRYLUK, William

WWII

William was born on April 10, 1918. He enrolled with the Army on August 29, 1941 at the age of 23. He served with the Rocky Mountain Rangers and the Oxford Rifles Regiments in United Kingdom, North Pacific area and Continental Europe. He was discharged on March 9, 1946 at age 27. He was awarded the France and Germany Star. William passed away on June 5, 1983 at the age of 65.

#### HAYES, William Lucas

WWI


William was born in 1888 in Oswestry, England. He enlisted with the Army and served with the 28<sup>th</sup> Battalion CEF in Europe. On October 11, 1918 during an attack, his company came under severe fire, and all the officers were killed or wounded. Although he was wounded, he took up command and when the advance was held up by an enemy machine-gun post in a house, he crept forward alone and bombed the house, rushing the post and killing the entire garrison. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 8 for fifty years. William passed away in 1959.



#### **HEAD, Perry William**

WWII

Perry was born in 1923 in Polwarth, Saskatchewan, the son of William and Delia Head. He became engaged prior to leaving for combat. In the last week of September 1944, the Allies held the city of Antwerp, but the Germans held both shores of the Scheldt estuary, so that the port of Antwerp could not be used. The task of clearing the southern shore of the estuary was allotted to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Canadian Division, aided by the 4<sup>th</sup> Canadian Armoured Division and the 52<sup>nd</sup> Division. Their operations lasted from October until the beginning of November 1944; by November 3, the Germans had been cleared from the northwest corner of Belgium and the south shore of Scheldt was free. There had been fierce fighting for two weeks with the crossing of the Leopold Canal. Perry died on October 15, 1944 at the age of 21. He is buried at the Adegem Canadian War Cemetery in Belgium. Family members visited his graveside in 2016.



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#### **HEARN, William John "Red"**


WWII

John was born in Central Butte, Saskatchewan, on March 25, 1923 and grew up in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1941 and was posted to the RCAF Air Training Base in Moose Jaw as an Air Engine Mechanic. He was then posted to No.5 Manning Depot in Lachine, Quebec, then to St. Thomas, Ontario, and finished his tour of duty at Boundary Bay, British Columbia, until the conclusion of World War II. He was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, General Service Medal and Clasp and RCAF Medal. John took a bookkeeping course in Vancouver after the war and then decided to return to his hometown of Moose Jaw to work for the CPR Express. He moved to Weyburn, Saskatchewan, in 1953 and became a sheet metal fabricator and plumber. He married Lil Dudar in 1956 and they settled and started a family in Weyburn where he still lives today.

#### HEGAN, T. George

wwii

George volunteered into service with the Indian Head Artillery in 1940. He had earned the rank of L/Sgt. by the time they mobilized to England. He saw action in North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France and Holland with the Canadian 5<sup>th</sup> Armored Division. He earned three campaign stars. Upon demobilization he used his military service credits to study pharmacy at the University of Saskatchewan. He took his first professional employment in Regina where he continued serving with the local militia artillery regiment. George passed away in September 2006.





#### **HEGEDUS, Alex**

WWII

Alex was born on March 23, 1917 in Kipling, Saskatchewan. He was called to serve his country leaving behind his young widowed mother and young siblings to carry on their own. He served in England, France, Germany, Holland and Belgium as a Private. While on the front line, his life was narrowly spared twice; first his helmet was pierced by a bullet, burning his hair. The second occurred in the trenches when his pant legs were burned. It was a very happy day when he and the other Veterans boarded the boat to return to Canada. Alex passed away in 2002.



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#### **HEMING, Cecil Davis**

WWII

Cecil was a Flight Sergeant in the Canadian Air Force and served as a Gunner. He was killed in action when his Halifax aircraft was shot down near St. Trond during an operation against Pilzen, Czechoslovakia. Cecil was originally buried at St. Trond, Belgium. He was single and only 22 years old. He is on the Village of Pelly Honour Roll. Cecil was the son of Cecil F. and Marion Heming of Langford, BC.

#### **HEMSWORTH**, James Taft

**WWII** 

Pilot Officer James Taft Hemsworth was born in Outlook on February 7, 1918, the son of William and Clara Hemsworth. His siblings included Alice, Merle, Earl and Robert. He and his family moved to Gull Lake in 1925. He worked as a hardware store clerk until he enlisted with the RCAF on June 18, 1940. He trained at Boundary Bay, BC, and was deployed to the Mediterranean on reconnaissance, mine-laying and anti-submarine missions. His Wellington MG796 was shot down over the Aegean Sea on February 9, 1944 and his body was never recovered. James Taft Hemsworth is commemorated, along with 11,871 other airmen with no known graves, at the Alamein Memorial in Egypt.





#### HILL, George Lewis

WWII

George was born on June 7, 1919 in Birch Hills, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army on January 16, 1942 and served with the Elgin Regiment as a Cook. He served in England, Holland, France and Germany until his discharge on November 21, 1945. He received the following medals: 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star, 1939-1945 Canada Volunteer Service Medal with red, green and black ribbon. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Birch Hills Branch 122 for fifty years. George passed away on November 2, 1998.






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HILL, Ray WWII

Ray was born on October 1, 1920 in Birch Hills, Saskatchewan. He enlisted in the Army with the Elgin Regiment and served as a cook with his brother George. He served in Britain, Holland, Belgium, France and Germany until his discharge. He received the following Medals: 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star, 1939-1945 Canada Volunteer Service Medal with red, green and black ribbon. Ray passed away on June 20, 1980.

#### **HILL, William Thomas**

WWII

William was born on July 4, 1916 in Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army and served with the Fourth Casualty Clearing Station in England, France, Belgium, Holland and Italy until his discharge. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Birch Hills Branch. William passed away on May 18, 2000.





#### HILTS, Arthur Halley

WWII

Arthur was born in Saskatchewan on June 7, 1910. He enlisted in the Army on May 1, 1942. He trained as a soldier in the artillery for three months, general training took place in Regina, SK. He served forty months as a Gunner in the UK, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He served a total of 44 months during World War II. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 16 in Foam Lake for 29 years. Arthur passed away on October 15, 1975.

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
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#### **HITCHENS, Harry Morris**

WWII

Harry was born on April 15, 1918 in Edgeley, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army and served with the 22<sup>nd</sup> Saskatchewan Horse Unit in Canada, the United Kingdom and Continental Europe. He always carried a small bible in his pocket, he received some shrapnel in this area and the bible saved his life. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Indian Head Branch 114 for over 45 years. Harry passed away on May 10, 1989.

HNATIUK, Eli WWII

Eli was born in 1918 in Marne, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Canadian Army and served in Canada until his discharge. Eli passed away in 1984.





#### **HOLLAND**, Emily

WWII

Emily was born in 1921 to Thomas and Mary Ann Holland who were of Irish descent and had immigrated to Saskatchewan and to Carlyle in 1922. She took her schooling in Carlyle and then when the Second World War broke out, she joined the armed forces as a member of the Canadian Women's Army Corp in 1942 and was stationed at Brockville, ON, at the Officers' Training Centre. This is where she met her husband, Oliver Crate Sr. After being discharged from the service, she and her husband worked in the catering business. They raised one daughter and three boys. Emily passed away in 1985.



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#### **HOLMES, Maurice**

#### **WWI & WWII**

Maurice was born in 1893 in Millhaven, Ontario. In 1914, he joined the 43<sup>rd</sup> Cameron Highlanders. He was wounded in the right leg and thigh and became a Prisoner of War in 1918. He arrived in France from Germany on December 21, 1918 and was taken to England to the hospital in January 1919. He spent two years in hospitals and was discharged on April 7, 1920. On August 5, 1940, he joined the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion of the South Saskatchewan Regiment as Quartermaster, attached to the staff of Estevan Headquarters and did recruiting. He was an original member of The Royal Canadian Legion 306. Maurice passed away in 1947.

#### **HOLUKOFF**, Peter

WWII

He served with Canadian Armed Forces during the Second World War. Peter was killed in action in 1944.





#### **HOOKER, Rex Murray**

WWII

Rex was born in 1921 in Wapella, Saskatchewan. He joined the 2<sup>nd</sup> Anti-Tank Regiment in 1939 and served overseas until he was killed in action on May 1, 1945, just seven days before the end of the war. Lance Bombadier Rex Murray Hooker is buried in Holten Canadian War Cemetery, Overijssel, Netherlands. Hooker Lake just east of Wollaston Lake is named in his honour.



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


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
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#### **HUCKLE, James Ross**

James was born in Regina, Saskatchewan, on March 8, 1944. He served in the Air Force with the 417, 421, 434 and 419 Squadrons. He also served at 1CAGHQ and TCHQ. James served in Canada, NATO and West Germany.

#### **HUCKLE**, Timothy Ross "Tim"

#### **SPECIAL DUTY AREA**

Timothy was born on March 8, 1971 in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. He served in the Army with the Saskatchewan Dragoons in Cyprus and Afghanistan as a Reservist.





#### **HUCKLE**, William "Bill"

#### WWI

Bill was born in Wootton, Bedfordshire, UK on August 31, 1900. He enlisted in the British Army and served with the 23<sup>rd</sup> Unit – Middlesex Regiment. He served during World War I in Germany, Belgium and France. After November 11, 1918, he stayed in Europe with the Occupation Force until 1920. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch in Raymore, SK for over 35 years. Bill passed away in 1976.



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
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#### **HUGGINS**, Frederick William "Fred"




Frederick William Huggins was born in Indian Head. His attestment papers state that his date of birth was August 12, 1897. However, his discharge papers on October 16, 1917 indicate that the reason for discharge was "being underage." In any case, Frederick enlisted as a bugler in Calgary on September 22, 1915. He wished to follow his three older brothers who had enlisted earlier. He sailed from Halifax on May 20, 1916 for Europe aboard the Empress of Britain. Frederick saw action in France. He served two years and sixteen days. After one of his brothers was killed and the other two were injured, his mother, Louisa, petitioned to have Frederick released from the Army. He was discharged on October 16, 1917 and returned to Calgary. He later moved to Outlook when he was transferred by his employer, CPR.

#### **HUGHES**, Lewis Morris "Lu"

Lewis was born in 1895 in London, England, one of the twelve children born to Daniel and Martha Hughes. In 1905, the family immigrated to Maidstone, Saskatchewan. Lu homesteaded nearby at the mouth of the gully at Standard Hill. He served overseas in World War I, joining the 188th Battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Force in North Battleford. In 1920, he sold his farm to his parents and moved to British Columbia. He worked and lived in British Columbia and Alberta for the rest of his life. Lu passed away in 1953.





HUME, Verl WWII

Verl was born on September 10, 1910. When the war broke out, he joined the Royal Canadian Navy and was posted to Newfoundland, where he served as a stoker. He was discharged in 1946 and returned home to Saskatchewan to farm. He purchased the former Doughty farm and in 1947, was hit by lightning while plowing and was killed.



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#### **HUMPHRIES, Ernest "Ernie"**

WWII

Ernie was born in the Taylorton District of Saskatchewan on July 18, 1899 to Thomas and Ann Humphries. He lived with his parents and received is education at Moose Creek School. Ernie worked for his brother, George, and also worked for several other farmers in the district. Ernie joined the Armed Forces when the Second World War broke out and served in a Fire Brigade. He was discharged in 1945 and returned to Carlyle where he worked for Rusty Kerr. Ernie passed away on October 11, 1978 and is buried at Moose Creek Cemetery.

#### **HUNT, Bruce Alexander**

WWII

Bruce was born in 1910, in Moosomin, Saskatchewan. His parents, Isabella and William Hunt, adopted a three-month-old baby girl, Phyllis Mitchell, in 1920. Bruce was briefly married in 1932 but his wife died tragically in 1933 while giving birth to their first child. His father William Hunt also died in 1933.

Around 1935, Bruce moved to Radville with his mother and sister, his brother Don, and Don's wife Ethel. Don worked on the power lines and Ethel ran the telephone office. Phyllis (Toots) later married Walter Nimegeers, son of Prosper and Julianna (VanDeSype) Nimegeers.

When the war started in 1939, Bruce enlisted with the Royal Canadian Engineers. He was 29 years old when he went to England.

On September 22, 1942, Bruce wrote home to his sister Phyllis stating: "That picture I sent home of our transport some time ago, well most of them never came back off the raid at Dieppe so I guess I was fortunate in not being there as I went to the hospital on the Sunday before – but I would sure liked to have been there."



And again, on February 24, 1943 (three days before his death), he wrote to Phyllis saying: "I've been pretty busy this last while. The fellow that was with me as a mechanic was sent out, he had bad eyes and I guess he won't be back, so I don't know who I'll get next to work with me. It sure is a lot of work when you are alone."

On February 27, 1943, Bruce was killed by a fractured skull sustained by being knocked down by a motorcycle while walking on the road. It was accidental. He was 33 years old.

Bruce is buried at the Brookwood Military Cemetery in Surrey, United Kingdom.

A year after his death, a lady named Annie Steer would write to Phyllis on April 17, 1944 saying: "I was over to visit Bruce's grave on the anniversary of his death and placed a wreath there for you. Perhaps you would like to know that it was made of laurel, carnations and daffodils. Since I was there last, they have erected a flag staff, with the Canadian Flag flying and Bruce's grave is almost under it. It seems really hard to believe he is there, he was always so full of life, and one feels so very sorry indeed for all the Canadian mothers and families, who's loved ones rest over here. There are so many in the Canadian military cemetery at Brookwood, but everyone over there can be certain that no better place could have been found anywhere and there are always Canadian soldiers taking care of their own "Garden of Remembrance", as we call it over here."

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#### **HUNTER, Stewart David**

WWII

Stewart was born in 1926 in Elfros, Saskatchewan. He joined the Army on February 13, 1945 and served with Infantry in Canada until his discharge. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Elfros Branch 237 for 38 years. Stewart passed away in 1985.

#### **HUSACK**, William "Bill"

WWII

William was born in Wroxton, Saskatchewan, on March 11, 1923. He enlisted in the Army during World War II. He was trained as a soldier and then as a mechanic-driver. Bill was stationed in Shilo, Hamilton, Port Arthur, Maple Creek, Dundurn and Regina. After the war, he worked at a lumber camp in Flin Flon and nickel mine in Lynn Lake, Manitoba. Bill married Gloria Balabuk in 1952 and they moved into their home in Calder. In 1962, he built a new house on the same lot. In 1964, he built the Coffee Mug Café and they operated it together until the 1970s. He was mechanically minded and invented a PTO-powered grinder because there was no power on the farm and held Canadian and US patents for the device. Bill passed away on December 13, 2014.





**HUSAK**, Peter

WWII

Peter was the son of Alex and Irene Husak of Arran, Saskatchewan. He joined the Canadian Army in 1941 and served with the Algonquin Regiment. He was killed overseas during World War II on March 7, 1945 at the age of 25.



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#### **INCHES, George Henderson**

WWI


George was born in August 2, 1895 in Scone, Perthshire, Scotland. He enlisted in the Army on May 31, 1914 with the Royal Scots. He served during World War I in Scotland and Europe, and was wounded in France. He was awarded the 1914-1915 Star, the British War Medal and the British Victory Medal and was discharged at Woolwich Dockyard on September 27, 1918. George married Edith Elva May Bates on January 1, 1936 and had a son, Charles Keith, and daughter, Diana Elva Mary. He was an active member of The Royal Canadian Legion in Leader and Weyburn. He was a member of the Sask Veterans Civil Service Corps and a member of the Frontiersmen. George passed away on April 23, 1957.

#### ISRALSON, Glen Herbert

**WWII** 

Glen Isralson was born in Outlook on June 21, 1920. His parents were Evan and Jessie who farmed in the Wingelo District between Glenside and Hanley. He was attending Saskatoon Normal School to become a teacher when he enlisted in the RCAF on April 27, 1940. He died on March 10, 1942 at age 21, when his aircraft crashed into the Bedford Basin in Nova Scotia during a snowstorm. His body was found floating an hour later. He is buried in Fort Massey Cemetery in Halifax. Flight Sergeant Isralson was interested in all sports. He was described in a letter of recommendation as "quick, organized and possessing initiative."





#### JAHNKE, Lawrence John

WWII

Lawrence was born on August 19, 1920 in Main Center, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army on July 12, 1940 and served as a Hospital Orderly at various places in Canada until his discharge on March 30, 1946. He married Helen George in December 1947 in Herbert, SK. In the spring of 1948, they moved to Tompkins where they purchased the Nesbitt ranch. They lived on the ranch for over 55 years, working hard and raising five children. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Tompkins Branch for fifteen years. Lawrence passed away on August 11, 2006.



























#### **JAMES, Charles Wolseley**

#### **WWI & WWII**

Charles was born on October 10, 1895 in London, England. He arrived in the Bratton area to homestead with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur James, and his two sisters, Maggie and Katie. Charlie enlisted in World War I at Saskatoon on October 13, 1915 at the age of twenty. He served with the 46<sup>th</sup> Battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Force and the 65<sup>th</sup> Battalion for seventeen months in France. After a gunshot wound to his left forearm on August 13, 1918, he convalesced at the Canadian Military Hospital set up at Bearwood Mansion where over 900 Canadian soldiers were sent. He was granted permission to marry Agnes Wyatt on November 2, 1918. He received his discharge on January 23, 1919. Back in the Bratton area, he and Agnes raised three children, Eileen, Sadie and Thomas, while farming and participating in community activities. Charles re-enlisted during World War II and was released on July 13, 1945 by reason of long service. He passed away on December 18, 1966 and is buried in St. Peter's Anglican Cemetery in Summerland, BC.

#### JAMES, Howard

#### **PEACETIME**

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
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#### JERSAK, Joseph

Joseph was born on February 18, 1922. Until he enlisted, most of Joseph Jersak's life was spent on his family's farm in the Glenside-Strongfield area. His parents, Joseph and Karoline (Puyman) Jersak, emigrated from Odessa, Russia in 1924 with their two children, Lydia and Joseph, age three. Five more children were born in Canada. Joseph served with the Canadian Highland Light Infantry in Holland and Belgium. Following the war, he purchased a farm in the Hawarden area. On a family visit to the USA in 1963, Joseph met Lois Meritt. They were married and lived in Uhrichsville, Ohio, where Joseph owned and operated Jersak Upholstering. #### JOHNSON, Harry Gutbrandr O.

Harry was born on September 5, 1889 at Churchbridge, NWT (now Saskatchewan). He was a member of the Winnipeg Police Force for a number of years before attending Wesley College to train as a teacher. When World War I broke out, he enlisted in a unique branch of the services, the 223rd Battalion (Canadian Scandinavians) based in Winnipeg. He served as a Recruiting Sergeant until he contracted rheumatic fever which damaged his heart. Harry was given an honourable medical discharge, after which he worked as an elevator agent. He married Mary Ellen Coward in 1929. Harry was a lifelong outdoorsman who enjoyed hunting, and was also an avid curler and sports fan. He died at age 86 on February 29, 1976 and is buried in the Glenside Cemetery alongside his wife Mary.







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
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#### **JOHNSON, Paul Martin**

When the Second World War broke out, he enlisted in the Westminster Regiment and served as a Sapper. After being discharged, he worked as an elevator agent at Freemantle - between Carlyle and Arcola. After retirement, he moved to Prince Albert, and then in later years, he was in the DVA home in Saskatoon. Herb passed away on May 28, 1971.





#### JUDD, Samuel Pennie

WWI

Private Samuel P. Judd was born in Hamilton, Ontario, on June 16, 1878. He was married to Florence Annie Judd. He enlisted in the Army at age 37 on January 15, 1916 in Outlook, Saskatchewan, and was a member of the 128<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force. At the time of his enlistment, he was declared fit for service. However, he was declared medically unfit and received a discharge on July 31, 1917. The illness, inflammatory rheumatism, was determined to be "due to service" and was severe enough that the medical examiner noted that Samuel Judd "cannot drill or do physical exercises." Samuel passed away on March 16, 1941 and is buried in the Outlook Cemetery.






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## Walter Nelson Julseth and Ethel May Wood A Canadian Veteran and His War Bride







Walter was born in Loverna, Alberta, on December 3, 1919. He joined the RCAF in May 1941 and trained in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. He left for Liverpool, England, in December 1941. After postings and training courses in Syerston, Balderton, Leeds and Leeming, he declined an offer to be an instructor for Air Frame Mechanics and was posted to the 408 Squadron at RAF Topcliffe, close to Thirsk. At one of his postings, because of the blackouts during the war, he remembered staying in a 40' long stable with only two 60-watt light bulbs in it for the men to shave. He also remembered a thick Yorkshire accent telling him to "put wood inth 'ole luv", meaning to close the door. Life in England was very different for a prairie boy.

Ethel was born in Sunderland, England, on January 13, 1924. She joined the Women's Auxiliary Air Force in the spring of 1942 after her father signed the paperwork. Originally from Newcastle, she was posted at RAF Topcliffe near Thirsk where she drove ambulances and Commanding Officers' cars. It was at Topcliffe that she met Walter Nelson Julseth.

Their first "date" was Ethel driving Walter around the base in a heavy fog looking for a Lancaster bomber that had not returned from a mission. After their first meeting, Walter convinced her to accompany him to a dance, even after warning her he had two left feet and calling her "Red" because of her auburn hair. She later admitted that he did indeed have two left feet, but he must have done something right, as they were married in July 1944 at Barmby Parish Church, Barmby on the River.

Walter left England in late 1944, celebrating Christmas on the Queen Mary and arriving home on New Year's Day 1945. Ethel followed in May 1945 on the Britannic with many other war brides. She almost returned immediately to England after coming all the way to Saskatchewan because Walter was late to meet her train. He had met up with some war buddies and got a little sidetracked. Fortunately, he convinced her to stay and they were married for over fifty years. They farmed in Plenty, Saskatchewan, and had six kids. They stayed in the Girvin/Craik, Saskatchewan area with Walter's parents for a while before purchasing land in Plenty, Saskatchewan. Walter remained an active Legion Member after being discharged from the RCAF.

Ethel travelled back to England to visit family numerous times but was able to return to the church where they were married in the fall of 1999. Also on that trip, she was given an escorted tour around RAF Topcliffe, which was, and is still, an active base. They were more than happy to show her around once they found out she was stationed there during the war.

Ethel remained an active member of the War Bride Association throughout her life. In 2006, she was able to make the trip on The War Bride Train to Pier 21 in Halifax to celebrate the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the war brides coming to Canada.

Walter passed away on February 3, 1995 and Ethel passed away on January 9, 2015.

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


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
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#### KACHMARSKI, Michael


WWII

#### **KEENAN, George Stevens**

George was born in Galicia, Austrian Empire, in 1901. During World War I, at the age of fifteen and using the assumed name Stevens Green, George joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force in Prince Albert in 1916. He served with the 243<sup>rd</sup> Battalion under O.C.J.E. Bradshaw in Canada and in England. He went overseas in 1917 and returned in 1919. During World War II, using the name George Stevens Keenan, he joined #6 Armoured Fighting Vehicles in 1943 and served in Canada. He was very seriously injured during a training accident in Dundurn. Following a long recovery, he returned to his family and his work at Imperial Oil in Regina. The family discovered a photograph of the entire 243<sup>rd</sup> on a Legion wall in Prince Albert taken before shipping out overseas but because of his tender age at this time, it has not yet been possible to identify him. George passed away in 1986.



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#### **KEENAN, John Edward**

#### **PEACETIME**

John was born in Regina, Saskatchewan, on May 1, 1932, the son of George and Elizabeth Keenan. He served first with the Sea Cadets and then joined the Royal Canadian Navy in 1951. Following basic training in Nova Scotia, he went on to serve in the north and south Pacific. In 1952, he joined HMCS Cedarwood, which was assigned to Pacific Naval Laboratories for oceanographic surveys of the inside passage of British Columbia. Following that, he was drafted in late 1953 to the cruiser HMCS Ontario and accompanied the Royal Yacht Britannia during Queen Elizabeth II's Commonwealth tour to Hawaii, Tonga, Fiji, Tasmania, New Zealand and Australia in 1954. Later, Prince Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh, would join the ship to visit Kitimat for the grand opening ceremonies of the giant generating plant at Kemano, BC. His final posting was with the University of Manitoba's UNTD division at HMCS Chippawa in Winnipeg. In 1956, John joined Canadian Pacific Airlines, now Air Canada, and served in marketing and sales for the next 36 years. John resides with his wife, Elizabeth, and family in Toronto, Ontario.

#### **KEENAN, Robert Donald**

#### **PEACETIME**

Donald was born in Regina, Saskatchewan, in 1933, the son of George and Elizabeth Keenan. He served first with the Sea Cadets and then following in his brother's footsteps, was off to sea in 1952 with the Royal Canadian Navy where he served for over thirty years, retiring as Chief Warrant Officer. Donald would find his sea legs onboard the training cruiser HMCS Ontario, the most powerful of all the great ships of war of the RCN and would go on to serve in at least a dozen other ships and shore establishments. He was a welcome addition to any mess deck where the pipe to 'up spirits' meant that wonderful salty tales and stories were about to be shared over sippers of "Nelson's Blood". He was always at home, whether in destroyers dashing about the glittering blue of tropical seas or standing watch during the cruel seas of winter in the north Atlantic. Donald loved the pomp and ceremony of all things military and sadly slipped his final berth on December 20, 2016.





#### **KENT, William Cornelius**

#### WWI

William was born on May 2, 1898 in Burford, Ontario, the son of Benjamin and Bertha Kent. William's father worked in the local flourmill as well as farmed. William moved to Outlook, Saskatchewan, with his parents in 1912; and, after completing his education, he joined the staff of the Outlook branch of the Bank of Montreal in December of 1914. He enlisted in Outlook on December 8, 1915, as a Private in the 128th Battalion of the Canadian Light Infantry. He went overseas in August 1916. After a short machine gun course, he was sent to France to join the 46th Battalion. On the morning of April 9, 1917, he was killed instantly by enemy fire as his section was advancing toward enemy troops in the successful campaign to capture Vimy Ridge. Willian Cornelius Kent is buried in a joint grave at Douau Communal Cemetery in France.


























#### KING, Walter John


WWII




#### KINNEE, Ronald Alfred "Ron"

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
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#### KIRK, Alfred George Baxenden


#### **BOER WAR & WWI**






#### KIRK, Victor Alfred




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#### KITCHEMONIA, R. J.

WWII



In total, Frank served eleven and a half months in Canada, twelve months in England and twelve and a half months in France. He married Sophie Tomasiewicz in 1927, and farmed south of Broderick where they raised their six children. He enjoyed sports, hunting and fishing, participating in many community activities, and maintained a positive attitude toward life until his passing in 1959. He is buried in the Broderick Cemetery.





#### KNIGHT, Sydney Wynn

Sydney was born in 1899 in London, England. He enlisted with the Army and served with the 209<sup>th</sup> Battalion in England and France during World War I. He was wounded in action in the spring of 1918. During the Second World War, he served at the Swift Current Airport. Sydney passed away in 1979.

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
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#### KOPPERUD (BURNSIDES), Irene




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#### **KOTSCHOREK, Robert Gustov Bernard**

WWII






#### **KUZNIAR**, Bruno

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
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
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#### LANOVAZ, Raymond



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
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#### LARSON, Frederick



He is buried in the Blacon Cemetery, Chester, Cheshire, England.

#### **LEADER, Harry Thomas**

WWII

Harry was born in 1920 in Leslie, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army and served with the 8<sup>th</sup> Canadian LAA Regiment RCA. He served in Canada, England, France, Holland and Germany. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Leslie Branch 172 for 23 years. Harry passed away in 1969.





LEIN, Olaf WWI

Olaf was born in Norway on March 19, 1890. He was married to Louisa Lein and working near Outlook as a farmhand when he enlisted in the Saskatchewan Regiment of the 1<sup>st</sup> Depot Battalion in Regina on February 2, 1918 at the age of 27. He trained at Moose Jaw. He contracted influenza and on October 10, 1918 was sent to the Saskatchewan Military Hospital in Moose Jaw for treatment. Olaf passed away on January 19, 1918 before he could be sent overseas. Olaf Lein is buried in the Outlook Cemetery.



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#### LENNOX, John D.

WWII

John was born in 1904 in Toronto, Ontario. He joined the Royal Canadian Service Corps in December 1941. He reported to the base in Regina in January 1942 and trained for a little while before being transferred to Camp Borden for basic training. He was sent overseas and served in England until January 1943. He was then sent to Scotland where he took a Motor Mechanics course; he then returned to England and worked in the post office until returning to Canada in February 1945. He received his discharge on March 28, 1945. John passed away on January 9, 1962.

#### LINDER, John "Jack"

WWII

Jack was born in 1921 in Wawota, Saskatchewan, where he took his schooling. He joined the Army in 1940 and went overseas with the Regina Rifle Regiment. Jack was killed by a sniper's bullet on September 25, 1944. He is buried in the Calais Southern cemetery in Calais, France. Linder Lake in Northern Saskatchewan is named in his memory.



#### LITTLECROW, Harold

WWII

Harold was born in Moose Woods Reserve in 1918. He enlisted in the Royal Canadian Engineers in January 1941 and served in Britain for a time before taking part in the invasion of Normandy during the Second World War. Harold was killed in action in France on July 26, 1944 at the age of 26. A memorial service was held at the Moose Woods Reserve schoolhouse where a large group assembled to remember a young man who was very well respected.



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#### LITTLECROW, Lorne

#### WWII

Lorne was born on Moose Woods Reserve in 1922. He enlisted in the Army in June 1943 and served during the Second World War with the Regina Rifles in the United Kingdom and Continental Europe in the liberation of France, Belgium and Holland until his Honourable Discharge in July 1946. He was awarded the 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp. Lorne passed away on December 28, 1988 in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. He was a member of the Army, Navy and Air Force Veterans Club in Saskatoon Branch 38 for ten years.

#### **LOCKHART, Grant Aaron**

#### WWI & WWII

Grant was born in 1896 in Northampton County, New Brunswick. He enlisted with the Army in the First World War and served with the RCR's in France. He moved to Green Lake, Saskatchewan, in 1924 and resided there until 1940. He joined the Canadian Army in Saskatoon and served in Canada during the Second World War. Grant passed away in 1973.





#### LONGHURST, William Sydney

#### WWI

William was born in Granby, Quebec, on July 25, 1883. His father was an Arch Deacon in the Church of England. William was living in Broderick, Saskatchewan, and working as a farmer when he enlisted in Regina on June 10, 1918 with the Saskatchewan Regiment, 1st Depot Battalion. Private William Sydney Longhurst's military career was abruptly cut short when he was diagnosed with nephritis and received discharge papers on June 21, 1918. William passed away on November 25, 1918 and is buried in the Outlook Cemetery. He was married to Constance Ragna Longhurst.



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


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#### LOW, Donald Baird "Don"

#### WWII

Don was born in Foxwarren, Manitoba, on March 7, 1926. He joined the RCAF at the age of eighteen with the intention of becoming a pilot but was selected to train as a Wireless Gunner. He was later transferred to the Army and stationed in Toronto and Winnipeg. Upon his discharge on December 12, 1945 he returned to Foxwarren, where he courted Elaine, the love of his life. He worked as a mechanic and cabinet builder; started working for the CPR as an Assistant Agent in 1948; later becoming an Operator and Station Agent. The last sixteen years of his career included a move to Yorkton and a promotion to Mobile Supervisor, retiring in 1988 after forty years with the railway. Don passed away on January 3, 2016.

#### **LUCAS, John Arthur**

#### WWII

John was born on April 11, 1918 in Readlyn, Saskatchewan. He joined the Army in 1940, training at Weyburn and Dundurn and then switched to the Air Force. He trained as an Aero-mechanic. He married five months before being posted to England on March 15, 1943. He was posted to several places but spent most of his time at "Topcliff" in Yorkshire. They repaired other planes but mainly Lancaster Bombers. In June 1945, he volunteered for service in the Pacific and was sent home on leave. The war ended before his service came up. John passed away in July 1989.



#### **LUCAS, Norman Allan**

#### WWII

Norman was born on January 4, 1925 in Assiniboia, Saskatchewan. He joined the Army in 1942 and served with the Anti-Tank Regiment in England, France, Holland, Germany and Normandy. After returning to Canada, he worked in Kimberly for a short time before buying grain in Readlyn, Hardy and Goodwater, SK. He bought the general store in Goodwater and then sold the store in 1962, and moved to Regina where he joined The Royal Canadian Legion and worked for them and various other jobs. Norman passed away on December 23, 2006.



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John was born on June 10, 1910 in Star City, Saskatchewan, to John and Florence MacDonald. His siblings were: Catherine, William (who died in infancy), Norman, Douglas, Stanley, Hector and Florence. He enlisted in the Canadian Army on November 7, 1941 and served as a Sapper with the Royal Canadian Engineers in the United Kingdom, France and Northwestern Europe.

Elizabeth, also known as Elsie, was born in Belfast, Ireland.

John and Elsie married in October 1945 in Manchester, England.

John received his discharge on January 24, 1946. Elsie left Southampton, England, on June 9, 1946 onboard the Queen Mary and arrived in Halifax, then on to Star City by train.

John was employed as a grain buyer in Star City for a number of years. Upon his retirement, they moved to Saskatoon where he served with the Canadian Corps of Commissionaires.

John passed away on January 23, 1992.

Elsie passed away on November 13, 2019 at the age of 105.







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#### MacDONALD, Len

WWII

Len was born in 1920 in North Gate, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Air Force and served in Canada. He was a Life Member of The Royal Canadian Legion North Portal Branch 117. Len passed away in 1989.

#### MacFIE, Gordon C.

WWII

Gordon was born in 1920 in Selkirk, Manitoba. He enlisted in the Army in 1941 and served with the 17<sup>th</sup> Field Regiment RCA, serving in Italy and Western Europe until his discharge in 1945. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Birch Hills Branch 122. Gordon passed away in 1998.






#### MacFIE, James E.

WWII

James was born in 1918 in Selkirk, Manitoba. He enlisted in the Army on September 6, 1939 and served with the 1<sup>st</sup> L.A.A. Battery, RCA, CASF in Italy and Sicily. James was killed in action in 1944 and he is buried at Ravenna War Cemetery, Piangipane, Italy.









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#### MACK, Edward J.

WWII

Edward was born in the District of Kingsford, Saskatchewan, on July 3, 1921 to Anton and Nymphia Mack. He was the fourth born son of fifteen children. In February 1943, at the age of 24, he enlisted for service in Regina. He served with the Saskatoon Light Infantry as a Machine Gunner. His service took him to Italy, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. By war's end, he was awarded the 1939-1945 Star, Italy Star, France and Germany Star, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and the War Medal 1939-1945. In 2016, his daughter applied for the Liberation of Holland Medal and it is proudly displayed with his other medals. Edward married Lena on October 25, 1949 and together they raised a family of five. He joined The Royal Canadian Legion Estevan Branch 60 after his return from the war, but soon withdrew choosing to keep his experience of the war locked safely away in his memory; little was ever spoken of those years. Edward passed away on May 17, 2003.

#### MacPHEAT, John Nicol

wwii

John was born in 1919 in Marieton, Saskatchewan. He enrolled in the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps in Regina in 1941. After training in Red Deer and Camrose, AB, he was overseas from 1943 to 1946 serving as a vehicle mechanic in England, France, Germany, Italy and Holland. He received the 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star, Italy Star, the Defence Medal and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp. Returning to the Marieton District, John purchased a farm where he put his blacksmith, coppersmith and mechanic training to good use. John and his wife, Kay, retired to Strasbourg. John remained active in The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 33 in Silton until his passing in 1998.





#### MADILL, Raymond Elliot

wwii

Raymond was born in 1919 in Macklin, Saskatchewan. He enlisted in the Army and served with the RCA in Canada, England, and Italy until his discharge. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Foam Lake Branch 16. Raymond passed away in 1962.







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#### MANN, Ronald Percy "Ronnie"

WWII

Ronald Percy Mann was born on December 26, 1921 in Regina, Saskatchewan. His father, Henry Edward Percy Mann, served in the British Army from 1914 to 1919. While serving in the army he was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for bravery in action. He loved to perform in the army, singing for the troops in his special English style. He came to Canada in 1920 and joined the RCMP. Marjorie and Percy were married in Regina in 1921.

Percy was in the "Musical Ride" in the early years and had duties at the Government House. His real police work started at Fort Qu'Appelle in 1932. There were three boys and one girl by that time. In 1940, the family moved to North Portal, then to Radville where two more girls were added.

When the war broke out, all three boys enlisted: Ronnie in the Air Force, Quin into the Army and Jack into the Navy. In November 1941, the dreaded telegram was received to say the oldest, Ronnie, was reported "missing in action" and later presumed dead.

Ronnie had served with the Royal Canadian Air Force attached to No. 405 (City of Vancouver) Squadron (Ducimus) as a Sergeant (Air Gunner). Based at RAF Pocklington, Yorkshire, England, the No. 405 Squadron flew Vickers Wellington bombers over the Bay of Biscay and in France and Germany.

On November 30, 1941, Sergeant Ronald Percy Mann died following air operations to Hamburg, Germany, when his Wellington aircraft crashed into the Wadden Sea off the Frisian Islands. One of 181 aircraft that took part in the bombing operation on the Hamburg shipyards, the No. 405 radioed that they were returning to RAF Pocklington when they were lost without a trace.

He was nineteen years old.

Mann is commemorated on the Runnymede Memorial in Surrey, England, for airmen with no known grave. He is also commemorated on the Bomber Command Memorial Wall in Nanton, Alberta, and on the North Portal War Memorial in Saskatchewan.

#### MARTIN, Cyril E.

WWI & WWII

Cyril was born in England on February 18, 1900. With the outbreak of the First World War, Cyril enlisted with the Canadian Army. Soon he was sent to England where he received further military training. He was then sent to France where he was posted to the 7<sup>th</sup> Canadian Railway Troop Regiment. Cyril fought at the Battle of Ypres and Passchendaele in Belgium. When the Second World War broke out, Cyril again enlisted in the Army. In 1942, he was sent to England for intensive military training. He was transferred to the 17<sup>th</sup> Field Regiment, RCA in 1943. He was honoured by receiving "The Medal of the Legion of Honours." Cyril passed away on November 17, 2003 at the age of 103.







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#### MARTIN, John S.

#### **KOREAN WAR**

John served with the Royal Canadian Air Force during the Korean War. He received the Canadian Korea Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal for Korea, Special Service Medal and United Nations Service Medal (Korea). He received his sixty-year Long Service Award Pin with The Royal Canadian Legion Esterhazy Branch 249.

#### MARTIN, Robert "Bob"

WWII

Robert enlisted in the Provost Corps (Military Police) in January 1942 and served until he was discharged in 1946. Robert was killed in a train/car accident in 1954. His interment is in the Greenwood Cemetery.





#### MASON, William Ashton

WWII

William was born in Shellbrook, Saskatchewan, on January 10, 1920. He enlisted in the Army and served as Sapper with the Royal Canadian Engineers, 2 Cdn. E & M Platoon 'A'. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion in Shellbrook. William passed away in 1974.



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# McADAM, Geraldine Rose

WWII

Geraldine was born on October 21, 1918 in Lake Alma, Saskatchewan. She grew up in Bromhead and went to school to become a teacher. She joined the Royal Canadian Air Force (WD) in 1942 and was stationed in numerous bases in Canada. She received her discharge in 1945 and returned to Bromhead. She married Robert Frederick in 1947 and they eventually moved to Lewiston, Idaho. Geraldine passed away in 1995.

# McADAM, Lewis James

**WWII** 

Lewis was born on October 3, 1915 in Wisconsin, USA. He was raised and educated in Bromhead, Saskatchewan. He joined the Army in 1942 and moved to Ottawa. He spent 25 years with the Royal Canadian Engineers and after the Second World War, he spent several summers with Army Survey, surveying and mapping Northern Canada. After Army retirement, he was employed by the Department of National Defence. Lewis passed away in 1981.





# McADAM, William Henry

WWII

William was born on May 28, 1921 in Lake Alma, Saskatchewan. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force on August 16, 1941. He trained to become a pilot at various points in Saskatchewan and went overseas in the spring of 1942. He was stationed in Scotland and was killed on August 15, 1942. William is buried at Longside Cemetery near Peterhead in Scotland.



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# McARTHUR, Arthur Neil

WWII

Arthur was born on July 21, 1920 in Battleford, Saskatchewan. On June 21, 1940, he joined the 1st Regina Rifles. He was a trained infantry soldier, dispatch rider and mortar man. He served in the UK, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp. He married Lillian Jean Ogden in Portsmouth, England in July 1945. After his release, he returned to Battleford and Jean followed in 1946. In 1947, their son Gary was born. Arthur was a custodian at the public school for a short period, then drove a truck, then was promoted to Manager of the Co-Op Fuel and Fertilizer Department where he was employed until his death on November 15, 1964. He is interred in West Eagle Hills Cemetery in Prongua, SK.

# McARTHUR, James Douglas

wwii

James was born on February 3, 1924 in Battleford, Saskatchewan. In 1941, he lied about his age and joined the Regina Rifles, 2<sup>nd</sup> Division and served in the United Kingdom, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany as a Gunner and mortar man. He suffered shell fragments in his left heel. He was awarded the 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp. After his discharge from the Army, he returned to Battleford and married Jean Pratt. Later, he moved his family to Vancouver, BC. He passed away on March 13, 1982 after suffering a lengthy illness and was given a Military Service conducted by The Royal Canadian Legion in Victoria, BC.



# McARTHUR, John Vincent

**WWII** 

John was born on February 3, 1917 in Sonningdale, Saskatchewan. He enlisted in the Army on February 9, 1941 with the Royal Canadian Engineers as a trained Ordnance Corps soldier with vehicle mechanic group A. He served in the UK, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp, 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star and the Defence Medal. After his discharge on January 10, 1946 he returned to Battleford, SK. He was diagnosed with Polio in the latter part of 1950. After his recovery he went to work for the Army in Dundurn as a Stationary Boiler Engineer Fireman. His last residence was the Veterans Home in Saskatoon. After his death on August 21, 1992, he was interred in the Veterans' section at Woodlawn Cemetery in Saskatoon. John was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 63.


























# McARTHUR, Neil Almer

WWII


Almer was born on May 17, 1918 in Sunningdale, Saskatchewan. He enlisted on January 17, 1941 with the 14<sup>th</sup> Army Tank Regiment (The Calgary Tanks) and was shipped overseas in June 1941. He drove tank #6 'Bert' in the raid on Dieppe, code name 'Operation Jubilee'. He became a Prisoner of War and was kept at three different camps: Stalag VIIB, 344 and 11D. On May 2, 1945, Germany surrendered. He was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp, 1939-1945 Star, Defence Medal, War Medal 1939-1945 and Dieppe Bar. After discharge from the Army he returned to Battleford and married Annie Lacey in 1946. The family moved to the Vancouver area in 1956, where he resided until his death on January 12, 1994. He was interred at West Eagle Hills Cemetery in Prongua, SK.

# McCLAIN, Harold Calven

Harold was born in Carman, Manitoba, on December 1, 1896. His parents, Thomas Charles and Margaret McClain, moved to Glenside, Saskatchewan. Harold's address when he enlisted in the Army in Regina on June 18, 1918 was Broderick, where he farmed. While in England with the 1st Saskatchewan Depot Battalion, Harold contracted a severe case of influenza. He was hospitalized for almost seventy days with a high fever. In view of his long, debilitating illness, his doctors recommended that he be invalided back to Canada for further medical treatment. He was discharged in Regina on June 20, 1919 and passed away four months later on October 16, 1919. He is buried in the Outlook Cemetery.






# McCULLOCH, Robert Joffre














# McKAY, Frank Hill


WWII



His initial training was at Brisbane; he did Elementary Flying Instruction at New South Wales and finished flying training with the British Commonwealth. He served in Canada at Yorkton #11 SFTS. Norman received his Pilot Wings on April 1, 1943. He was posted to Flying Instructor School in Vulcan, AB, and his first job was as Flying Instructor in Dauphin, MB. He was posted back to Australia in 1945 and started Operation Training Unit. He stayed with his wife and first-born son for three years and then went back to Yorkton in January 1948. They had five children, fifteen grandchildren and thirteen greatgrandchildren. Norman was a Life Member of The Royal Canadian Legion General Ross Branch 77, and once served as President and Zone Commander. Norman passed away on February 19, 2016 in Yorkton.






# McLAUGHLIN, Alfred Russell

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# McMILLEN, Frederick Sterling Miller


WWII

Angus was born in Spy Hill, Saskatchewan, on January 22, 1943. He enlisted in Peacetime with the Canadian Army on January 30, 1962 and served with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion PPCLI in Edmonton, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion PPCLI in Victoria and with NATO in Germany from 1963 to 1965. Angus has been a member of The Royal Canadian Legion since 1967.

Alice was born on July 13, 1920 in Carlton, Saskatchewan. She joined the Canadian Women's Army Corps on July 7, 1943 and was discharged on April 15, 1946. She served as a clerk (GD) GP "C" and Clerk Departmental GP "B" at the National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa. She married Leonard Craig in 1946. She resided in Saskatoon and passed away on April 13, 2006. She received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal for her dedication.



# METCALF, D. Roland

WWII

Roland was born in 1913 in Walpole, Saskatchewan. He joined as a member of Canada's Army in 1941 in Toronto. He trained in Petawawa and Cornwall and then went overseas on the ship "The Empress of Japan" and landed in Greenwich, Scotland, on June 10, 1941. He was with the 31st Battery, 1st Light Machine Gun. He returned to Canada on a French ship "La France". He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Wawota Branch 113 for 43 years. Roland passed away in 2003.





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# **METCALF, Donald Leslie**

WWI

Donald was born in South Dakota in 1892. He moved to Saskatchewan and took up a homestead adjoining the site of the village of Macrorie. He batched for many years and broke his land and farmed with oxen. In 1917, he was conscripted into the army, but reached France at the time of the Armistice and took part in mopping up operations. While training in Scotland, he met Katherine Brown, a Scotlish schoolteacher. Soon after his return to Canada, she made the trip to Saskatchewan and they were married in 1920. Donald passed away in 1980.

Ray was born in 1897 in South Dakota. He came to Canada in 1906 and attended school at Goodwill, then farmed for a few years. He joined the Royal Air Force early in 1918 and was demobilized in December of that year. He taught school for a few years. He developed an interest in tree surgery and trained at the Davy Tree Expert Co. in Kent, Ohio, and worked for them in Louisville, Kentucky until he retired. He married Florence Cherry and they had one son. Ray passed away in 1989.





# **METCALF, Winfield Homer "Bud"**

Bud was born in 1903 in South Dakota. He came to Canada in 1905 and attended Goodwill School. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1940 for ground duty and was stationed for a time in Halifax. He worked as an assistant Postmaster in Macrorie, SK, and then joined the Security Lumber Company and worked for them in many points in Saskatchewan until his retirement. He married Ellen Peters in 1928 and they had two sons. Bud passed away in 1979.

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# **MICHENER, Lloyd Albert**

WWII

Lloyd was born in Wilcox, Saskatchewan, in 1917. He completed his schooling at Craik, SK. Lloyd was working as a postal clerk in Regina, SK, before he enlisted in the Canadian Postal Corps in 1940. He served during the Second World War with the 3rd Division Postal Unit in the United Kingdom, France, Germany, Belgium and Holland and was discharged in 1946. He was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star and Defence Medal. In addition to the regular medals, Lloyd was awarded the Médaille de la Reconnaissance Française - Bronze by France. He returned to his duties with the Canada Post Office in Regina but eventually left to farm at Chelan, SK, where he married and had three children. The family relocated to farm near Craik and then, because of health issues, to Melfort, SK, where he passed away in 1969.

# MIDDLEMISS, W. Sidney "Sid"

WWII

Sid was born in Vanguard, Saskatchewan, on May 28, 1920. He enlisted in the Air Force and served in Europe during World War II. Flight Lieutenant Sid Middlemiss flew a tour of operations consisting of thirty bombing raids over Germany, twelve of which were to Berlin, the furthest and most heavily defended target. About half of the men who set foot in a bomber never returned. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and after a leave, returned and began instructing, bringing new pilots up to 4-engine aircraft from 2. He continued to instruct until war's end. He always said that the greatest missions he flew were after the war when bombers outfitted with seats and windows allowed ground crew members the opportunity to observe the results of bombing missions which destroyed factories along the Ruhr River Valley. This was a way for pilots to show their appreciation to ground crews (seven men on the ground for every one man in the air) by 'giving the boys a view' of what their efforts had achieved. Sid passed away on November 29, 1999.





MILLS, Roy J.

WWII

Roy was born on June 8, 1921 in Swift Current, Saskatchewan. He joined the RCAF as a pilot, graduating with wings, Commission and ability to land large planes on water, and a Captain's designation in 1943. He was posted to Iceland, joining Squadron 162 in "Battle of the Atlantic." He flew Cansos with his crew of eight over the Atlantic Ocean sometimes on convoy duty, but mostly searching for U-boats. He volunteered for Pacific duty, but the war ended while he and his crew were on embarkation leave and they were discharged. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion. Roy passed away on November 28, 2001.



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# **MITCHELL, James Harvey**

WWII

James was born on May 24, 1924 in Valor, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Air Force and served in Canada and England. He also served with the RNVR. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal for his service. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 17 for over fifty years. James passed away in 1995.

# **MOHAT, Francis Joseph**

WWII

Francis was born in Battleford, Saskatchewan, on October 21, 1919, to Richard and Muriel Mohat. He was the oldest of nine siblings. Francis enlisted on April 18, 1941 and was discharged in August 1946. His total service was 62 months with 55 months in the UK, Sicily, Italy, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was awarded the following medals: Italy Star, 1939-1945 Star, Defence of Britain Medal, France and Germany Star, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and the Victory Medal. Francis passed away on August 22, 1992.





MOLSTAD, William

William was born in 1915 in Neville, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army and served in Canada until his discharge. William passed away in 2006.



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# **MONTGOMERY, Douglas Monnie**


WWII

# **MORKEN, Gordon Christopher**

Gordon was born on September 4, 1922, on his parents' farm in the Wingelo District north of Glenside. He was the son of Christian and Marine Morken, originally from Norway. Gordon was one of seven children. He was farming when he enlisted in the RCAF in Saskatoon on December 10, 1942. He trained at Vulcan, AB, and served as a Leading Aircraftman at camps in Yorkton and Lachine before being deployed overseas with the 426 Squadron at Airfield Kenley in England, one of the three main fighter stations responsible for the air defence of London. Gordon had already been awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, the Overseas Bar, Defence Medal and the War Medal 1939-1945, when he was honourably discharged in Winnipeg on May 15, 1946. Upon his return to Canada, he worked as a truck driver in Regina for two years, then as a brakeman for the CPR in Outlook. He then returned to the family farm with two of his brothers. Gordon Morken and Marjorie Johnson married in 1956. They had three children: Darlene, Don and Greg. While farming, Gordon also drove a school bus from 1961 to 1982 and was always known for his sunny smile and ability to get the children to school, rain or shine. Gordon passed away on March 28, 1990 and is buried in the Outlook Cemetery.



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
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
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# MORRISON, Wesley Kenneth





# MORTON, David Samuel

David was born in Springbrook, Ontario, on May 29, 1881. He worked as a barber and listed Conquest, Saskatchewan, as his address when he enlisted at age 34 in Winnipeg on February 18, 1916 with the 78th Battalion of Canadian Expeditionary Force. Arriving overseas on The Empress of Britain on May 20, 1916, he served fifteen months in France. He was gassed twice, once at Passchendaele on October 30, 1917 and again on January 14, 1918. He also suffered gunshot wounds to his right hand, back and thigh. David was transported to Lakenham Military Hospital in Norwich to recover and was sent home to Canada where he received his discharge in Regina on April 16, 1918 at the age of 38 years, eight months. He and his wife, Harriet, farmed until 1942 when he became Postmaster in Glenside. David passed away in May 1949 and is buried in the Glenside Cemetery.



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# MOSS, Alfred Gordon





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# MURRAY, Douglas G.


WWII

WWII



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# **MYTROEN, Alfred Oswald**



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
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# **NIMEGEERS, Michael Andrew**

They lived on their homestead west of Radville, later farmed by their grandson, Robert Nimegeers. After settling in Canada, they had three more sons, Raymond (died as a young boy), Leon (died in infancy) and Walter.

Michael married Marguerite Verbeurgt on September 30, 1930. They farmed and had four children: Robert, Melvin, Shirley and Diane. In December 1939, Michael enlisted with the South Saskatchewan Regiment (SSR). Just a month later, he received a compassionate discharge upon the sudden passing of his wife in January 1940.

After settling, the four children, Robert (age 8), Melvin (6), Shirley (4) and Diane (1) at the St. Joseph's Convent in Forget, Saskatchewan, Private

Michael Nimegeers reenlisted in November 1941. He was on active duty with the home guard in Britain until the start of the Normandy campaign. He was captured at the Battle of Verrieres Ridge on July 20, 1944 and was held as a German Prisoner of War at Stalag 8B in Cieszyn, Poland. He was forced to work in a coal factory for ten months.

On January 19, 1945, as the Russians approached the camp, the Germans evacuated the prisoners and marched them west for three months, across the Sudetes Mountains, heading toward Munich. Private Michael Nimegeers was liberated by Allied forces on April 24, 1945 and returned home to Canada after the war.

Michael returned to the family farm, where he worked until his passing on May 29, 1971 at the age of 67. He was buried at the Ceylon Cemetery in Ceylon, Saskatchewan.

# NOBLE, George S.

George was born in 1923 in Neville, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Navy and served as Chief Petty Officer in Italy, the Pacific and the Mediterranean. WWII



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


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#### OWEN (SANDOR), Irene Emma


WWII

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

Norma was born on September 18,1924 on the family farm in Brooksby, Saskatchewan, to Norman and Luella Garinger. Her siblings were: Alfred, Harold, Kenneth Evan, Victor, Earl, Elmer, Helen and Cecil. She enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force (Women's Division) in January 1943, took her basic training at RCAF Station Rockcliffe in Ontario, and served in clerical roles in Ottawa, attaining the rank of Corporal. She was discharged on April 30, 1946. After the war, Norma married Andrew Panchyshyn and they took up residence in Brooksby where Norma served as Postmaster for 34 years. Norma passed away on November 29, 2008.

#### PANTON, John William "Jack"

Jack was born in 1922 on a homestead near the South Saskatchewan River. He enlisted in the Navy in Saskatoon in February 1941 and served until September 1945. Jack started his family in Eatonia and then moved to Battleford. He worked as a mechanic and bus driver until his retirement. He joined the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 70 in Battleford where he was on the executive for several years. He transferred his membership to Eatonia and then North Battleford. Jack passed away at ninety years of age in 2013.



#### PARKER, Donald "Don"

WWII

Donald was born on December 6, 1924 in Saskatoon. He and his older brother, Eric (John James Fredrick), went to Caswell School and Saskatoon Technical Collegiate. In September 1943, he joined the Canadian Army at #12 District Depot, Regina, SK, and took Basic Artillery Training (Gunner) at Brandon. Don sailed for England on the British Troop ship, Andes, not in a Convoy. Ten days later they landed in Southampton on December 4, 1944. He was attached to 13 +2/14 Canadian Field Reg. In 1945, he went to Utrecht, Holland then Germany near Oldenburg, going from town to town rounding up German Prisoners of War; then to the navel barrack at Wilhelmshaven, releasing Germans back to civilian life. Due to sickness, he was sent to hospital near Brennan, then to 22<sup>nd</sup> General Hospital at Bramshott, England. On March 22, 1946, he left on hospital ship, Lady Rodney, for Canada. The screened top deck housed mental patients; second deck, pregnant English war brides; bottom deck was for wounded or sick soldiers. After about fourteen days at sea, they docked in Halifax, then took the hospital train to Regina. Don was discharged on May 1, 1946. He married and had three children. Don died on August 26, 2009 and is buried in Saskatoon Woodlawn Cemetery.

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#### PATTERSON, Robert Andrew

WWII

Robert was born on December 30, 1921 in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in May 1941 and received his wings at Claresholm in February 1942. He went to England in March 1942. On the night of November 22, 1942, he was practicing solo night flying when his plane was involved in a midair collision with a spitfire craft, both pilots were killed. The crash site was two miles north of Lissett Airfield, near Barmston East Yorkshire, England. Robert was buried in St. Mary's Churchyard, Brandesburton, Yorkshire, England, on November 26, 1946.

#### PAYNE, Raymond "Kirk"

WWII

Kirk was born on September 14, 1924 in Neville, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Navy and served aboard the HMCS Lachute and the HMS King George V. He received the 1939-1945 Star, the Atlantic Star, the Africa Star, the Italy Star, the Defence Medal, and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal. He also received the WWII Artic Campaign Medal, which was presented many years after the war by the Russian Ambassador in Toronto. Kirk passed away in 1999.



#### **PEACHY, Clarence**

WWI

Clarence was born in Collingwood, Ontario, on June 17, 1887, to Daniel and Kathleen Peachy. The family moved to farm in the Bratton area in 1915. Shortly after, the oldest son Clarence enlisted in Moose Jaw on July 28, 1915 at age eighteen with the 3<sup>rd</sup> Canadian Pioneers, Canadian Expeditionary Force. He saw action in France with the 46<sup>th</sup> Battalion for eleven months beginning on March 9, 1916. He suffered gunshot wounds to his right leg during action at Ypres on April 22, 1916 and later mustard gas in November 1917. During convalescence in hospital at Monks Horton, Kent, he developed bronchitis and pneumonia and was invalided back to Canada on September 24, 1918 where he was discharged in Regina on January 17, 1919. He joined the RNWMP shortly after. He served only briefly, and died in March 1919 at age 22.



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
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
#### PEARSON, Alfred Edsel




#### PEARSON, Axel Peter

He received an Honourable Discharge in 1944. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Abernethy Branch for 39 years. Albert passed away in 1984.

#### PECK, Edward J.

#### **PEACETIME**

Edward was born in 1951 in Balcarres, Saskatchewan. He joined the Royal Canadian Navy in 1969 and received his basic training in Cornwallis, ON. He spent one year on HMCS Gatineau and then onto HMCS Provider in Esquimalt. His tour of duty took him to California, Sidney, Australia, Christ Church, New Zealand, Island of Tonga and the Hawaiian Islands. He retired from the Navy in 1973 and returned to civilian life. Edward passed away in 2003 in Nanaimo, BC.



#### PEEL, Alfred "Alf"

Alf was born near Foam Lake, Saskatchewan, in the Ladstock District of Saskatchewan. He served from 1944 to 1946 with Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in Italy, Holland, Belgium and in occupied Germany. He returned home and farmed. Later, he lived in Foam Lake. Alf has been a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Foam Lake Branch 16.

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
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PEEL, Ernie WWII

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#### PEPPER, Frank


WWI

Frank was born in Leiston, Suffolk, England, in 1882. As a young man he apprenticed as a machinist prior to immigrating to Canada in 1904. He returned to England in 1909 to marry the love of his life, Agnes Ransby, thereafter returning with Agnes to homestead at Holbein, SK, near Prince Albert. Frank enlisted in the Army on May 6, 1916 in Prince Albert and served in the Canadian 44th Battalion under British command as part of the Canadian Expeditionary Force. He suffered war-ending injuries at Vimy Ridge on May 10, 1917 when he was hit by a shell, severely injuring his right arm and both legs. Frank received an Honourable Discharge on June 1, 1918. He was honoured to receive a British War Medal and a Victory Medal for his service. No longer able to farm, Frank returned home and made his career as a telephone operator at Shellbrook, SK. Frank and Agnes raised three boys and three girls. Frank passed away on March 3, 1963.

WWII


Frederick was born in 1914 in Rozilee, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army and served with the RCOC as Staff Sergeant in Regina during the war. He was a Chartered Accountant. Frederick passed away in 2003.



PERRY, John

John was born on August 19, 1921 in Regina, Saskatchewan. He joined the Canadian Army Active in November 1942 and became a Signaler in the Artillery. He served in England, France, Holland, Belgium and Germany until his discharge in February 1946 with the Rank of Lance Corporal. He was an active member of The Royal Canadian Legion for about thirty years. John passed away in November 1984. In 2003, his wife received the Dutch Medal, which was given in recognition of the Canadians who freed Holland.





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#### PETERSON, Wallace Russell

WWII

Wallace was born to Jens and (Inger) Marie Peterson on September 5, 1920, the youngest of ten; he had four sisters and five brothers. Wallace was a very shy, kind, young man, but loved to tease. He attended Great West School and the Peterson homestead was just southwest of Radville.

His nieces and nephews remember him as a "protector" – he always looked out for them when they walked to school. Even though he was ten years older than most of them, he always had fun with them sliding down the hills and using Wallace's skis. They were a musical family, with many memories of brother Elvin playing guitar and brother Edgar on the violin. But on Saturday nights, everyone knew not to bother Wallace as he loved hockey and he always listened to the Saturday night hockey games on the radio.

The Peterson family worked hard on their farm, everyone pitching in to help with the big garden and raising their special turkeys. Wallace, being the youngest, got special attention from all his sisters. Sundays included extra roast beef or chicken for supper because someone was always invited over – friends, relatives or neighbours.

Wallace loved to hunt and trap skunks and weasels to sell the skins and he had a special knack for butchering the turkeys.

Wallace worked on the family farm until he joined the Army in 1942. He was a member of the Calgary Highlanders and while training in British Columbia, he had met a special girlfriend there.

After one last visit home and just before he went overseas, Wallace's niece remembers climbing into the car with him to take him to Regina. They never dreamed it would be the last time they saw him.

Every letter he wrote home has been kept – some parts blacked out by his commanders.

On July 25, 1944, Wallace died leading troops into a small community. He was killed by a German sniper nine miles south of Caen. He was 24 years old.

He is buried in Bretteville-sur-Laize Canadian War Cemetery in Calvados, France. Soldiers buried there were part of the later stages of the Battle of Normandy, the capture of Caen and the thrust southwards to close the Falaise Gap and seal off the German divisions fighting desperately to escape being trapped west of the Seine. There are about three thousand allied soldiers commemorated at this site.

Wallace's brother, Hjelmer, visited the cemetery with his daughter, Ruth Bailey, in 1975 when Hjelmer was 77 years old. They spent four hours there, Hjelmer took photos of every grave he found from the Weyburn/Radville and areas. When they returned home, he visited the parents of every fallen soldier and gave them the photo of their gravestone.

#### **PICKERELL, Charles Walker**

WWII

Charles was born in Leslie, Saskatchewan, in 1921. He was one of six brothers in the service at the same time. He enlisted in the Army on October 29, 1942 and served with the No. 12 District Depot in Canada. He was discharged on September 1, 1943. Charles passed away in 1990.



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#### PIKE, Ronald Malcolm

WWII

Ronald was born in Forest Bank, Saskatchewan, in 1917. He served in the Army in Canada, England and in Europe during World War II. Ronald was a farmer. He was very active in the community and was a member of many organizations. He was a Life Member of The Royal Canadian Legion and Board Member on Waseca Credit Union for more than forty years. Ronald passed away on October 25, 1996.

#### **PORTER, Charles Rae**

WWII

Rae was born in Edmonton, Alberta, on April 26, 1921. He and his mother moved to Turtleford in 1931. Rae enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force on December 14, 1940. He was stationed in Brandon, Regina, Medicine Hat and Halifax. Graduating as a pilot, he was posted overseas to England in 1941 and flew Spitfires for the Royal Air Force. He was also posted to Bombay, India, where he was killed in action in 1944. Rae was reported missing on April 25, 1944 while flying over mountainous areas in support of forward troops. Described by his Wing Commander of the 62<sup>nd</sup> Squadron as his best pilot and one of his most capable officers, at this time Rae was a Flying Officer. Rae's name is on the Singapore Memorial. His decorations include the Burma Star, Defence Medal 1939-1945, Star for Action, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and the Cross of Valour.





PRATT, David

WWII

David enlisted in the RCAF in 1940. He transferred to Britain in 1941 where he flew bombers for the RAF at Flagstrome. He was killed in action in May 1943 when his plane was in a fight with a German plane. There was a mid-air collision over the North Sea.

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
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#### **PRATT, Harvey Edward**

WWII

Harvey was born in 1908 in Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Canadian Army during the Second World War. He received the War Medal 1939-1945, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, the 1939-1945 Defence Medal, the 1939-1945 Star, the France and Germany Star and the Italy Star. Harvey passed away in 1971.

#### PRICE, Irvin L.

WWII

Irvin was born in 1911 in Abernethy, Saskatchewan. He joined the Army in Regina in 1940 and trained in Canada and England. He saw active duty in Sicily, Italy, Germany, France and Belgium and served with the 14<sup>th</sup> Field Company, RCE building Bailey bridges and repairing roads. In Belgium, he injured his knee while playing football. He returned to England for surgery and was then sent home in July 1945. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Abernethy Branch 26 for 53 years. Irvin passed away in 2001.



#### PROSKO, Emil

WWII

Emil was born on August 22, 1921 in Watson, Saskatchewan. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in October 1942 and served as an Air Force Mechanic in Canada. After the war, he joined The Royal Canadian Legion Watson 272 Branch. He held several executive offices and was presented with a Life Membership in 1998. Emil passed away on August 22, 2000.




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#### PROSKO, Peter Paul

WWII



On August 12, 1943, he joined the Artillery in Regina and served in Infantry in France, England, Belgium, Germany and Holland. He was attached to the American Army in the Battle of the Bulge in the Ardennes Forest. He received the 1939-1945 Star, the France and Germany Star, the George VI DG Medal and the 1939-1945 Volunteer Service Award. He was discharged on March 8, 1946. George passed away in 2003.



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Arthur was born in Nokomis, Saskatchewan, on February 18, 1918. He enlisted in the Canadian Army in the fall of 1940, at age 22, and went to Regina for training. In spring 1941, he was sent overseas where he survived ground action in Europe.

Betty was born on August 18, 1925 in Bethnal Green, London, England.

At the end of the war in 1945, they met at a dance in England and they married later that year at an Anglican Church in Thundersley on December 22, 1945.

In spring 1946, Art was discharged from service and sent home. Betty came to Canada in August 1946 as a war bride on the ship "Aguitania". She landed at Pier 21 and made the rest of her trip by train to Regina.

Betty authored two books <u>Eve's Daughters</u> and <u>The Ragman</u>. One of her first writings was "O Canada" which is placed at the War Museum in England. Betty loved painting and did some amazing portraits and landscapes. She learned the tailoring trade working in a factory during the war. Her greatest love was her husband Art, her family and extended family.

Art received the French Medal for bravery and was knighted. He went to Chicago on his way back to visit his mother, Ida, and then came by train back to Canada. Art is a sixty-year member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 290 in Nokomis. Art received a birthday card from Queen Elizabeth for reaching his milestone 100<sup>th</sup> birthday in 2018.

Betty passed away on September 25, 2019 at Manitou Lodge, Watrous, SK at the age of 94.



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
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#### RANGER, Jean Baptiste



#### **RAYMES, Daniel Francis**

Daniel was born in Saskatoon on March 28, 1918. After graduating from Bedford Road Collegiate, he worked for the CNR. He enlisted in the RCAF on April 15, 1940, at the age of 22, and trained at Manning Depot in Toronto and Moose Jaw Flying School. His first solo flight occurred on June 5, 1940. Flying Officer Raymes also trained at Camp Borden and Patricia Bay. In six short months he went from his first solo flight in a Tiger Moth to becoming an operational pilot, protecting Canada's east coast from German submarines, escorting convoys and performing search missions. He flew a number of Goose Bay-Reykjavik missions. On October 30, 1942, he and his crew sank a German U520 submarine. His last wartime trip took place on June 27, 1945. The Saskatoon Star-Phoenix reported: "Singled out for special mention after attacks on enemy submarines, Flying Officer D. F. 'Danny' Raymes is awarded the Air Force Cross." Post-war, he was employed by Trans Canada Airlines (TCA), as well as moving to Jamaica in 1969 to help get fledgling Air Jamaica established. He married Lialla Henderson of Bounty in 1943. They had a son, Daniel. Daniel died on October 31, 1993.





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#### **RAYMOND, Carole Johanne Marie**

Carole was born in St. Hubert, Quebec in 1959. She serves with the RCMP.

#### **REA**, Gilbert Peever

WWII

Gilbert was born on July 2, 1918 in Deloraine, Manitoba. He enrolled with the Army at the #10 District Depot, Royal Canadian Artillery in Winnipeg on November 14, 1941. He served in Canada, the United Kingdom, Continental Europe and the Central Mediterranean until his discharge on November 13, 1945 in Winnipeg. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, 1939-1945 Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star and the Defence Medal. Gilbert passed away in 2000.






#### **READ**, Walker Fuller

#### REDDEN, Ernest Edward


WWI

#### **REGIMBAL, Alfred Emile**

Alfred was born on June 15, 1918 in Lafleche, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the RCAF in 1940 and trained as a pilot at Trenton, ON. After his training he was stationed in Calgary, Alberta, as an instructor. While flying on a training mission over Cochrane, AB, with an American student pilot, Leading Aircraftsman Quentin Burl Chase of Wichita, Kansas, their plane struck an unmarked cable across the Bow River and crashed, killing both airmen. Alfred is buried in Lafleche. A cairn was erected in their memory on the old Banff Highway, 28 miles west of Calgary, adjacent to the site of the accident.



#### **REGIMBAL, Wilfred Henry**

WWII

Wilfred was born on August 27, 1916 in Lafleche, Saskatchewan. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in June 1941 and instructed at No. 15 EFTS in Regina before going overseas. Wilfred and a crew comprised of four Canadians and one British airman were reported missing after an aerial combat on November 22, 1944. On March 10, 1945, official word was received by his family that the aircraft had crashed in the Monschau Forest near Rocherath, Belgium. The crew was buried at Rheinberg, Germany. Regimbal Bay is named in his honour.



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
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#### **REICHERT, Joseph Stanley**

Joseph Stanley Reichert was born west of the village of Glenside on December 16, 1921, the youngest son of nine children born to Paul and Mary Reichert who emigrated from Russia in 1911. He and his siblings attended the Geneva one-room school. Joe enlisted in the RCAF in 1942 and earned an Aircrew Mechanic Rating. He then went on to obtain his Grade IX diploma. By the time he re-enlisted, World War II was ending. He married Naldera Harrington in 1946 and they had three children: Allen, Richard and Priscilla. After farming until 1959, the family moved to Outlook where Joe was a businessman until his retirement. Naldera passed away in 2012 and Joe in 2014. He is buried in the Outlook Cemetery.

Ernest was born in 1890 in Holmfield, Manitoba. He enlisted with the Army during the First World War and served with the Wadena Wildcats in the CFC, CEF in Canada, England and France. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Leslie Branch. Ernest passed away in 1960.





#### **REYNOLDS, William Franklin**

WWII

William was born in 1922 in Leslie, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army and served with the 8<sup>th</sup> Canadian Reconnaissance in Canada, the United Kingdom and Continental Europe. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Leslie Branch 172 for 54 years. William passed away in 2000.



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#### RICHARDSON, Fred


WWII

WWII



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
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#### **RIDDELL, James Bodie**



He received Chief of the Defence Staff commendation for calmly assisting in giving first aid and preparing the observers for evacuation when enroute in Bosnia.



#### **ROCKEY, Arthur John**

Arthur was born on September 26, 1916 in Lynthorpe, Saskatchewan. He volunteered for service on August 14, 1942 in Regina. He served in the United Kingdom, Belgium, France, Holland and in occupied Germany with the 73<sup>rd</sup> Battery, 5<sup>th</sup> Field Regiment until August 7, 1944 when the 5<sup>th</sup> Field broke up and the 6<sup>th</sup> Field took over. He served with the South Saskatchewan Regiment until the war's end. He was discharged from active service on January 4, 1946. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Glentworth Branch for 47 years. Arthur passed away on July 9, 1995.

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#### **ROLLINGS, Basil Robert**

WWII

Basil joined the Canadian Army in November 1940 and trained in communications. He served overseas in England, France, Germany and Holland. Basil received the following medals: the 1939-1945 Star and Clasp, the France and Germany Star, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, the Defence Medal and the War Medal 1939-1945. Basil was on the first wave at the Beaches of Normandy. On December 8, 1945 Basil married Vera May King from London, England. After discharge they returned to Canada and made their home in Yorkton. Basil passed away on June 25, 1994.

#### ROMANOSKI, Joseph Frederick "Joe"

Joseph was born at Valeport, Saskatchewan on February 26, 1919, son of Frederick and Julia Romanoski. The family later moved to Lumsden, SK. 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
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
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#### ROSS, E. Roman


#### **WWI & WWII**

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
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#### **SAMPLE, Alexander Ernest**


WWI


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#### John Alexander Sandor and Josephine Lydia Taylor

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
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#### SCHROH, Gregory Dean

#### **SEALY, Aubrey George**

Aubrey was born in Chippenham, County Wiltshire, England, on January 17, 1872 to parents Horatio and Annie Hall Sealy. He homesteaded in the Bratton area along with his brother, John Alexander Sealy, who was also a World War I Veteran, around 1906. He worked as a Postmaster, carpenter and farmhand in the Bratton area before he enlisted at age 43 in Moose Jaw on February 28, 1916. He was a widower with three children at the time. Prior to enlistment in Canada, George had served six years with the Royal Engineers in England. He served 23 months in France with the 50<sup>th</sup> Battalion Canadian Infantry where he was hospitalized at Havre with severe bronchitis and rheumatism as a result of long periods of standing in the trenches. Aubrey was discharged in Regina on March 12, 1919. After the war, he was appointed to the Soldier Settlement Board and worked in Foam Lake and Kindersley where he passed away in 1937.

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#### **SEALY, John Alexander**

WWI

John was born in London, England, on August 13, 1881, to parents Horatio and Annie Hall Sealy. He homesteaded in the Bratton area along with his brother, Aubrey George Sealy, who was also a World War I Veteran, around 1906. He listed his occupation as a bricklayer when he enlisted in the Army with Canadian Expeditionary Force 46<sup>th</sup> Battalion Canadian Infantry, in Saskatoon on October 7, 1915. During his service overseas, he fought for nine months in France before he was killed in action on May 4, 1917 near Vimy, France, at age 36. Less than a month earlier, he had fought at Vimy Ridge. He is buried in Villers Station Cemetery near Villers-au-Bois, France. Inscribed on his tombstone are the words: "In proud, loving remembrance."

#### SHAW, Thelma Grace

WWII

Thelma was born in 1921 in Tate, Saskatchewan. She enlisted with the CWAC and served a total of 21 months as a store woman at 10<sup>th</sup> Area Signals, in Vancouver, BC. She received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and the 1939-1945 War Medal. She was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Pierceland Branch 178. Thelma passed away in 1963.





#### SHELTON, Frank Henry "Harry"

WWII

Frank Henry Shelton, known locally as Harry, was born on August 20, 1918. He grew up on the family farm in the Rural Municipality of Snipe Lake, in the Isham area of Saskatchewan. He served his country in World War II as a member of the Saskatoon Light Infantry Battalion. Frank was posted overseas for 5 ½ years in England and mainland Europe, in particular Italy. After the war, he returned home and took over the management of the family farm. He married Dorothy Elizabeth Bayne and the couple had one daughter, Louise. Frank passed away on August 27, 1998 at the age of eighty.

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#### **Aaron W. Shoaf and Mabel Humphries**

#### A Canadian Veteran and His War Bride



Aaron was born in 1918 in Brightsand Lake, Saskatchewan, one of ten children. He was raised in a farming environment. He enlisted in the RCA in July 1942 and arrived in England in January 1945, where he spent the duration of the war. He was formally discharged in Regina in April 1946.

Mabel was born in 1924 in Surrey, England. She enlisted in the British Army in September 1941 with the Auxiliary Territorial Service (also known as the A.T.S.) Division. She also served until the end of the war and was formally discharged in March 1946.

Aaron and Mabel met during the war and were married in January 1946, prior to Aaron's demobilization back to Canada.

Mabel left England in June 1946 aboard the SS Letitia from the port of Liverpool and arrived in the port of Halifax, Nova Scotia, ten days later. She traveled by train across Canada arriving in Kelowna, BC, on July 1, 1946, where they returned to civilian life.

In January 1947, Aaron and Mabel moved to Meadow Lake where they remained for the duration of their lives, raising their seven children and serving their community. Mabel served her community through her dedication and active involvement in The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 76 and the Ladies Auxiliary, serving as an executive member in both service clubs for many years before retiring from active participation due to illness.

Aaron worked in logging camps during the first part of his married life, then as a carpenter throughout the duration of his lifetime. He was active in supporting The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 76, volunteering his services assisting with the boys' boxing and ball clubs, and providing much produce from his large garden for fundraisers in support of The Legion and the community. In his capacity of carpentry, he volunteered his time to help build a variety of structures in the town, as well as repairing carpentry problems for seniors for 'no charge' during his retirement years.

Aaron passed away on March 30, 1995 and after a long illness, and Mabel passed away in November 2002.



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#### SIMMONS, Earl Kenneth "Ken"


WWII

Gabby enjoyed his morning coffee with friends, walking his dogs, telling a story and making anyone smile. He passed away on March 17, 2016.

Geoff was born on November 15, 1913 to Stephen Scott Smith and Eleanor May on the family homestead in the Last Mountain District. He married Margaret McNeill, a teacher, in 1939. #### **RESERVES & AFGHANISTAN**



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




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#### STAGE, Joseph Bell


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Joseph was born in Howden, England, on September 4, 1882 to parents William and Jane Stage. He arrived in Canada on September 13, 1911 with his wife Elizabeth and their two children, Joseph and Christiana. Joseph Sr. was working in Moose Jaw as a boilermaker when he enlisted on October 27, 1914, serving with the 28<sup>th</sup> Battalion, ending up near Shorncliff, England. His battalion left for the front lines in France on September 17, 1915. His wife and children, who had followed him to England, travelled to Calais, France, to be near him but were eventually persuaded to return to Canada. Joseph was wounded twice and partially buried in an air raid. He stayed alive by pulling his collar away from his throat so he could breathe. His loving wife, mistakenly informed that he had been killed, set off for France and found him alive, although badly injured. He suffered from what was then called 'shell shock' and was hospitalized for a month. After the war, the family relocated from Moose Jaw to Outlook. Elizabeth became ill in 1921, needing intensive treatment in Rochester. They subsequently moved to Santa Monica, California, where Joseph purchased a service station. He died on February 2, 1958 and is buried at San Bernardino.

#### STANDFIELD, Ralph Lewis

#### **WWII & PEACETIME**

Ralph was born in Craik, Saskatchewan, on January 7, 1922. He enlisted in the Navy and served during World War II on various ships: HMCS Chignecto in the Pacific; HMCS Giffard on the North Sea and in the North Atlantic; HMCS Queen, HMCS Tecumseh, HMCS Antigonish, HMCS Sioux and the HMCS Malahat. He was discharged after World War II on February 7, 1945, having served as Leading Seaman and Leading Torpedo Operator. He re-enlisted in April 1951 and received his final discharge in April 1956 as Petty Officer 1st Class. Ralph passed away on May 14, 2008.





#### STEPHENS (McEWEN), Audrey Hope

Audrey was born in October 1921. As her brothers joined the Air Force, she chose to serve her country too. She served "overseas" in Gander, NL, and Dartmouth, NS. She did aircraft reconnaissance (radar spotting), and then identified sunken ships and planes to ensure everyone was accounted for after the war. After the war, she enrolled at the U of S, convocating with her Household Science and Education degrees. She met her husband Jonathan at his brother Gordon's and Elizabeth's wedding while working at Fort San as the dietitian. Elizabeth loved to relate that he immediately picked her out in her beautiful green suit and said, "that's the girl I'm going to marry." They had five daughters. In later years, Audrey and Jonathan enjoyed travelling to the UK, Hawaii, Florida and Alaska, Audrey passed away on June 4, 2019.

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#### **Kenneth Earl Styles and Dorothy Florence May Treweek**

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Kenneth was born west of Penzance, Saskatchewan, in 1919. He enlisted with the Army in 1941 in Regina. Following his training, he headed for the United Kingdom, and then to France, Holland, Belgium, and Germany, where he served with the L of C Signals, Royal Canadian Corps of Signals. He returned to Canada and was discharged on November 27, 1945 in Regina. He was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star, Defence Medal and War Medal 1939-1945.

Dorothy was born in London, England, on January 18, 1923. She lived there until 1941 when her mother moved her family of six to Colchester hoping to escape the Blitz. Her father, in the Naval Reserve, died accidentally at work during a blackout in June 1940.

Dorothy met Kenneth during a blackout. He escorted her home and she agreed to meet him again. They spent all their free time together in the winter and spring of 1942-1943. They were married on June 20, 1943 at All Saints Church in Colchester, Essex County, England. On their wedding day, they had their wedding meal off the top of an air raid shelter. Her mother had saved rations for the cake. It lost the top layer in a noisy air raid, but her mother stuck it on again and no one noticed.

She left Southampton, England, on July 19, 1946 on the Queen Mary with daughter Patricia, aged two, and son Clifford, aged five months. They arrived at Pier 21 in Halifax, Nova Scotia, on July 23, 1946 and travelled to Craik, Saskatchewan. Another son, Wayne, was born later in Saskatchewan.

Kenneth was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Craik Branch for 48 years.

Dorothy passed away on July 16, 2006, and is buried in Craik, Saskatchewan with Ken who passed away on May 12, 2001.




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
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
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#### SWERHUN, John

He was sent overseas to the United Kingdom on August 3, 1944. Flying RAF Hurricanes and Spitfires, he served with the following fighter squadrons: #541, #41 and #51. He returned to Canada on August 12, 1945 and was discharged on September 21, 1945. Harold was awarded the Defence Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, and the 1939-1945 War Medal. Harold passed away on January 15, 2009 in Saskatoon.



#### TILLIE, George McDougall

WWII

George was born in Carmichael, Scotland, on December 27, 1918. He immigrated to Canada with his family in March 1927 to the family farm in the Mortlach district of Saskatchewan. George took his pretraining in Regina with the KORC and enlisted in the Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps on June 18, 1941. After training in Canada, he was shipped overseas arriving in the United Kingdom on August 18, 1942. Upon arrival in the UK, George was attached to the 4<sup>th</sup> Canadian Armoured Division as a Driver Mechanic. George saw service in England, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. Upon his discharge in January 1946, George returned to farming and bought the family farm in 1955. He worked on the farm and raised his family there before retiring in 1979. George was a great 'tinkerer' and was able to fix almost anything. A quiet man who didn't say much with words but was still able to get his point across. George passed away on May 16, 2007 and is buried in the soldiers' plot of Rosedale Cemetery in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan.

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#### **TUCKER, Bertram John**

WWI


John Bertram Tucker, the eldest son of John and Martha Tucker in Devonshire, England, was born on November 3, 1893. He was working as a teller-accountant at the Union Bank of Canada in Bounty, Saskatchewan before he enlisted on September 21, 1914 at Valcartier with the Ammunition Column of the 1st Field Artillery Brigade. He was among the first men to enlist in Canada after the call for volunteers in August 1914. He was single and 20 years old at the time. In February 1915, he crossed to France and was present at the Battle of Ypres where the Germans used gas for the first time. On June 13, 1916, after repairing his signal wires four times under intense enemy fire, John Tucker was mortally wounded and died at a Casualty Station from gunshot wounds to both legs, his wrists and hands. For his service, he earned a Memorial Cross. He is commemorated at the Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery in Belgium.

#### **VAN STEINBURG, Gordon**

#### **WWII & PEACETIME**

Gordon was born in Moosomin, Saskatchewan, in September 1920. He served as a Dispatcher in the Army during World War II. He farmed for a while but reenlisted in the Air Force in 1954 to 1970 during peacetime. He was an air-frame technician working in the salvage crew. He travelled to many places where the jets crashed to fix them or else bury them. He returned to Moosomin after he retired and worked in the Moosomin Care Home until he passed away very suddenly on March 4, 1978.





#### **VAUDNER, Wilson Woodrow**

WWII

Wilson was born in 1915. He enlisted in the Air Force in 1943 and served during World War II. He trained in Canada as Flight Sergeant, Air Gunner. He was posted to Britain and following leave, joined the RAF Squadron, stationed in India. He was flying in a Liberator Aircraft #EW124 which failed to return. He was thirty years old. He has no known grave. His name in inscribed on Singapore War Memorial in Malaya. A small Saskatchewan lake north of Lloydminster, east of Cold Lake, Alberta, is named in his honour. He left behind his father and mother, Bill and Margaret Vaudner, and brothers Rancellor, Art and twin brother Wilfred from Assiniboia, SK.





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#### **VAXVICK**, Kalmer

WWII

Kalmer Vaxvick was born on the family homestead south of Glenside on June 30, 1912. He helped on the family farm and worked in a number of places in Saskatchewan, mainly as a self-taught mechanic. Hard times in the 1930's sent him to Ontario in search of work. However, he never lost his love for the farm. During World War II, he served with the RCAF, posted in England as ground crew for Lancaster bombers. He remembers meeting the young princesses Elizabeth and Margaret riding their bikes near a hangar where he was working. After the war, he married Mary McPherson. They spent most of their married lives in Scarborough. The couple enjoyed travel vacations to Hawaii, Cuba, the Bahamas and Florida. Kalmer died in 2006 at the age of 93. He is buried in Green Valley Lutheran Church Cemetery, southwest of Glenside, near the family homestead.

#### **VERAAS**, Audfinn

wwii

Audfinn Veraas was born on June 11, 1924 in Lindas, Norway, to Frederick and Anna Veraas. The Veraas family moved to Strongfield where they operated a store and farmed. Audfinn was working in Regina as a mechanic when he enlisted in the RCAF on July 17, 1942. Flight Sergeant Veraas was attached to 102 Squadron based in Full Sutton, Yorkshire. This heavy bomber squadron was active from the second day of World War II. Its early missions included dropping anti-Nazi leaflets in raids over Germany, followed by thousands of bombing raids as the war progressed. Audfinn Veraas' Hanley Page Halifax bomber failed to return from a bombing raid over Hamburg on July 30, 1943. Audfinn was nineteen. Flight Sergeant Audfinn Veraas is commemorated at Runnymede Memorial near London.



VIETS, Alexander Griswold

**BOER WAR & WWI** 

Alexander Griswold Viets was born on April 25, 1878 in Digby, Nova Scotia. His parents were John Moors and Jane Snow Viets. He served in the Boer War with the 3<sup>rd</sup> Canadian Rifles. As a reward for that service he was granted land in Western Canada. In 1908, he was working as a bookkeeper in Moose Jaw when he received his land grant. He moved to Outlook, Saskatchewan, in 1909 where he worked for Outlook Realty and became the first Town Secretary. He was also Warden at St. Mark's Anglican Church. He joined the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry on September 3, 1914. A mortar bomb landed beside him at Ypres Salient in May of 1915, destroying his eyes and wounding his face, arms and legs. After recovery, he became the first soldier blinded in WWI to return to Canada. He married Mary Elizabeth Moody on April 25, 1917. Alexander Viets worked for an insurance company until his death on April 22, 1949. He is buried in Mount Pleasant Cemetery in Toronto. Viets was instrumental in founding the Canadian National Institute for the Blind.



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
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
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#### WAKELAM, Donald Thomas "Don"

Donald was born on January 9, 1927 in Regina to Thomas and Mabel (Perras) Wakelam. He grew up in Regina and graduated from Central Collegiate in 1946. He began his career working at the Canadian Bank of Commerce in southern Saskatchewan before joining the Canadian Army in 1949, serving in the Royal Canadian Army Pay Corps. Don served in Churchill (where he also volunteered as a radio announcer at Station CHFC), Vancouver, Regina, Washington, DC (at the Canadian embassy), Ottawa (where he was involved in the very early years of computer pay systems) and Calgary, where he retired from the military in 1974. Subsequently he worked for Greyhound Lines of Canada, when he was a founding member and past Chairman of the Canadian Payroll Association, retiring in 1987 as Director of Payroll Services. Don was President of Calgary Canukeena, and as an avid model railroader, was a member of Cal-O-Rail for over thirty years and served on the Board of the Calgary Model Railway Society. Don was also a volunteer for 26 years at Spruce Meadows and served as a Ring Master for national and international events. He was a life-long reader and especially enjoyed military history and current events. He married his high school sweetheart, Sharon Mona Smith, in Regina in 1951. Don passed away on May 29, 2019.

#### WALKER, Alexander

WWI

Alexander Walker was born to John and Miriam Walker of Bo'ness Falkirk, Scotland, on July 5, 1894. He was working as a bank clerk in Outlook when he enlisted in Winnipeg on November 22, 1915, at the age of 21. He served in France with the 43<sup>rd</sup> Battalion, Manitoba Regiment, from November 14, 1916 until he died at 10 Casualty Clearing Station of a massive gunshot wound to his thigh on October 26, 1917 at the Battle of Passchendaele; he was assigned to the Cameron Highlanders of Canada at the time. A Memorial Cross was presented to his mother, Miriam Walker. Private Alexander Walker is commemorated at Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery in Belgium.



#### **WALKER, Robert Andrew**

RESERVES

Robert was born in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, on July 1, 1934. He served with the 1<sup>st</sup> North Saskatchewan Regiment Reserve, Saskatchewan Reserve Army Band from October 1954 to September 1959. Canada's Reserve Army in the 1950's was comprised of many WWII officers and NCOs as leaders and trainers. Colonel Hal Tucker OC wanted a reserve army marching band to raise reserve army profile and encourage enlistment. Charlie Thompson was a WWII tankman who entertained troops in dance and concert bands in Britain. His music started at age five in the Salvation Army band. By age ten he was tunneling in a Welsh coal mine and playing trombone, trumpet or any horn in a postwar Prince Albert city band. Charlie created a very prominent band playing Remembrance Day service, Prince Albert and Saskatoon Exhibition Travellers Day parades, Regina Armories concerts, Prince Albert National Park Waskesiu concerts, Saskatchewan 50<sup>th</sup> year golden jubilee, Tisdale with the RCMP musical ride and glowing reviews when the critics reviewed the band's opera presentation at the Prince Albert Music Festival. Sadly in 1949, Government austerity cancelled reserve army bands. As a Veteran, he continues his 47 years of Legion service with a Lifetime Membership award in 2018.

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### WALTON, Thomas Alfred "Tom"

WWII

Thomas Alfred Walton was born in Hamilton, Ontario, in 1923. He grew up in Hamilton and was a commercial artist with Reid Press in Hamilton when he enlisted in the RCAF in 1941 and trained as radio operator for 2.5 years. Tom trained in Guelph, Ontario, in Canada and in Bournemouth, England on Tiger Moths bi-planes for radio training graduating to the Wellington (Wimpy) bomber. After the Wellington, he flew in the Halifax Bomber and then the Lancaster. His rank when posted to England was Flight Sergeant. He flew missions out of various bases with 428 Ghost Squadron in England with his main base being Middleton St. George. Tom had 21 missions, some of the more memorable to Gelsenkinkin Oil Refinery, Dresden, Gauge Factory, and Chemnitz in Germany.

One of the more memorable events occurred on a mission to Hagen, Germany at the beginning of December 1944 where icing caused their Lancaster to crash and the crew having to bail out. Tom landed safely in France in the allied controlled area and with the assistance of the French people and later the US Army returned to England in early December. He said the French people were

very helpful and accommodating. He did not return to his base prior to his family receiving a telegram that he was missing after the mission. Happily, a few days later upon his return to base, his family received a follow-up telegram on December 7 and later a letter dated December 11, 1944 that he had returned safely to his unit. Within a few days he was back in the air once again flying missions over Europe and Germany. Tom was promoted and finished his service with the rank of Flight Officer.


As a graphic artist, Tom was very talented. Being a graphic artist, when serving overseas he painted nose art on the planes, a common practice by air crews during the war. His work on aircraft Nose Art has made him quite well known in the field, his Lancaster being "Sugars Blues", featured a redhead in a green dress on the pilots side of the plane and a Ghost holding a bomb "for 428 Ghost Squadron" on the opposite side of the nose. Sugars Blues was a well known RCAF Lancaster and numerous photos are in the archives. A copy of the nose art is painted on a replica nose section of a Lancaster on exhibit at the Nanton Bomber Command Museum of Canada in Nanton, Alberta.

After returning home in 1946, Tom met and married Millie, his wife of 65 years. Tom returned to his graphic artist career and he and Millie had two sons. He later moved to Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, to pursue his graphic arts career, eventually retiring and then traveling with his wife, enjoying holidays to the southern US. Tom and his son moved to Elliot Lake, Ontario, where he enjoyed the fishing and being in a smaller center experiencing all the wildlife and being close to nature.

WARD, Sidney

WWII

Sidney was born in Saskatchewan. He served with the Regina Rifle Regiment from 1941 to 1946. He lost one leg from a land mine in 1944. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Foam Lake Branch 16. Sidney passed away in 1992.



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
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
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### **WARREN, Earle Freeman**

WWII

Earle and his brother Doug settled in Radville along with their parents, John and Mae Warren, in 1928. Doug and Earle were excellent sportsmen, both playing in hockey, softball, baseball, rugby, soccer, tennis and track and field. One old Radville Newspaper headline states: "Doug Warren Sweeps all Events Entered" after one of the annual Sports Days. Many sports found the brothers playing side by side as Earle was also a gifted athlete.

In 1928, their father John left the family and moved to Saskatoon to find steadier work. He remained there for a year at which time he sent a letter saying he was heading west in search of work, and not to write to him at this address anymore. The family never heard from him again. His fate remains unknown.

In 1941, both boys went to enlist in the RCAF together. Earle was accepted but Doug was turned down because of a possible heart murmur.

Earle went on to enlist and after training as an Air Gunner, he arrived in the United Kingdom in June 1942, joining 15 Squadron. He was seriously wounded to the face, neck, arm and leg during a mission. The following is a letter written to his mother from Earl's flight captain:

"We were attacked by two enemy fighters and their first burst got Earl across the forehead, a bit in his lower lip and a small bit in his neck. A cannon shell then exploded in the fuselage and a couple of small fragments hit his leg. Earl didn't mention that he had been hit until after the fight, when he called me and said someone should take his place because he couldn't see to fire due to the blood from his wounds. The fellows bandaged him best they could, but he bled badly all the way home. Not once did he complain, even though he must have been in a great deal of pain. He even insisted on walking off the plane. Where he got the strength, I do not know. The medical officer who fixed up Earle told me he has never seen anything like it. He has been highly recommended for the Distinguished Flying Medal, and I know of no one who deserves it more."

Earle was awarded the DFM on January 12, 1943, by King George at Buckingham Palace.

He joined the 156 Pathfinders Squadron on March 5, 1944. On May 7, 1944, 156 Squadron reported that Lancaster Aircraft ND 449, with a crew of seven failed to return from an operational attack on Mantes Gassicourt, France. Of the seven onboard, three were killed, one being Earle. He was 21. He is buried at Bretteville-sur-Laize Canadian Cemetery in France.

Also in 1944, Earle's brother Doug again tried to enlist in the RCAF, this time being successful. He arrived in England in 1944, too late to reunite with his brother Earle who was missing in action just a few days earlier. Doug was a Tail Gunner, flew several missions and was one of the lucky ones to live to tell about it, although he never did. He said it was a time he didn't want to relive. He was Honourably Discharged from the RCAF in October 1945 after returning to Yarmouth, NS, to have his aircraft refitted for Pacific duty. Luckily the war had ended.

WEBER, Vince WWII

Vince born in Scott, Saskatchewan, in 1926. He served in the Army during World War II in England and Scotland. He was a seventy-year member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 88 in Kerrobert. Vince passed away in 2017.





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### WEEKS, Roy

#### **KOREAN WAR**

Roy was born in Yorkton, Saskatchewan, in 1931. He enlisted in the Army in Yorkton on October 13, 1949 and discharged on December 13, 1955. He was married and had three children, two girls and a boy. He worked in Regina for many years before passing away in 1990 at age 59 from a brief illness. He is laid to rest in Riverside Memorial Gardens Soldiers' Plot. He received the Korea War Medal and the United Nations Medal.

### WELFORD, William H.

#### WWII

William was born in 1922 in Lilac, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army in 1942 in Regina. He served in Canada and the United Kingdom and returned home to his farm in Lilac on February 2, 1946. He married in 1949 and remained on his farm. William passed away in 1988.





### WENTZELL, Glenn Cowling

#### WWII

Glenn was born on December 4, 1912. He enlisted in 1940 in the South Saskatchewan Regiment in Weyburn and received training there and at Shilo, Manitoba. He received his orders to ship to England and on December 26, 1940, he arrived in England. After more training there he was a participant in the Dieppe Raid, landing near the village of Pourville. After the Dieppe Raid, Glenn remustered into the Saskatoon Light Infantry. He was a bren gun carrier driver and saw duty in North Africa and Italy. Glenn passed away on April 20, 1987.



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### **WESTBURY, Howard Judson**


WWII

Howard was born in 1898 in Worthing, South Dakota. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps on August 29, 1941. He served with CAOS in Italy, France, Germany and Belgium for a total of 1,514 days of service. He received his discharge on October 20, 1945. Howard passed away in 1968.

### WESTMAN, George Alexander

WWII

George was born on January 28, 1920 in Kinaston, Saskatchewan. He joined the Saskatchewan Light Infantry in November 1939 and was off to Aldershot England in December 1939. He arrived in Sicily early in the morning, as there was immediate front line action within the countryside. He developed desert sores on his feet and spent time in hospital in North Africa. In August 1943, they were shipped by train to an Army camp, and then to Larento and finally to Ortona. They left Naples on May 17, 1945 and arrived in New York City for the Easter Parade. George passed away in 1989.





WETZEL, Peter

WWII

Peter was born in 1921 in Chamberlain, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Army and served as a Gunner in England, Italy, France and Germany. He was wounded while serving in Italy. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Foam Lake Branch for forty years. Peter passed away in 1998.







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### WHITE, Arthur William Henry

WWII

Arthur was born in Silton, Saskatchewan, in 1911. He enlisted in the Air Force and served during World War II. He also served in the Military Police, stationed in Calgary at the rank of Corporal. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 33 and served as both Branch and Zone Commander. Arthur passed away in 1982.

### WHITE, Norman Hewson

WWII

Norman was born in 1915 in Saskatchewan. He enlisted in the Army and served with the 8<sup>th</sup> Canadian General Hospital in Canada, England, and Continental Europe until his demobilization on August 31, 1945. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion for 21 years. Norman passed away in 1980.





### WHITEHEAD, Barry John

Barry was born in London, England. He served 30.5 years in the Royal Canadian Air Force as a fire fighter MOC 651 in Canada and Europe. He received twelve-year Good Conduct Medal with 25-year pin. He received the NATO Medal for six years of service in Lahr, Germany.

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
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
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### WHITTAKER, John Thomas

Edward was born on December 5, 1917 in Garden Head, Saskatchewan. He joined the Armed Forces in October 1940 and after a month in the SSR, he transferred to the RCAF. He was married on June 3, 1944 to Irene Wilkie, and received his embarkation notice to the UK on August 29. He was sent to India and served with 435 Squadron. On January 12, 1945 the Dakota aircraft was shot down by a Japanese fighter while dropping supplies to the 14<sup>th</sup> British Army. The plane crashed and there were no survivors. Edward was 27 years old.

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### **WILSON, Ambrose James**

WWI


Private Ambrose James Wilson was born on January 24, 1896 in Toronto, Ontario. He was the son of Nelson and Margaret Wilson of Birsay. He was a 19-year old single farmer living at Dunblane, Saskatchewan, when he enlisted at Saskatoon on November 17, 1915. Wilson served as a Private attached to the Canadian Infantry (Saskatchewan Regiment) 46th Battalion during the First World War. Known as the Suicide Battalion, the 46th fought in some of the bloodiest encounters of World War I. Private Wilson died of wounds at No. 6 Casualty Clearing Station on May 7, 1917 and is commemorated at the Barlin Communal Cemetery at Pas de Calais, France. His mother Margaret received a plaque and scroll, as well as a his Memorial Cross. Ambrose was 21 when he died.

### WILSON, Thomas Harvey

Thomas was born on February 9, 1925 in Parkman, Saskatchewan. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force as soon as he was eighteen and he graduated as an Air Gunner with his commission as a Pilot Officer. He was then posted to Bomber Command and took O.T.U. in Scotland. Thomas was killed on June 8, 1944 on a night training flight in a Halifax. He is buried at Stonefall Cemetery in Yorkshire, England. Thomas was nineteen years old.





### WINTER, Muriel Joy

WWII

Muriel was born on March 29, 1924 in Tyner, Saskatchewan. She enlisted with the CWAC on August 21, 1944 and served in Canada until her discharge on March 4, 1946. She took a nursing aid course and later became a Licensed Practical Nurse. Muriel passed away on September 22, 1968.

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


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### **WITNEY, James Wilson**


WWII

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


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
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
### **WOODS, Richard Stevenson**

WORK, John WWII

John was born on July 29, 1920 in Orkney Isles, Scotland. The family immigrated to Canada in 1921, moving to Leroy in 1930. He enlisted with the RCA in August 1941 serving in the United Kingdom, Continental Europe and the Central Mediterranean until his discharge on December 4, 1945. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, the 1939-1945 Star, the Italy Star and the France and Germany Star. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Leroy Branch 309 for thirty years. John passed away on March 19, 1974.



### **WUNDER, Warren Howard**

WWII

Warren was born on April 28, 1919, the oldest child of Howard and Alice (Simpson) Wunder. He spent his youth on the farm in the Foam Lake area. He enlisted in the Air Force in Saskatoon in 1939 and spent five years overseas, mainly in England and nine months in North Africa in the invasion of Sicily. While serving overseas with the 402 Fighter Squadron, Warren drove trucks hauling gasoline, water, airplane parts, etc. The living quarters were just tents, moving to wherever they set up bases. He was discharged in 1945, went back to the farm, and in 1954 he married Eunice Lindgren of Langham, a teacher in the Briarmound District of Foam Lake. They grain farmed until retiring in 1979 and moving to Foam Lake. Warren passed away on April 17, 1989 at age 69 following a lengthy illness.

#### **PEACETIME**



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### YURCHISON, William


WWII

He was discharged in 1945 and returned to Wordsworth, where he met and married Adalina Johnstone. They raised a family of seven children, of which two children have passed away. Canadian Expeditionary Force, Vimy Ridge, Thelus, France Easter Monday, April 9, 1917

As the winds grow weak and the sun grows long, As the clouds grow heavy and the stars shine strong; A rolling stretch of Douai Plain is what I might look on, O'er the ridge today.

The boys they lie upon the ground, they laugh and sing and pray; They're thankful for the heroes like Willie Milne today; Who filled with life and dreams and hope, gasped his final say, Up on the hill this day.

Vimy Ridge above this lair, has taken lives so young; The fighting lads from Canada going dusk to dawn; Yard by yard they must charge up, until the fight is won; On each and every day.

Round on round the rifles fire, up at the men we see; Sans love, sans hope, sans will, sans amore, sans d'espoir, sans esprit; With bodies of their countrymen lying in between; Upon this very day.

Climb up the hill at any cost, take 'er foot by foot, Through blood and guts and body parts; through mud and stench and soot, Until the enemy gives in, or 'til the ridge took; It should be ours today.

Inch by inch, man on man, cringing through their sites; The fight goes on at any cost, the ridge is ours tonight, Or tomorrow morn' the scurge goes on, 'til no man's left to fight; On and on each day.

Leaping, pounding thwarting, charging, "will" be on our side, Redeeming usurpations, avenging those who've died. The soldiers grit, "Oh Canada!"; We won't retreat or hide, On this or any day.

Go, go, go unto your death, despair; with bullets fly'n overhead, with cordite in the air; Until the Germans one by one, give way. "We must reach there!" Tripping o'er the ridge this hour; The Germans cannot stay.

Victory isn't sweet, or light hearted, nor captured in a song; It's clamour brought to silence, winds drawn weak and sun grown long. Across the Douai Plain we stare; Our enemy's withdrawn, From Vimy Ridge today.


