

The Table of a Fallen Soldier is set in the hall or dining room, where guests can see it, but where it will not be in the way.

### The table is smaller than the others

symbolizing the everlasting concern and remembrance for our fallen comrades.

### The white tablecloth

draped evenly represents the purity of their motives while answering the call of duty.

### The empty chair

representing the missing comrade.

### The single place setting

represents your wish that the fallen men and women of the armed forces could be present at the happy occasion with you.

### The white candle

representing the light of hope/light of life.

### The single red rose

represents the blood shed/the families who love and keep faith with the men and women who serve.

### The ribbou

represents loyally in waiting for those who are serving away from home, while a red ribbon symbolizes the memory of and search for those missing in action.

### The slices of lemon

on the bread plate represent the bitter loss of the life of the fallen soldier.

### The salt upon the bread plate represents the tears of their families.

### The inverted wine glass


placed to the right of the plate, represents the fact that the fallen comrade will not be able to participate in the happy toasts at this event.

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



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### **Muskeg Lake's History**

Muskeg Lake Cree Nation has a long and rich cultural history. First established in 1881, the core reserve is still home to approximately 256 community members (MLCN Health Records, June 2011). 2,413 additional members live across Saskatchewan and Canada, yet they are still proud to call Muskeg Lake their home and community.

ways of the world outside the reserve. This shift in perspective has forever changed the way we see ourselves as a community.

In the second half of the 20th century, two agreements—Asimakaniseekan Askiy in 1988 and the Treaty Land Entitlement (TLE) Trust in 1992—led to the growth of Muskeg Lake. These agreements generated a need for the community to reach outward to surrounding governments and municipalities and bring us into a process of community consultation, something which had never before happened. The TLE Trust led to the acquisition of urban and agricultural lands, which fostered economic development for the community through land leasing and entrepreneurial growth.

#### **We Are Our History**



Our veterans have played a significant role in the ways we have developed as a community. When community members enlisted for WWI, WWII, the Korean conflict and Peace-time service, they came back changed—not only by war, but by having their eyes opened to the

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


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

Jack was born in Carlyle, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Permanent Air Force on July 3, 1936 and served as a Squadron Leader until his discharge on February 26, 1965. Jack passed away on November 10, 1996.

#### **ANDREWS, Robert William**

WWII

Robert was born in Eureka, Montana on February 2, 1920. He enlisted with the Army on August 2, 1940 and served with the 21<sup>st</sup> Army Group, 17<sup>th</sup> Field Regiment in Europe until his discharge on October 10, 1945. He received six medals: the Canadian Volunteer Medal with Clasp, 1939-1945 Star, Italian Star, France and Germany Star, War Medal 1939-1945 and Defence Medal. He also received a citation from Field Marshall B. L. Montgomery for service and devotion to duty in N.E. Europe. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 248 for 62 years before he passed away on October 28, 2006.





#### ANSON, Douglas Bernard

**RCMP** 

Douglas was born on December 26, 1939. He enlisted on October 21, 1959, in Ottawa, Ontario and served in the RCMP Depot Recruit Training. Cst. Douglas Anson served most of his career in Saskatchewan. He passed away on October 9, 1970, in MacDowall, Saskatchewan, at the age of thirty.

Samuel was born on August 2, 1917, in Manitoba. He enlisted with the Army on May 17, 1941 and served with the 37th Battery of the 17th Field Regiment in England, Italy, France, Holland, Belgium and Germany until his discharge on December 8, 1945. He received six Service Medals: Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, Defence Medal, War Medal 1939-1945, Battle of Britain Medal 1939-1945, 1939-1945 Bronze Star and the France and Germany Bronze Star. Samuel passed away on March 13, 1983.

#### **ARCAND, Albert**

Albert was born on January 24, 1918, in Muskeg Lake Cree Nation, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Canadian Army on June 20, 1940 and served in Canada, Britain and North West Europe until his discharge on November 28, 1945. He received the 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star, Defence Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and War Medal 1939-1945. Albert passed away in 1972.



#### **ARCAND, Clement**



#### **WWII & KOREA**

Clement was born on November 11, 1921 in Muskeg Lake Cree Nation, Saskatchewan and enlisted in World War II with the Royal Canadian Army Corps on June 25, 1941 and was discharged on January 14, 1946. He reenlisted again with the Corps for service in Korea on January 26, 1952 and was discharged on January 26, 1955. He served in Canada, Britain, Central Mediterranean and NW Europe during World War II, and in Canada and the Far East for Korea. Clement received the 1939-1945 Star, Italy Star, France and Germany Star, Defence Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, War Medal 1939-1945 and the United Nations Service Medal (Korea). Clement passed away on July 12, 1993.



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#### **ARCAND, Collin**


Collin was born on January 13, 1924, in Muskeg Lake Cree Nation, Saskatchewan and enlisted with the Canadian Army on June 30, 1941 and was discharged on May 14, 1945, serving in Britain with the Saskatoon Light Infantry, Royal Canadian Army Service Corps and the Canadian General Pioneer Company. He received the Defence Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and War Medal 1939-1945. Collin passed away in 1947.

#### **ARCAND, Francis Xavier**

Francis was born on December 3, 1909, in Muskeg Lake Cree Nation, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Canadian Army on September 16, 1941 and was discharged on October 22, 1945 after serving in Canada, Britain, Central Mediterranean and Northwest Europe. He received the 1939-1945 Star, Italy Star, France and Germany Star, Defence Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and War Medal 1939-1945. Francis passed away on September 2, 1990.





#### ARCAND, George



WWII

George was born on July 3, 1907, in Muskeg Lake Cree Nation, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Saskatoon Light Infantry (M.G.) on October 30, 1939 and was discharged on June 7, 1941 after serving in Canada and Britain. He received the Defence Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and War Medal 1939-1945. George passed away in 1980.




#### **ARCAND**, Louis

Louis was born on July 13, 1898, in Muskeg Lake Cree Nation, Saskatchewan and enlisted with the 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion on June 1, 1916 and was discharged on January 25, 1919 after serving in Canada, Britain and France. Louis received the British War Medal and Victory Medal. He was wounded in action on August 12, 1918.



Louis was born on July 13, 1898, in Muskeg Lake Cree Nation, Saskatchewan and enlisted with the Regina Rifle Regiment on June 20, 1940 and was discharged on September 8, 1943 after serving in Canada and Britain. He received the Defence Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and War Medal 1939-1945. Louis passed away in 1992.

James was born in 1881 in Powassan, Ontario. He was in the Army. James passed away in 1962.



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#### AVERILL, Henry

WWII

Henry was born in 1919 in Mawer, Saskatchewan. He enlisted in the Army and served with the Saskatoon Light Infantry and Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in Great Britain and in Italy during World War II. The Saskatoon Light Infantry was the only infantry unit from northern Saskatchewan to see active duty overseas during World War II.

#### **BAIRD, Clifford Vandell**

WWII

Clifford was born in Valparaiso, Saskatchewan in 1919. He enlisted with the S.L.I. and served in the Italian Campaign. After the war, he farmed for a few years, and then was employed with the Saskatchewan Liquor Board in Carrot River and Tisdale, SK. He was active in The Royal Canadian Legion and Town Council in both towns. Cliff married Emma Kenny in 1943 and they raised three children. Clifford passed away in 1991 in Tisdale.



#### **BALSDON**, Leslie

WWI

Leslie was born in Elgin County and went to Manitoba with his parents. Private Leslie Balsdon served in the Army with the Canadian Infantry (Eastern Ontario Regiment) 21st Battalion and was killed in action on April 2, 1916. He is buried at the Menin Gate (Ypres) Memorial in Belgium.









BARBER, John Sr.

WWI


John was born in Buttress, Saskatchewan in 1894. He joined the 128<sup>th</sup> Battalion and served in Europe. He passed away in 1955.

#### **BARKER, Arthur Julian**

**RCMP** 

Arthur was born in England. He enlisted on April 10, 1919, and served in the RCMP F Division. In 1932, he was promoted to Corporal and then to Sergeant. Arthur passed away on March 16, 1940, in Shaunavon, Saskatchewan, at the age of fifty.






**BARTLEY, Ed**

Ed joined the Light Artillery and served overseas for four years during World War II. He served in England, Sicily, and Italy. He was discharged is 1944, came back to Watrous, Saskatchewan and went to work for the C.N.R. He remained with the C.N. until his retirement in 1966.









#### **BECK, John Douglas**

WWII


John was born in Mawer, Saskatchewan on March 19, 1919, the son of Christian and Lulu Beck. He enlisted in the Air Force and served in Great Britain, France and Belgium as Air Frame Mechanic, Tactical Wing, Leading Aircraftman. He was posted to France shortly after D-Day 1944. His unit followed the advancing armies through France and Belgium. He was killed in an air raid on his air base on October 11, 1944. John is buried at the Groesbeek Canadian War Cemetery in the Netherlands.

#### **BECK, William Stanley**

WWII

William was born in Mawer, Saskatchewan in 1923. After graduating high school in Mawer in 1942, William enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force, became a pilot, and was posted to England where he retrained to become a flight engineer and second pilot on Lancaster bombers. By that time, the European War ended and he was posted to Croft 431 Squadron near Darlington to fly bombers home to Canada. However, after six months waiting for an assignment, he returned to Canada on a troop ship. William passed away in March 2015.





BELL, John



John Bell of the 96<sup>th</sup> Battalion of the Canadian Highlanders was born in Glenarn, Victoria County, Ontario on May 22, 1880. His parents were John and Hanna (Petterson) Bell. John was living in Bounty, Saskatchewan and working as a blacksmith when he enlisted on May 25, 1916 in Saskatoon. He was 36 years old. John embarked from Halifax on September 27, 1916 and arrived in Liverpool on October 6. As a member of the 96<sup>th</sup> Battalion, all of his service was in England. John Bell left England for his home in Canada on May 1, 1919. He was discharged from his battalion on May 26, 1919 in Winnipeg.









#### **BERGREN, Roy Birger**

WWII

Roy was born in Gronlid, Saskatchewan on May 10, 1923. He joined the Navy in November 1942, at the age of nineteen. He began active service in March 1943. Roy spent seventeen months on convoy duty making seven trips across the Atlantic Ocean to Ireland and Scotland. Roy served as an Anti-Aircraft Gunner aboard the corvette HMCS Frontenac and on the corvette HMCS Fergus.

In March 1944, in the North Atlantic, Ordinary Seaman Roy Bergren was ready to go on duty at 0800 hours to stand a depth charge watch at the rear of the corvette HMCS Frontenac. He was asked to dump a pail of oily rags over the side when a wave hit him and carried him out about forty feet into the water. The temperature of the water at the time was 1 degree Celsius. There were several attempts to rescue Roy, but the ship lost sight of him many times. Finally, Roy was able to grab onto the heavy line and the crew pulled him alongside the ship and then onboard. He had been in

the frigid water about 30-35 minutes and barely conscious when rescued. Roy remained in sick bay for a few days but suffered from numbness in his fingers for many months. The officers in the navy had seen a lot of water and many bitter storms in one of which Roy Bergren was washed overboard. They managed to pick Roy up again thanks to good seamanship and good luck.

While Roy was on the corvette Frontenac, they were escorting a frigate which was torpedoed by a submarine and sank. Roy said they had gone back to where the ship had gone down and another corvette was there picking up survivors. It was extremely traumatic to see their fellow sailors in the frigid and fuel covered water.

#### **BERRY, Wilfred Edward**

WWII

Wilfred was born in Central Butte on March 1, 1916. He enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force and served as a rear gunner in Canada, Great Britain and Northwest Europe. During the whole war, 51% of aircrew were killed on operations, 12% were killed or wounded in non-operational accidents and 13% became prisoners of war of evaders. Only 24% survived unscathed.

The Rear-Turret Gunners were in the most vulnerable position on the aircraft. The life expectancy of a W2 Rear-gunner was never high, mostly about five sorties (combat missions). Returning Veterans did not often talk about their service experience when they returned home. However, Wilf recounted to his friend Edgar Philpott an incident as a rear gunner. He had run out of ammunition. A German fighter came up from behind, not being fired upon, the German fighter pilot did not fire, and he just peeled off the pursuit.



Wilfred passed away on November 19, 1996.



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
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#### **BIGGS, Edwin Percy**


WWI

Edwin was born on October 28, 1886 in Northampton, England, taking his schooling and training as a carpenter. He came to Canada on April 23, 1914 and took a homestead in the Edmore District where he met and married Ivy Green. He joined the 214<sup>th</sup> Overseas Battalion, Saskatchewan Regiment on March 13, 1916. Edwin served overseas until his discharge in 1918. After his return, he returned to the farm and after a short period he moved to Saskatoon. They lived there until he retired and they moved to Selma Park, BC.

#### **BLACK**, Norman S.

WWI

Norman was a World War I veteran. He enlisted in 1916 and fought overseas in World War I with the Garry Horse Regiment and was severely gassed. After the war, he returned home and farmed east of Pelly.



#### **BOORMAN, William George**

**RCMP** 

William enlisted on November 15, 1933, and served in the RCMP E Division and then transferred to G Division Eastern Artic. Cst. William Boorman passed away on May 26, 1937, in Elsie Island, Hudson Bay, Nunavut, at the age of 26.



#### **BRAGER, Arthur Oliver**

WWI

Arthur was born on August 25, 1895. He enlisted with the Canadian Army during World War I and served until his discharge.

#### **BRATTON, Robert Stewart "Bob"**

wwii

Bob was born on September 12, 1917, in Manson, Manitoba. Prior to enlisting, he was a farm laborer in the Willem, Manitoba area, Grade 8 graduate. His father was William Wallis Bratton, and he had three brothers and one sister. His sports included hunting, hockey and baseball. He enlisted on May 31, 1940 in Winnipeg and was attached to the Royal Canadian Artillery, Training Centre as a Gunner. He embarked from Halifax to England in January 1941. He was overseas for 53 months, served with the 1st Canadian Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment and later with the 2nd Canadian Infantry Regiment, Anti-Tank Company. He was located in Italy for eighteen months; France, Holland, Belgium and Germany for five months, with the balance of time in Great Britain. Bob received the 1939-1945 Star, Italy Star, France and Germany Star, Defence Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp, War Medal 1939-1945 and Thank You Canada (1995) Holland Liberation Medal. He was honourably discharged on September 21, 1945. He married Kathleen Howard of Miniota, Manitoba in 1946. Bob passed away on April 2, 1964, of natural causes in Wawota, Saskatchewan.



#### **BRAUN, David Robert William**

**AFGHANISTAN** 

David was born on August 3, 1979, in Raymore, Saskatchewan where he was raised. He graduated from Raymore School and worked at Westland Rec-Creation in Watson, SK. He was known to give speeches at school when home on leave. He was very passionate about his job and managed to hold the attention of a roomful of children. He realized his dream of joining the armed forces in February 2002. He was a member of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, based in Shilo, Manitoba. Cpl. David Braun died on August 22, 2006, at 27 years old. He was killed in a suicide bomb attack in Kandahar City. His re-supply convoy was rammed by a vehicle loaded with explosives. A resulting fire destroyed two convoy vehicles. Three others were wounded in the attack. His mother, Patricia Elaine Braun has been named the National Silver (Memorial) Cross mother of 2011. He is survived by his mother Patricia, his sister Daina, and brothers Micheal and Chris. He was laid to rest in the Raymore Cemetery. More than 6-hundred people gathered at the local school on August 31, 2006, for his funeral service.









#### **BYERS, Vernon William**

Vernon was born in 1919, the son of Frank and Ruby Jane (Sargeson) Byers who were Star City pioneers until Frank became a grain buyer in 1918. He was mostly raised by an aunt in Star City and worked on an elevator construction crew until he went mining for HBM&S in Flin Flon in 1940.


He was called up for NRMA training in Winnipeg less than a year later and transferred to the Royal Canadian Air Force less than two months after that. Pilot Officer Vernon William Byers was killed in action on May 17, 1943. He volunteered to be part of the famous Dambusters, but his Lancaster was shot down over the Frisian Islands, Netherlands enroute to his target, the Sorpe dam. His brother Kenneth also served in the RCAF. He is commemorated on the Runnymede Memorial just west of London, England, for airmen who died with no known graves.

#### **CAMPBELL**, Ronald Charles

WWII

Ronald was born on October 22, 1924, in Humboldt, Saskatchewan. In August 1942, just before his eighteenth birthday, he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve at HMCS Unicorn in Saskatoon. He received his basic training and spent two months on Ship Company at HMCS Unicorn.

In 1943, he was drafted to HMCS Naden at Esquimalt, BC for completion of his seamanship training. On completion of his seamanship training, he requested a course in Anti-Aircraft Gunnery which was granted. When this course was completed, he was drafted to HMCS Stadacona in Halifax and from there to a small submarine Chaser in Gaspe, Quebec. The flotilla of which his ship was part of, was moved to Newfoundland in the fall of 1943. He remained with that ship until April 1944 when he was drafted to HMCS Brandon with one of the North Atlantic escort groups running from Newfoundland to Ireland.



In September 1944, he was given a leave and then sent to HMCS Cornwallis in Digby, Nova Scotia for a higher gunnery course. On completion of this course, he again went overseas and went aboard HMCS Loch Morlich running patrols in the English Channel for a few months after which they returned to Canada just as the European War ended.

He then volunteered for Pacific Service and was drafted to HMCS Toronto where he served as a gunnery instructor. In October 1945, he returned to HMCS Unicorn and was demobilized. He received the 1939-1945 Star, Atlantic Star with France Germany Clasp, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and War Medal 1939-1945. He was the recipient of Convoy Cup Foundation Medallion on October 12, 2010. Ronald passed away on August 9, 2020.

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#### **CAMPBELL**, Russell James

**WWII** 

Rifleman Russell James Campbell was born in 1922 in Kinistino, Saskatchewan. He was killed in action on July 8, 1944, at Abbaye d'Ardennes by a sniper and is buried at Beny-sur-Mer Canadian War Cemetery, Reviers, France. He was the son of William Albert and Jessie I. Campbell. Russell was farming when he enlisted in Regina early in 1943. His three brothers all survived the war unscathed.

#### **CAUGHLIN, George Edward**

#### **PEACETIME**

George was born on September 13, 1934, in Esterhazy, Saskatchewan. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1954, and he served for 25 years from January 1955 until December 1979 as an Aircraft Electrical Technician. He served in Canada and had two tours in Germany. He retired in Trenton, Ontario, where he passed away on July 1, 1991, where his family still resides.



#### **CHAPMAN, James**

#### WWII

James was born on February 20, 1920, in Strathclair, Manitoba. He joined the South Saskatchewan Regiment in 1939. He trained in Weyburn and went overseas with the Advanced Guard, 1<sup>st</sup> Headquarters Co. in December 1940. He served overseas until the summer of 1944 when he was sent home on medical grounds. After arriving in Canada, he worked on recruiting for the Army for a short time. During this time, it was confirmed he had tuberculosis, which he contracted overseas. He received the Defence Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and War Medal 1939-1945 for his service. James passed away on June 19, 1948.

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#### CHAPMAN (HOLMES), Peggy F.



Peggy was born on April 25, 1925, in Bromhead, Saskatchewan. She enlisted with the CWAC in September 1943. She was posted to the Training Centre as Orderly Room Clerk, and then transferred to Head Quarters Pacific Command as clerk in Command Records. She received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and the War Medal 1939-1945. While stationed in Vancouver she married George Chapman. She was discharged in September 1945. She was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 60 and 306. She later joined the Ladies Auxiliary Branch and served as President for a number of years. Peggy passed away in April 1998.

#### **CHAPMAN, Thomas Ernest**

Thomas Ernest Chapman was born in Westwell, County Kent, England on October 29, 1885. He was the middle child of five born to Thomas and Harriet Maria (Millen) Chapman. He was farming in Bounty when he enlisted in Winnipeg on March 29, 1916, at the age of thirty. He did basic training at Camp Hughes and departed from Halifax for England on December 21, 1916, spending Christmas Day at sea. All of his service was in England with the Canadian Army Medical Corps. He was hospitalized at Kitchener Hospital in Brighton on March 9, 1917. Private Thomas Chapman returned to Canada on August 2, 1919. He died on February 25, 1964, at the age of 78. He is buried in the Surrey Centre Cemetery, Surrey, BC.






#### CHRISTOPHERSON, Clifford

Clifford was born in Maidstone in 1917, the son of Thoralf and Jessie May Christopherson. He went to school in Marsden and was working for Imperial Oil at Neilberg when he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force. He was married to Phyllis Irene (Heather). Clifford passed away on October 26, 1946, at age 26, in the crash on take-off of a Ventura at Dorval en route to his Ferry Command Post at Goose Bay, Labrador. He is buried at Birch Hills.



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#### CLAPSON, Fredrick Earp "Eric"

WWII

Eric was born on October 10, 1900. He married Muriel Ramage in 1925 and they raised two sons. They were in Ridgedale from 1936 to 1939 and then moved to Camrose, Alberta, where Eric joined the Army. After being discharged, he went into the garage business with his brother, Len. Eric is now deceased.

#### **CLARK**, John Foster

John, a farmer from Bounty, Saskatchewan, served with the First Depot Battalion of the Saskatchewan Regiment. He was born on October 31, 1895 in Toronto, Ontario. His parents were Thomas James and Mary Clark. Thomas was employed by the Toronto Police Force. The couple had three children: Fred, Foster and Ethel. He came west with his brother Joe in 1904. Once he had built a house on the homestead, he returned to Toronto and brought his wife and children to the Bounty area. Foster had attended elementary school at Ryerson before coming west with his parents in 1906 to their new farm home near Bounty. He finished his education at nearby Glenhurst School, a one-room school, and at an early age joined his father on the farm. He enlisted in Regina on June 8, 1918, at the age of 22. His service was all in Canada. He received his discharge on February 19, 1919. He married Jean Thompson Stangoe in 1938. The couple had five children: Thomas who died in infancy in 1941, Foster Jr. (1941), Greg (1942), Brad (1944) and Shelley (1945). John Foster Clark was a well-known local musician who played at many community dances. He was a member of the Glenhurst School Board for many years. He passed away in 1977 and is buried in the Fertile Valley Cemetery. His wife Jean died in 1989.





#### CLOSE, Stanley W.

WWII

Stanley was born in Parkside, Saskatchewan in 1909. He joined the Prince Albert North Battleford Volunteers and took his training at the west coast until his medical discharge in 1944. He passed away in 2002.





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#### COATS, Allan Cyrenius James

WWII

Corporal Coats was a member of the No. 420 Snowy Owl Squadron, Royal Canadian Air Force. Allan is commemorated on the Runnymede Memorial near London, England for airmen from the north European theatre who died with no known grace. On June 1, 1943, Corporal Coats' Wellington went missing while in transit from Portreath, England to Ras el Ma, Algeria.

#### **COFFEY, Cameron Francis Jeremiah "Frank"**

**WWII** 

Frank joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1942. He received his pilot training at Dauphin, MB. He changed to Air Crew and had a brief tour in England. He was discharged in 1945. Frank trained as a Fire Fighter after the war. He rejoined and was stationed in Regina and Winnipeg from 1952 to 1958. He was then posted to Penhold, AB from 1958 to 1960, then Sea Island as Fire Chief from 1961 to 1964. He served as Fire Chief in Comox, BC until 1970 when he was discharged with the rank of Warrant Officer. He worked as a Commissionaire and was a Lighthouse Keeper. Frank passed away on July 19, 1997.



#### **COFFEY, George Edward Nelson**

WWII

George was born in Carlyle, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Air Force on November 26, 1942 and served as a Transport Driver and Stretcher Bearer. He was honourably discharged in April 1946, after having been decorated with the following medals: Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, France and Germany Star, Geo VI Defence Medal, Queen Elizabeth Service Medal, and the Special Service Medal. George joined the Reserve Forces in 1946 and served until 1951. He re-enlisted in August 1951 under the #38415 where he trained as a Radar Technician. In 1952, he remustered to Communications and served in Germany and Canada. He was discharged in 1973 as an "Applied Science Technologist." George passed away in January 2003.





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#### **COLEMAN, Elwood Lincoln Joseph**

WWII

Flight Sergeant Elwood Lincoln Joseph Coleman, born in 1918, of Flin Flon, Manitoba died on May 10, 1942, and is buried at St. Mary churchyard in Black Bourton (or Burton Abbots), Oxfordshire, England. Coleman's Tiger Moth had a wing touch and crashed at High Dogges farm in Witney, on a flight from No. 102 Operational Training Unit. He was the son of Bruce Landis and Anna (Denninger) Coleman of Melfort. Elwood was born in Kenaston, educated in Humboldt, and was working in the mines in Flin Flon from 1938 until he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force in Saskatoon in late 1940.

#### **CONQUERGOOD, Allan Matheson**

wwi

Allan was born on May 28, 1872, in Kincardine, Ontario. He had two brothers, Richard and Murdock, and three sisters, Annie, Margaret and Flora. His parents were Thomas (1843-1933) and Flora Conquergood (1844-1927). Allan had a brief connection to Bounty, Saskatchewan where family relatives homesteaded. When he enlisted in Winnipeg on July 5, 1916, at the age of 44, Allan listed his occupations as carpenter and gasoline engineer. He had his right thumb amputated after an accident in training in Valcartier. He served as a member of the Canadian Railway Troops, 239th Battalion of the CEF in Mesopotamia (the modern-day land between the Tigris and Euphrates Rivers in Iraq, Kuwait and Syria). His troop left Halifax on December 20, 1916 on a journey that would take them around the Cape of Good Hope, into the Persian Sea and finally to Bombay. His fascinating diary can be found in *CanadianLetters.ca* where he describes storms so severe that sailors had to hold tightly to handrails to avoid being swept overboard. There is an interesting account of a burial at sea. His battalion traveled inland on the Tigris River to Baghdad, passing by the fabled Garden of Eden. He was discharged on May 30, 1919, at the age of fifty. Allan died on April 7, 1957, in Winnipeg at the age of 86.





#### **CORNER, Roy Henry**

WWII

Corporal Roy Henry Corner was born in 1920 in Lac Vert. He died on December 12, 1942, and is buried at Gander cemetery. He perished in a fire at the Knights of Columbus hostel in St. John's, Newfoundland while trying to save young ladies at a dance. He was the son of Alan R. and Dorothy (Marr) Corner who arrived from West Hartlepool, Durham, England to homestead NW13-41-18-W2 in 1908. Roy was educated at Old Pleasantdale and Lac Vert schools and was working as a store clerk when he enlisted in Saskatoon in 1940 to serve during World War II.









#### **CROMARTIE**, Samuel


#### **BOER WAR**


Samuel was born in St. Andrews in 1870, one of seventeen children born to William Edward and Mary Anne Cromartie. He enlisted as a volunteer to go with the Canadian Constabulary Forces in April 1901, to fight in the Boer War, and was stationed at Bloemfontein, South Africa. At the end of the war, many soldiers were abandoned by the British and Canadian governments and had to find their own way home. Sam married and farmed and passed away on January 29, 1942 in the Victoria Hospital, PA. He was buried in St. Saviours Cemetery, Birch Hills. After many years of persistence by his grandson, Tim, and through the Last Post Fund, a suitable marker was installed in July 2002, 52 years after his passing. Many thanks to Ron Revell of the Last Post Fund.

### CROSBY, Lloyd E.

WWI

Lloyd was born in Rice, Minnesota, USA, in 1895 and joined the Lord Stallions Horse Calvary, RNWMP Contingent late in 1917, serving in Canada and England during World War I. He was discharged in 1919. Lloyd has passed away.





CROSS, Isruel

WWI

Isruel was born in Grey County, Ontario in 1864 and joined the 28<sup>th</sup> Battalion on January 12, 1916. The family believe that he lied about his age in order to get over there and avenge his son's death - who died on September 7, 1915. The story goes that he blackened his sideburns with shoe polish to hide the gray, but it started to run during his interview. Isruel was transferred to England, but never got into the lines. He was discharged on March 15, 1918. At the time of his enlistment, he would have been 52 years old.





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


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#### CROSS, Robert Alrid "Spike"


WWII

Robert was born in Arcolla, Saskatchewan in 1900 and joined the armed services after the outbreak of hostilities in 1939. Spike served in England, Italy and Holland, and received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, the Italy Star, the Defence Medal, the 1939-1945 Star. He served six years overseas and was discharged in 1945. Spike passed away on May 28, 1969.

#### **CUNNINGHAM, Meri**

Merl was born in Yellow Creek and attended Hazel Lake School south of Yellow Creek. He joined the South Saskatchewan Regiment, serving in Canada, England and France. He was killed in action on August 14, 1944 at Clair Tizon and is buried at Bretteville-sur-Laize Canadian War Cemetery in Calvados, France.



#### DODMAN, Morley Raymond

WWII

Morley was born in Lucky Lake, Saskatchewan in 1918. He was a Saskatchewan farm boy. He signed up in the Army early and served with 5<sup>th</sup> Field Regiment, 5<sup>th</sup> Field Battalion in Canada, England and Holland during World War II. He met his wife, Maisie, in London, England. When he returned to Canada, he and Maisie lived in Lucky Lake where he was a barber. But his nerves got too bad to shave and cut hair. They moved to Regina where he became a shipping clerk for Birks. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion for ten years at the Lucky Lake Branch and ten years at the Regina Branch. Morley passed away in 1966.









DOMIER, Alfred



#### **DONNELLY, Patrick**

Private Patrick Donnelly was born on October 9, 1897, in Topeka, Kansas. His father was Roger Donnelly. He listed his address as Box 14, Bounty, Saskatchewan when he enlisted in Moose Jaw on November 21, 1917, at the age of 21. He served with the First Depot Battalion of the Saskatchewan Regiment. All of his service was in Canada. He received his discharge in Vancouver on March 17, 1919. Following the war, he and his wife Margaret had four sons, James, Francis, Tom and Daniel, and four daughters, Patricia, Mary Margaret, Pauline, and Theresa. He worked as a locomotive engineer. The family lived in Jasper, Alberta. Patrick Donnelly passed away on April 30, 1983, at the age of 85. He is buried in the Jasper Cemetery.



#### EDWORTHY, John Duncan "Jack"

WWII

Jack was born in 1915 in Gladstone, Manitoba and was a member of the first grade twelve class to graduate at Star City. He logged for a time at Peesane, worked in insurance in Ontario, and hopped a cattle boat to England to enlist in the Royal Air Force in 1938 later transferring to the Royal Canadian Air Force. He was killed in action August 25, 1945, and is buried at Rheinberg War Cemetery north of Duisberg, Germany. His Stirling disappeared during a bombing mission over the continent. He was the son of Samuel George, an insurance agent, and Ellen Belle (Duncan) Edworthy. Jack's twin brother, Jim, along with brothers Pearce and Murray and sister Ora also served in the Royal Canadian Air Force. Jack was named for his uncle John Freeman Duncan (1888-1918) of Ogilvie, Manitoba, a World War I casualty.



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
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


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#### **ELLIS, Harry William**

Harry William Ellis of the 9th Canadian Mounted Rifles (Fort Garry Horses) was born in Sprowston, Norfolk, England on June 10, 1880. His parents were Harry William and Maria (Taylor) Ellis. He immigrated to Canada in 1901 and homesteaded near Bounty, Saskatchewan which was where he was living when he enlisted in Saskatoon on December 29, 1914, at the age of 34. He had previous service with the Norfolk Volunteers. He served in England and France. During the war years, he suffered from chronic stomach inflammation and was hospitalized. Harry was given permission to marry on May 20, 1918. His wife was Gertrude May. Following his discharge on June 4, 1919, Harry returned to Canada with Gertrude aboard the *SS Antonia*. He identified himself as a farmer who was "going home" to Bounty. He and Gertrude had a daughter Barbara and a son David. Sometime after 1935, the family moved to British Columbia. Gertrude died in 1961. Harry William Ellis had been living for seventeen years in Abbotsford, BC, when he passed away on June 26, 1970, at the age of ninety. His obituary indicates that he was a member of the Chilliwack Branch of The Royal Canadian Legion. At the time, he was survived by his two children, as well as three sisters and a brother in England.

#### FARRAR, Harold

WWI


Harold was born on September 18, 1888, in Nelson, Lancashire, England. He came to Canada in 1904 and filed on a Homestead in the Edmore District where he farmed. He joined the 214<sup>th</sup> Saskatchewan Battalion in Leslie, Saskatchewan on March 7, 1916 and served in Canada and with the 214<sup>th</sup> Overseas Battalion C.E.F. After the war he continued to farm in the Edmore District for a number of years before moving to BC.



#### **FEARNSIDE James**

James Fearnside was born in Bounty, Saskatchewan on August 1, 1920. His parents, James and Margaret, were married in Aberdeen, Scotland and immigrated to Canada in 1905. James had a brother Gordon David and a sister Margaret Isabell. The family moved to Saskatoon in 1933. James attended Caswell School and Saskatoon Technical High School where he was an above average student. He enjoyed football, hockey, and golf. Before enlisting, he worked as a delivery clerk for a Safeway store and at Canada Packers as a cashier. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Air Force in Saskatoon on February 20, 1941 and was cleared for "full flying duties." One of his references when he enlisted was J. E. E. Allcock who wrote, "[James] has that happy knack of always doing the right thing at the right time." He served with RAF Squadron 104 in Britain. Altogether, he put in 289 flying hours. Warrant Officer Fearnside and the crew of a Wellington bomber took off from Luqa on the island of Malta on November 19, 1942. The aircraft was shot down and the crew was reported missing. James Fearnside was laid to rest at Agira Canadian War Cemetery near Enna, Sicily where 491 World War two veterans from the Commonwealth are buried. A Memorial Cross was sent to his parents following his death. His gravestone reads: "Gone but not forgotten."



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#### FIELDS, Patrick



Patrick joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in the early 1940's and served until he was discharged in 1945. He joined The Royal Canadian Legion Pelly Branch and later moved to Manitoba. Patrick passed away July 13, 2003.

#### **FISHER, Clarence Andrew**

Clarence Andrew Fisher was born on December 1, 1895, in Novar, Ontario. In 1905, the parents, Lyman Tobias and Rosanna (Dafoe), moved to Bounty, Saskatchewan where they raised their five children: Vera, Douglas, Lyman, Hazel and Clarence. The children attended a nearby one-room school called Glenhurst. Clarence enlisted in Bounty on May 24, 1916. He had a pre-existing medical condition, a spinal sprain from heavy lifting. Although he was declared fit by the local doctor, the injury proved to be too difficult and he was unable to go overseas. Clarence was discharged in Regina on January 7, 1918 when he was unable to perform even light duties. He returned to Bounty until 1931 when he moved to Saskatoon. Before moving to the city, he was a member of the Ardath United Church Choir. In Saskatoon, he was employed at the Saskatoon School for the Deaf and later at the Federal Building in downtown Saskatoon. He and his wife Minnie (McArthur) had three sons and three daughters. Clarence Andrew Fisher passed away on Thursday, December 19, 1963, at the age of 68.





#### FISHER, Joseph

**WWI & WWII** 

Joseph was born in 1893 in Michel, NWT. He served with the 5<sup>th</sup> Canadian Infantry Battalion in France. He received the Distinguished Conduct Medal "For showing conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in charge of a platoon" and the Military Medal for "showing great courage and gallantry". He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Duck Lake Branch. Joseph passed away in 1962.



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


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#### FLAMEND, John

John was born in Muskeg Lake Cree Nation, Saskatchewan and joined the 232<sup>nd</sup> Battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Force on June 8, 1916. He was discharged on June 1, 1917.

#### FLEMING, Douglas

**WWII** 

Sergeant Douglas Fleming was born in 1915. He killed in action on November 23, 1941 and is buried at Chichester cemetery in West Sussex, England. His spitfire crashed in the sea off the Bognor Regis while returning from operations over France. Douglas worked as an apprentice druggist at Jansens pharmacy and at Unity before enlisting in Saskatoon in late 1940. His brother, Wallace Fleming, was also killed in action. The boys were sons of James and Jeannie (Baillie) Fleming who were married in Glasgow, Scotland in 1905 and came to Kinistino to farm six years later. Four brothers, Bruce, Stewart, Gordon, and Haig, also served in the Royal Canadian Air Force.



#### **FLEMING, Wallace**

WWII

Wallace Fleming, born in 1914, of Kinistino, was killed in action on January 28, 1945, and is buried at Stonefall cemetery, Harrogate, North Yorkshire, England. His Lancaster crashed on takeoff from Skipton on Swale on a mission destined never to get to Stuttgart, Germany. Wally was educated at Crompton school and Kinistino and farmed before enlisting in Saskatoon in 1941. He married Jean McMillan (Thompson) of Henribourg (she later moved to Winnipeg) while home on leave in September 1944 after completing his first tour. His brother Douglas Fleming was also killed in action. The boys were the sons of James and Jeannie (Baillie) Fleming who were married in Scotland in 1905 and came to Kinistino to farm six years later. Four brothers, Bruce, Stuart, Gordon and Haig also served in the Royal Canadian Air Force.



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#### FORD (GRIFFITH), Margaret Merle

WWII

Margaret was born in 1925 in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan and joined the Women's Army Corps in July 1942. She served at various stations in Saskatchewan and Alberta ending up in Vermilion, Alberta. She served in Canada until her discharge in July 1946. She married Russell Ford in May 1947 and raised a family of five boys and three girls. Margaret passed away in 2004 in Aldergrove, BC.

### FOWLIE, James

WWII


James was born on September 22, 1922. He enlisted with the Army on October 27, 1942. He served with the 18<sup>th</sup> Armed Car Regiment as a Section Leader in Canada, England, France, Belgium, Holland, and Germany until his discharge on October 24, 1945. He was also a Pacific Volunteer. James received the following medals: Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, Defence Medal, King George, and France and Germany Star. After the war he married, farmed, and worked in the bush until he moved to BC. James is deceased.

**RCMP** 





Glen was born in Taylorside, Saskatchewan on November 18, 1928. He joined the RCMP out of Melford, Saskatchewan for ten months of recruit and equitation training in Regina. He was posted to Windsor, Nova Scotia in 1948 and requested posting to Yukon in 1950 and was posted to Whitehorse.

In April 1950, he purchased out of the RCMP in order to get married. Had to have five years of service at that time. In May, he moved to Vancouver, BC and was hired by the BC Provincial Police (BCPP). He was sent to Ocean Falls and Rivers Inlet to police the salmon fisheries. In August, the RCMP assumed the policing of BC from the BCPP. He was rehired by the RCMP and was posted to Queen Charlotte City, BC.

In 1953, he was posted to Prince Edward Detachment and in 1956 was promoted to University Hill Detachment as Detachment Commander. In 1962, he was promoted to Sergeant and posted to Port Coquitlam, BC Detachment as Detachment Commander. In July 1963, he was selected with another member

to represent Canada and the RCMP in a CP Air promotional tour of the Philippines, Japan, and Hong Kong to generate interest for Canadian tourism.


In 1966, he was transferred to Burnaby Detachment, then to Richmond Detachment in anticipation of a promotion to Staff/Sergeant. He never took up the position as his Commission to Officer took precedent over those transfers. His order in Council Commissioning him to Sub-Inspector is from the rank of Sergeant. He was commissioned to Sub-Inspector, OIC (Officer in Charge) Municipal Police Coordinator in RCMP Headquarters in Ottawa, Ontario. Glen was appointed Honourary Aide de Camp to the Governor General of Canada. He was appointed head of security for the President of Tanzania, Jules Nyerere in his visit to Ottawa, Toronto and New York.

At the time, he stated his occupation as farmer and his permanent address as Bounty. He did not serve overseas and received his discharge on July 26, 1918. He married Christie Ann Adair from Bounty on December 29, 1922. Neil Grant died in July 1957 and is buried in Woodlawn Cemetery, Saskatoon.



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#### GREENIZAN, Cecil

WWII

Trooper Cecil Greenizan was born in Stornoway, Saskatchewan on May 20, 1921. He joined a Saskatchewan Regiment on August 6, 1940, in England. Cecil passed away on March 4, 1982.

#### **GREENIZAN**, Frederick Arthur

WWII

Frederick was born in Killarney, Manitoba on September 1, 1903, the oldest son of the Greenizan family. He joined the Army with the Saskatoon Light Infantry on January 18, 1940. He went overseas the same year and was in England during World War II. After the war, Fred returned to Saskatoon where he lived until his death on February 2, 1984.





#### **GREENIZAN, Harvey Brock**

WWII

Harvey was born in Saskatchewan on October 10, 1910. He joined the Canadian Army as a Private in Prince Albert, the last of the six sons of Mrs. Greenizan and J. A. Greenizan. He was formerly a truck driver for Co-op Creameries Ltd. in Saskatoon. Harvey passed away on April 16, 1981.





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#### **GREENIZAN, Isaac Leslie**

WWII

Isaac was born in Kamsack, Saskatchewan on October 27, 1914. He enlisted in the Army on May 28, 1941, and was stationed in Dundurn. Isaac passed away on June 9, 1993.

#### **GRIESE**, John Wagner

WWII

John was born January 2, 1913, in Renfrew Ontario. He served in the Royal Canadian Air Force from 1941 to 1945. Initially, he served at the Uplands Airbase near Ottawa and later he was stationed in a medical unit on an Air Force training in Summerside, Prince Edward Island as a medic/ambulance driver and pharmacist. He served there until his discharge in 1945. After the end of World War II, John worked as a pharmacist in Nipawin, Saskatchewan. Eventually, he and his wife Gladys moved to Carrot River and bought the pharmacy there. John passed away on January 17, 1981.





#### **GUNN, John Alexander**

**WWI & PEACETIME** 

John was born in Fort Qu'Appelle, Saskatchewan, on August 21, 1883. He joined the 5th Regiment (Boer War) in April 1902 and was discharged in August 1902. Then he enlisted with the 1<sup>st</sup> Regiment (CMR) in World War I on October 22, 1914 and was discharged in May 1919, serving in Canada, SA, England, and Belgium. He became a POW on June 2, 1916 (Sanctuary Wood), and a POW in a Germany-forced labour camp. He was then hospitalized in Germany and later in Switzerland, and moved to convalesce on December 9, 1918 in Berkshire, England. He was later owner of Gunn's Beach and was postmaster in Spirit Lake until his death on August 12, 1947.



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
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#### **HACK, Reinhold George**

WWII



Although wounded, he felt very lucky to have made it through. After the war, Geoff married Ileene Scott and raised a wonderful family while farming back near his hometown to Lashburn. He lived the remainder of his life enjoying working with the land and never missed a Remembrance Day service. Robert passed away on January 10, 2007.






#### **HALLETT**, Albert

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#### **HANDFORD, Mervin Campbell**

WWII

Mervin was born in Birsay, Saskatchewan on June 27, 1925.

The following is Mervin's experience in the military during World War II, in his own words.

On December 28, 1943, three days after Christmas, I went to Regina, Saskatchewan with my friend Lawrence Fisher. We went to No. 12 District Depot where we enlisted in the army. We passed our medical and I got my uniform. There were two sizes – too big and too small. The small size fit me because I weighed 118 pounds soaking wet, and I stood at 5 feet, 6  $\frac{1}{2}$  inches tall. I was proud as a peacock!

I stayed in Regina at the army barracks for about two weeks, then went home to our farm for the weekend. My mother and father had to sign some papers before I could enlist in the army. I got back to Regina after my weekend pass, then it was off to Orillia, Ontario for my basic training. I arrived there about

January 15, 1944, and was assigned to our barracks.

Next morning, I was up bright and early, had a shower, and shaved what little fuzz there was on my face. I went over to the Mess Hall for breakfast, then back to the barracks to get ready to go on parade at eight in the morning.

I never forgot the regimental Sergeant Major. His name was Morgan, an English imperial army man. He used to run two miles before breakfast. Needless to say, he was a real soldier and in fine shape. He lined all the young guys on parade square and told us to queue up in three lines.

We were green as grass when it came to army drill. Can you imagine me, a young fellow from the stubble fields of Saskatchewan, now a soldier in the Canadian Army?

The Sergeant Major told us to stand to attention, then said, "Stand steady; you're like a bunch of jelly fish."

Then came, "Open Order, March" for inspection. The first line took two steps forward; the center line stayed as is; the back row took two steps back. Now it was time for Sergeant Major Morgan to walk up and down the three lines and inspect us. He stopped at me and said, "Sonny, where did you learn to tie your shoe laces?"

I said, "Sir, I learned on the farm in Saskatchewan."

He said, "You had better have them tied right tomorrow morning at parade time."

Also he said, "You're not on the farm now."

He then said, "Close Order, March." He called out orders and said, "From now on there is going to be quite a change in your lives."

He also said, "From now on, I will be your mother."

Not knowing enough to keep my mouth shut, I said, "You got that right Sergeant Major." Then he grinned. What a fine soldier he was.

On March 15, 1944, I went to Camp Borden for my advance training in the tank corps. What a change from basic training. Now they were teaching us how to drive tanks. There was very strict discipline in everything we did. Everything had to be neat, clean, and tidy. The bed had to be made with your kit bags and big pack, small pack, and haversack all placed neatly on the shelf. Your shoes were to be polished, soles laid up on your blanket, which was called a "death blanket". There was a black stripe right down the center of the blanket. They were double-deck bunk beds.

The tanks we were trained to drive were Ram, Sherman, and Churchill. The Ram and Sherman tanks weighed 35 tons each, and the Churchill tank weighed 60 tons. They had Rolls-Royce 9-cylinder airplane engines in them. They used to take 400 gallons of gas to fill the tank, which was enough to last ten hours in the fields on the training grounds. We used to have to wash and clean them down with Varsol – all over and underneath the tanks. We would come into the barracks after ten hours of driving, go around the kitchen, and make sharp turns, throwing sand up through the screens in the windows. The cook would say, "You guys got sand all over my pies."

I went back to Qu'Appelle, Saskatchewan for a week of embarkation leave to visit my family and all of my friends before going over the blue Atlantic bound for England.

I returned to Camp Borden, Ontario, and prepared to pack and get ready for our train ride to Halifax, Nova Scotia. We left Borden in May 1944, by train headed to Halifax. Upon arrival in Halifax, we boarded the ship for England. The name of the ship was the "New Amsterdam". It was a Dutch ship with a Dutch crew. They spoke their own language over loudspeakers. We wondered what they were talking about.

Sometimes the German U-boats were attacking us. We changed course every fifty-nine seconds to prevent the Germans' submarines from getting a good shot at the ship. The Dutch crew used to set off depth charges. They were so powerful they would rock the whole ship. I think there were about 600 of us servicemen or boys on board ship. It took about five days and six nights before we landed in Greenwich, England. I can remember us staying out of the harbor until they cleared the circle of mines surrounding the harbor.

We then went to the old army garrison at Aldershot, England. It was quite a sight. What an experience for a young soldier from the wheat fields of Saskatchewan. As I recall, we went to Blackdown, which was not too far from Aldershot, for a refresher course.

But, as it turns out, they needed some troops for D-Day. They said we could choose any regiment that we wished, or they would place us where they wanted. I thought, "Well, I joined in Regina, so I will join the Regina Rifles, 3<sup>rd</sup> Division, 7<sup>th</sup> Brigade." We went to a holding place in southern England to prepare for the invasion on June 6, 1944.

On the morning of D-Day, we waited to get into the landing craft tanks (LCT's). It was a very frightening time for a young guy like me. We boarded the landing craft and set sail for France. It was not really a sailboat; it was powered by a gasoline engine.

We landed on Juno Beach in Normandy and started to disembark from our landing craft. I thought, "If there was a hell on earth or water, this must be it." I lost a lot of my buddies that fateful day. When I look back on it now, it makes me wonder what it was all about. Their lives were taken at a young age. Why I was spared I'll never know. God must have had his hands on me. For some reason I came through it. I was not eighteen until June 27, 1944.

After we landed at Caen, we began to do what we were trained to do in Orillia and Camp Borden. We had a few tough battles for a few days; after that it was trying to keep in touch with the "Jerries".



We went through France and from there to Belgium. I was then in Ghent, Belgium, New Years Day, 1945. What a New Year celebration that was – not like Time Square in New York. It was no dance party, but I came through it OK.

We had a few hard battles in the Dardanelles, and I came through that battle again. We then went out of Belgium and into Holland. We didn't run into much resistance right then. We were in Utrecht where we stayed for a while. We were also in Ede and from there we went to Nijmegen, Holland where we spent the fall of 1944 and the early months of 1945. We were in bunkers like ground hogs all winter. It was very cold. We stood on guard two hours on and two hours off. There was no sense in taking your clothes off because it was too cold, so a lot of the times we even had our great coat on to stay warm and try to get a few minutes of shut eye.

We were ready for the big push in the spring of 1945. The artillery shelled the German positions for 72 hours straight without a let-up. The Germans had blown all the dikes up, and the whole area was flooded. We had to go in with amphibious tanks called Water Buffaloes. I was driving one of these.

We went in, and the German soldiers surrendered in numbers I could not keep track of. I used to load them onto our tanks and take them back to the Prisoner of War camp behind the 'theatre of war' where the action was. They were so happy to get out of the fighting they sang all the way back to the POW camp where they were held. They were then shipped to Canada's POW camp. There were a lot of very young guys and older men. They were sixteen to seventy years of age.

When that offensive was over, we went out on rest for a while on leave to England. I went to Leeds in Yorkshire County where I met a wonderful English girl who worked for F. W. Woolworth & Co. We went to a picture show and ate some popcorn. When the show was over, she took me to her mom and dad's home where she introduced me to them. They were a really nice family. They invited me to spend my leave with them. I got to know them really well.


Now it was time to catch the train back to Dover for my boat ride across the English Channel and back to the lines in Holland. They used to give us nine pounds for a nine-day leave. I never did get a chance to go back there again as army put Leeds out of bounds to Canadian troops. I sure felt bad because I got to love that young lady very much – but that's the way things are.

I got back to my regiment in Utrecht, Holland where we started off on our offensive again. After a couple of weeks on the front lines, a couple of our Bren Gun Carrier drivers were killed when they ran over some land mines. They needed to replace those two buddies of ours, so they asked for volunteers. There was a guy by the name of Leese. He was red-headed and a really good soldier. We both volunteered to drive these Bren Gun Carriers with flame throwers on them. They were used for going into enemy lines, shooting flames, and then the boys on foot would advance behind us and take up positions, going a few yards at a time. It was kind of hot in the Carriers, but it beat walking.

The flame throwers had an 80-gallon tank on the back of the Carrier with a flame thrower up in front next to me, the operator. It was usually the corporal or the sergeant who operated the flame gun. With a little wind the flame would fire 200 feet and 150 feet against the wind. It contained a chemical that was very sticky when it hit its object. It was like a gooey gel. I never did know what it was until years later. This chemical was made by Dow Chemical. If you held your finger on the trigger for twenty seconds steady, it would have emptied all 80 gallons. We therefore only used it in short bursts. I don't even like to think about it, but those memories will stay with me the rest of my life. War is cruel.


We crossed the Rhine River on what they called a Pontoon bridge that was like a bunch of buoys laid side by side across the Rhine. Bridging was laid on top of the buoys. This work was done by the Royal Canadian Engineers. We all worked together doing our own assignments or jobs.

Now it was time to rest for a while in Kleve, Germany where we set up a makeshift camp and stayed for awhile.

We then flew over to London by DC3 Dakota airplane for another nine-day leave. It was better than going by boat for twenty miles across the English Channel, which was the roughest piece of water I have ever been on in a ship or ferry.

Leese and I left by train from London, England bound for Edinburgh via "The Flying Scotsman". That's what they called the passenger train. As I recall, it moved over the rails at a fast clip. We landed in Edinburgh where we stayed in hostels for servicemen. We went out to the streets to see the sights and noticed there were many beautiful Scottish lassies who treated us like royalty, when I reflect on it now. I went up the hill to the old Edinburgh castle which was a sight to behold for a couple of young soldiers from the prairies of Saskatchewan. The days flew by, and it was time to board "The Flying Scotsman" again back to London.

We returned once again to the front lines. It was a matter of trying to catch up with the "Jerries" who were retreating and trying to hold on till the last straw.

We finally landed in Emden, Germany where we went on reconnaissance looking for the last Germans. We took off out of Delfzijl, Holland, (formerly spelled Delfzyl) across the border from Emden, Germany. We went down the road for two miles, made a right turn, and continued along the road until we came across some disabled German vehicles that were blocking the road. We stopped and noticed little broken pieces of pavement in the road. Sergeant Preston and I got out and looked under a chunk of broken asphalt. There were a bunch of land mines. We had to turn around and start back to Delfzijl.

Just then the German 88-millimeter tank guns opened up on us. There was a field of tall grass and a bit of a ridge. They couldn't get a real bead on us to get a direct hit. My carrier was the last one of the four heading back to Delfzijl, Holland. When we made a left turn to go up the road, a couple of Germans opened fire from the ditch with anti-tank guns. One hit just in front of the carrier – enough to break some steel in the back of the vehicle, but I just kept driving.

Two Bren Gunners by the name of Smutts and Novak jumped out because they thought the "Jerries" had made a direct hit. I didn't realize this until we got back to our headquarters, which was when I realized they weren't in the back of the Bren Gun Carrier. They were taken prisoner by the Germans.


It was now time out for rest and regrouping for a few days. The Perth Regiment from the 5<sup>th</sup> Division took over from us in the front lines, and they captured Smutts and Novak back again. They returned to our unit support company of the Regime Rifle Regiment of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Division which I belonged to.

While we were resting in Delfzijl, the German naval gun boats started to shell our positions with 18-inch naval shells. We took shelter in a basement of a big house. The basement walls were about two-and-a-half feet thick – just like a bunker. I guess they were built that way to stand up to allied bombing. One of the shells landed close to the big house, and the concussion came through the basement and killed one of our guys.

It makes me wonder why this guy was taken. He used to write a letter to his wife and kids back in Saskatchewan every week. He was quite a bit older than us other fellows. We used to call him 'Pop'. He was one great guy. I guess his number was up, and it was his turn to go.

We went back on the offense again and backed the Germans up until they surrendered on May 8, 1945. Sergeant Preston, our section sergeant, was killed by a sniper while he was out directing us in bringing the carrier around the corner in Emden, Germany.



It was now time to set up our headquarters because this is where we started our duty as occupation troops. It's funny because the big buildings where we originally set up our barracks was not bombed flat, whereas all other building in Emden were flattened to the ground. It wasn't until I got up on top of the roof and saw a red cross painted on the roof, did I realize it had been a hospital. I still can't figure out how they could bomb so accurately so as not to hit that building. Maybe, I thought, God had something to do with why it was spared, but one will never know why. I know that a young soldier like me, only nineteen years old, knew that it was a miracle.

Once again, it was off to Great Britain for a nine-day leave. It was back to good, old bonny Scotland for a well-deserved rest and holiday. We had a great nine-day leave before we returned to Emden, Germany for our occupation duties, making sure the German people stayed in certain zones for rationing purposes and keeping them under tight security for their own protection.

The German people, on the whole, were very nice. They didn't want a war any more that we did, but they were forced into it by Hitler and his followers.

There was one German soldier who was put on trial for war crimes. His charge was that his troops were responsible for the cold-blooded murder of thirteen Winnipeg rifle soldiers. His name was General Kurt Meyer. We used to take him back and forth to his trial until the final day when he was charged and sentenced to die. He was allowed to answer in his German tongue because that was his native language, and he was on trial for his life. He was found guilty and given the death penalty.

On the eve of his execution, we had to go around and check citizens in Emden. We went in pairs and checked door to door to see if everything was "A" O.K. On one door that we knocked on, the man said to come in. When we entered the house, there hanging on the wall was a 1938 Wheat Pool calendar. I asked them where they got the calendar, and they told me that they used to live in Wolseley, Saskatchewan where they farmed. They went back to Germany with their family for a visit. Because the German government knew that there was a likelihood of a war breaking out, they would not let them return to Saskatchewan.

I knew some of the people they knew around Indian Head and Qu'Appelle where I grew up and went to school. I had a good talk with them, and I enjoyed the conversation very much, so you can see it's a big world but a small one when it comes to some things. Anyway, Kurt Meyer was given life in prison where he spent some of his prison time in New Brunswick. Then he returned to Germany where I understand he passed away.

In May 1946, we got ready to go back to England and then on back home to Canada. We left Germany and landed in England where we stayed for a few days we boarded the IIe de France for Canada. We sailed out of Portsmouth, England and landed in Halifax five or six days later where we boarded the train for Ontario and Regina, Saskatchewan. We had another leave before we departed for Regina. I got my discharge on June 3, 1946, and I turned 21 years old on June 27.

We went down to the clothing store in Regina and got all decked out in civilian clothes. It was so funny wearing army clothes and to be back in 'civies'. We were very proud of our new clothes, and I felt like a new man.

Mervin stayed in Regina for a few days before going home to Qu'Appelle where he settled down. He got a job with a construction company digging dug-outs for the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Administration. They were large dug-outs for the water supply for cattle and horses. The name of the man he worked for was Pete Campbell from Qu'Appelle. He was a good man to work for. Mervin also did custom combining in Texas. Upon returning to Canada, he started working for a man named Bob Moore. he drove a big caterpillar with a cutting brush. This turned out to be work that Mervin enjoyed very much. He did that type of work for about four years and also worked for farmers. Mervin passed away on February 19, 2014.



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### HARDER, Abraham "Abe"

#### **WWII & KOREA**

Abe was born in Herbert, Shamrock, Saskatchewan, the son of Jacob and Katarina. He enlisted in the Army in 1941 and served overseas from 1941 to 1946 during World War II. He reenlisted as a medical orderly from 1951 to 1954 and served in the Korean War from 1950 to 1953. Abe was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Central Butte Branch, Lions Member, and Scouts and Cubs leader.

### HAWRYLIW, Nick

WWII

Nick was born in Glaslyn on December 2, 1917. He served in the Army as a Sergeant with the Royal Regina Rifles in Canada, England and France. He landed at Juno Beach on June 6, 1944, and was wounded at Caen, France. He was badly wounded and transported back to Canada on the Queen Mary. Nick passed away on February 21, 1965.






### **HAYES, Phillip Edward**

WWII

Phillip was born in Yellowgrass, Saskatchewan on January 17, 1920. He grew up on a farm east of Prince Albert and was one of ten children of William and Lenora Hayes. Five of their older children volunteered to serve Canada at the start of the war. Their five remaining children were too young to enlist. Phillip, Bill, and Glen served overseas, and Cecil and Viola served in Canada. He served in the Army with the Westminster Regiment in Canada, the United Kingdom, Continental Europe and Central Mediterranean during World War II from September 24, 1941 to January 9, 1946 and was overseas from January 1943 to December 1945. Phillip passed away on November 4, 1992.









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### **HEIMARK**, Conrad

WWII

Conrad was born in Hammar, North Dakota, USA, in 1915. He enlisted with the Canadian Army #22 Canadian Provost Company on October 16, 1941. He served 22 months of regimental duties as a Military Policeman, and 24 months as a traffic control policeman. He served active duty in Belgium, France, Holland and Germany. He was discharged on December 18, 1945, to return to civil life after demobilization. He was awarded the 1939-1945 Star, the France and Germany Star, the Defence Medal, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, and the War Medal 1939-1945. He married Annie Derak and raised three sons and one daughter. He passed away on September 12, 1997, due to a massive heart attack and was laid to rest on September 16, 1997 in the Collins Cemetery, Beechy, SK, alongside his parents.

### **HEIMARK**, Harry

WWII

Harry was born in Beechy, Saskatchewan, on October 4, 1923. At the age of twenty, he joined the Canadian Armed Forces with the 48<sup>th</sup> Highlanders of Canada, serving overseas from 1943 to 1945. He was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, as well as the War Medal 1939-1945. Upon his arrival back to Canada, Harry attended the University of Regina, where he obtained his Civil Engineer Bachelor of Science Degree. He was a master in city planning and worked for the City of Regina. Harry was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion, and he spent his last remaining years in the Veteran's Hospital in Edmonton, Alberta. He passed away on September 13, 1988, after a courageous battle with cancer. Harry has been laid to rest with his parents in the Collins Cemetery. He will always be loved and remembered.





### HEIN, Jacob "Jake"

WWII

Jake was born on December 31, 1925 in Warman, Saskatchewan. He joined the Army on October 13, 1944 and served in Canada until April 15, 1946. After his discharge from the military, Jake bought his own trucking business. Later he worked for the DND Cold Lake Air Base as an airplane refueler in the summer and as a heavy equipment operator in the winter until 1983, the year he passed away on October 1.

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### **HEKELAAR**, Harry

WWII

Private Harry Hekelaar, born in 1919, of Meskanaw was killed in action, April 4 1945, in an ambush at Bissendorf and is buried at Holten Canadian War Cemetery in Overijssel, Netherlands. His gravesite is particularly apt given his Dutch ancestry, he was the son of William and Wilhelmina C. Hekelaar who arrived in Meskanaw to farm in 1915. Harry, who farmed with his family, first enlisted in the Canadian Postal Corps in Saskatoon late in 1941, and left a bride, Frances Nellie Dorothy (Tanfield) in Forest Row, East Sussex, England. His sister Sue served in the Canadian Women's Army Corps.

### HENRICKS, Peder M.

WWII

Peder was born in Outlook, Saskatchewan on March 6, 1921. He joined the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, Saskatoon Light Infantry, serving in the Italian Campaign for the liberation of Holland. He married Dorothy E. Warton in London on May 22, 1945, and had two children, Judith E. Hammond (Henricks), born on June 5, 1948, and Paul M. Henricks, born on December 8, 1951, both born in Saskatoon, SK. Peder was wounded in action on May 23, 1944, and received the Defence Medal, Italy Star, 1939-1945 Star, and France and Germany Star. Peder passed away on March 17, 2005.




### **HENRY, Robert Nelson**

Henry was born in Wolverine, Saskatchewan on July 31, 1920. He enlisted in the Air Force on November 1, 1940 and served in Canada. He spent 58 months as an air frame mechanic, after training at Saskatoon, Toronto, St. Thomas Tech, St. Thomas, ON. He was stationed in Dauphin, Manitoba for four years. After the war, he helped to close out three stations. Upon his discharge on October 20, 1945, he returned to farming for 62 years. Henry passed away on February 27, 2008.

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### **HERD, George Nelson Colven**

George Nelson Colven Herd was born in Glasgow, Scotland on September 26, 1896. His parents, Charles and Effie, immigrated to Canada in 1903, settling in the Milden area. George was 21 years old when he enlisted in Regina on June 11, 1918. He was farming near Bounty at the time. He was not able to serve overseas and received his discharge papers on January 13, 1919. The 1935 Voters List indicates that he was living in the Milden area. He married Eleanor Mary Stringer and the couple had a son, George Edward Herd. It is not known when the family moved to British Columbia. Mary died in Surrey, BC on July 11, 1951; and George died on December 13, 1960, at the age of 64. They are buried in Valley View Memorial Gardens in Surrey, BC.

### **HERDMAN**, Fredrick W.

Frederick was born in 1894 in Toronto, Ontario. He joined the C.E.F. 68<sup>th</sup> Battalion serving in England and France during World War I. He was killed at Vimy near the end of the war in 1918.





### HINGTGEN, Clifford Theodore Frank

Clifford was born in Ogema, Saskatchewan on November 27, 1925. He served in the Navy on the Micmac and was on it when it went down. He spent some time in the sea before being rescued. Clifford passed away on June 10, 1995.

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
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
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### **HOFFMAN, Albert Sylvester**







### **HOLMES, Harold John**






### **HOWE, Gerald Arthur**

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


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### **HUGHES, Albert**

He was the son of Howard Arthur and Ada Louise (Devlin) Hunt who homesteaded SW32-26-4-W3 northeast of Loreburn, moving to a farm near Kinistino in 1933. Leslie was farming with his family when he enlisted in Saskatoon early in 1941. He married Margaret Mavis (Sebre) of Horsell, Surrey, England five weeks before his death.







**HURD, Vincent**

HUXLEY, Irwin



### INGELL, Leslie Raymond

Leslie was born in 1922 in Porterville, California. His family returned to Macrorie, Saskatchewan in 1924. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1942. He was trained as an Air Gunner and went overseas in 1943 and was attached to the Royal Air Force. He completed several bombing missions over Germany and was killed in action when his plane was shot down over Germany on March 24, 1944. He is buried in Reichswald Forest Cemetery in Germany near the Holland border. For his service to Canada, Les received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, King George VI Medal, The Air Crew Europe Star, and the 1939-1945 Star.



### IRWIN, Robert Hall

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Robert Irwin Hall was born in Halifax, Nova Scotia on May 14, 1889. His parents, Robert Simon and Janet A. Irwin, had two other sons: Charles (1887-1961) and George (1892-1971). The family moved west to Bounty, Saskatchewan. That was where Robert Hall Irwin was living when he enlisted on May 9, 1918, the age of 29, in Regina. He was a member of the 1st Depot Battalion of the Saskatchewan Regiment. Shortly after he enlisted, he was hospitalized in Regina Grey Nuns Hospital with influenza (Spanish Flu). All of his service was in Canada. He was discharged on February 27, 1919 and indicated his intention to return to Bounty. Census records show that he was living in Omega, Saskatchewan on June 1, 1921. He registered for a homestead in 1928. Robert married Jessie Kathleen McDougall in Swift Current on July 13, 1924. They moved to British Columbia around 1935. Prior to his death at the age of 66 in Esquimalt, BC on August 2, 1955, he had worked for fifteen years as a grocery manager. He is buried in the Royal Oak Cemetery.

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### JACKSON, Kenneth Royden

WWII


Kenneth, the son of Henry and Lila Jackson, was born in 1910 in Clanwilliam, Manitoba, educated in Tisdale, and was a farmer and grain buyer before enlisting in Winnipeg on the outbreak of the war. Corporal Kenneth Royden "Slow" Jackson, of Valparaiso, died on September 29, 1945, and is commemorated on the Halifax Memorial for servicemen lost or buried at sea. Jackson served in Jamaica before being posted to Hong Kong where he was captured on Christmas Day 1941. After enduring four years in horrific Prisoner of War Camps, Kenneth was liberated in August 1945. Just before, he was given a drink of poisoned sake by his captors and his malaria ravaged body could not survive it. He was buried at sea on his way to San Francisco. He left a son, Morley, and a daughter, Shirley.

### JASPER, Joseph John

WWII

Joseph was born in Drinkwater, Saskatchewan on June 9, 1907. He served in the Army as a driver, mechanic and fitter with the RCOC in Italy, France, England and Holland from April 7, 1941 to January 30, 1946. While serving overseas during World War II, Joe attended a comedy at a theatre. Joe had a very distinctive laugh. When the movie ended, Joe walked out of the theatre, and standing there was Archie Minelli, a neighbour from home. Archie said, "I knew that had to be you, Joe, as I could hear your laugh, and sure enough it was you." Archie Minelli was also serving his country.





### JOHNSTON, William Henry

**WWI & WWII** 

William was born in Owen Sound, Ontario, in 1891. He enlisted in the 1<sup>st</sup> Saskatchewan Depot Battalion on November 1, 1917 and served his time in England and was discharged due to being physically unfit on December 13, 1918. Henry joined The Royal Canadian Legion Earl Grey Branch on June 10, 1930. When the hostilities broke out in 1939, Henry again enlisted and served with the Veterans Guard until his discharge in 1945.



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

He joined the 28<sup>th</sup> Battalion and was posted overseas to England and went into active duty serving in France. He was reported missing in action at Vimy on August 21, 1917. Wilfred is remembered with honour at Vimy Memorial in France.




### **JUKES, Richard Sydney**

WWI

Richard Sydney Jukes was the son of Thomas and Annie Jukes of Wolverhampton, England. His father was a publican. Richard was born on October 26, 1891, in Coyntor, Shropshire, England. The Jukes family consisted of four boys and three girls. British census data show that he was an apprentice tailor in 1911. Immigration records show that he arrived in Halifax on March 29, 1915 aboard the *Scandinavian*. Private Richard Sydney Jukes' name appears on the Bounty Honour Roll. He was 23 years old when he enlisted in Edmonton on November 25, 1915, as a member of the 14<sup>th</sup> Battalion. He listed his occupation as an engineer. Richard embarked from Halifax for England on April 18, 1916. He was posted to France on June 8, 1916. Only 24 years of age, he was killed in action nineteen days later near Zillebeke in West Flanders, Belgium. The village is about two kilometres from the famous battlefield at Ypres. He is commemorated at the famous Menin Gate along with 55,000 other soldiers who lost their lives in the Ypres Salient and who have no known grave.











### Walter Nelson "Nels" Julseth and Ethel May Wood

### A Canadian Veteran and His War Bride







Nels was born in Loverna, Alberta, on December 3, 1919. He joined the RCAF in May 1941 and trained in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. He left for Liverpool, England, in December 1941. After postings and training courses in Syerston, Balderton, Leeds and Leeming, he declined an offer to be an instructor for Air Frame Mechanics and was posted to the 408 Squadron at RAF Topcliffe, close to Thirsk. At one of his postings, because of the blackouts during the war, he remembered staying in a 40' long stable with only two 60-watt light bulbs in it for the men to shave. He also remembered a thick Yorkshire accent telling him to "put wood inth 'ole luv", meaning to close the door. Life in England was very different for a prairie boy.

Ethel was born in Sunderland, England, on January 13, 1924. She joined the Women's Auxiliary Air Force in the spring of 1942 after her father signed the paperwork. Originally from Newcastle, she was posted at RAF Topcliffe near Thirsk where she drove ambulances and Commanding Officers' cars. It was at Topcliffe that she met Walter Nelson Julseth.

Their first "date" was Ethel driving Nels around the base in a heavy fog looking for a Lancaster bomber that had not returned from a mission. After their first meeting, Nels convinced her to accompany him to a dance, even after warning her he had two left feet and calling her "Red" because of her auburn hair. She later admitted that he did indeed have two left feet, but he must have done something right, as they were married in July 1944 at Barmby Parish Church, Barmby on the River.

Nels left England in late 1944, celebrating Christmas on the Queen Mary and arriving home on New Year's Day 1945. Ethel followed in May 1945 on the Britannic with many other war brides. She almost returned immediately to England after coming all the way to Saskatchewan because Nels was late to meet her train. He had met up with some war buddies and got a little sidetracked. Fortunately, he convinced her to stay and they were married for over fifty years. They farmed in Plenty, Saskatchewan, and had six kids. They stayed in the Girvin/Craik, Saskatchewan area with Nels' parents for a while before purchasing land in Plenty, Saskatchewan. Nels remained an active Legion Member after being discharged from the RCAF.

Ethel travelled back to England to visit family numerous times but was able to return to the church where they were married in the fall of 1999. Also on that trip, she was given an escorted tour around RAF Topcliffe, which was, and is still, an active base. They were more than happy to show her around once they found out she was stationed there during the war.

Ethel remained an active member of the War Bride Association throughout her life. In 2006, she was able to make the trip on The War Bride Train to Pier 21 in Halifax to celebrate the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the war brides coming to Canada.

Nels passed away on February 3, 1995 and Ethel passed away on January 9, 2015.







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
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### **KEATING, Shane Patrick**

#### **AFGHANISTAN**

Shane Patrick Keating was born on December 17, 1975, in Estevan, Saskatchewan. He lived in Dalmeny until grade 12 when he and his family moved to Saskatoon, where he graduated from Bishop Mahoney High School in 1994.

He was a Member of the North Saskatchewan Regiment from 1993 to 1997, and then joined the regular forces. He was a member of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, based in Shilo, Manitoba. Shane previously served two tours in Bosnia and had been stationed in Afghanistan since August 1, 2006.

Cpl. Shane Keating died on September 18, 2006, at thirty years old. While handing out school supplies, toys, balls and biscuits to local children, Cpl. Keating and three other soldiers were killed by a suicide bicycle bomb attack in the Panjwaii district. A man travelling on a bicycle detonated his

bomb near Canadian troops and several others were injured, including children.

Two other members of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry and a 2 Field Ambulance personnel were also killed in the blast. Pte. Favid Byers, Cpl. Keith Morley and 2 Field Ambulance Cpl. Glen Arnold.

He is survived by his mother Judith, sisters Erin and Meghan, and brother Ken. His father Brian, a Saskatoon police officer, passed away several years prior. He enjoyed motorcycling, curling and good conversation. Shane was laid to rest in the military section of Saskatoon's Woodlawn Cemetery.

### **KELL, Harold Alan**

WWII

Harold was born in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, in 1916. He joined the 8<sup>th</sup> Canadian RECCE Regiment, serving in England. He tried to join the Air Force with his twin brother, Les, but was initially rejected due to some color blindness, which was considered very critical for the air service.

He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Canwood Branch 132. Harold passed away in 1988.






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
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
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### **KELLER, Bryce Jeffrey**

### **AFGHANISTAN**

Bryce Jeffrey Keller was born on May 27, 1979 and raised in Regina. He attended St. Bernadette School and Riffel High School. He joined the military in 1997 as a member of the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, based in Edmonton.

Bryce was killed on August 3, 2006, at 27 years old. He died after a rocket-propelled grenade attack conducted by Taliban militants near the village of Pashmul. This attack occurred in a Taliban hotbed about 25 km west of Kandahar City. Two other members of same battalion were killed in the attack. Thirty-five-year-old Sgt. Vaughan Ingram and 22-year-old Kevin Dallaire also lost their lives during this attack. They were only weeks from completing their six-month tour. Six other soldiers were injured in the attack.

In 2008, the Governor-General announced the posthumous award of the Medal of Military Valour to Cpl. Keller for his courage and leadership on August 3, 2006. On that day Keller sacrificed his life and saved the life of a critically injured soldier.

Bryce was nicknamed "Smithers" by his military comrades.

He and his wife, Cpl. Sarah Keller, met in 1998 on a military course in Kingston, Ontario. She is a medic with the Edmonton-based 1 Field Ambulance.

Bryce was an animal lover and supported the Edmonton Humane Society. He had a dog named 'Finn MacCool.' He is survived by his parents and two brothers Scott and Bradley.

Cpl. Keller was laid to rest on August 15, 2006, in Sherwood Park, Alberta.

### KENDALL, Joseph

WWII

Joseph was born on the family farm east of Macrorie, Saskatchewan, on December 30, 1925. 





### KINDRACHUK, William F.


WWII

### KIRBY, Charles Edward

Charlie was born on July 28, 1914, in Hart, Saskatchewan. He enlisted in April 1943 and went overseas after completing his basic training. Charlie served in the Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps in England, Italy, Holland, France and Germany. The Troop Carrier transporting him to Italy was torpedoed in the Mediterranean. After spending a few hours in the ocean, he was picked up by another carrier. Charlie was honourably discharged in March 1946. Returning to Scout Lake where he was reunited with his wife Ellen and son Ken. They purchased a farm three miles east of Scout Lake. Two more children were born, Judy in 1948 and David in 1950. Charlie remained on the farm until 1996. He passed away in October 1999 in Rockglen, SK. Charlie is buried in Mount Hope Cemetery, Assiniboia beside his wife Ellen.






### KNUTSON, Palmer Clifford

Vincent was born in Swift Current in 1921, completed grade 12 at Lac Vert school and was farming with his family when he enlisted in Saskatoon in 1941. Flight Sergeant (RCAF navigator/bomb aimer) Vincent Harold Knutson was killed in action February 23, 1943, and is commemorated on the Runnymede Memorial near London, England, for airmen from the north European theatre who died with no known grave. Knutson's Wellington was shot down over the English Channel on a flight from No. 303 Ferry Training Unit. He was the only son of Caleb Hiram and Margaret (Pearson) Knutson who came from North Dakota to homestead NE21-22-13-W3 west of Beechy in 1911, moving to Lac Vert eleven years later.

### KRIEGER, Shirley Durward

Shirley was born on September 15, 1912, in Alameda, Saskatchewan. Shirley enlisted with the Canadian Army on August 6, 1942, and served in the United Kingdom and Continental Europe until discharged on January 10, 1946. Shirley passed away on November 21, 1991.





### KVINLAUG, Laurence C.

WWII

Laurence was born in the Valbrand District on April 20, 1920. He joined the Saskatoon Light Infantry in 1941 and trained in Moose Jaw, SK, and Terrace, BC, and was then sent to England on the Queen Elizabeth. He was trained as a radio operator (Morse Code) and as a machine gunner, serving in Italy, Sicily and North Africa. He served under Montgomery for a short time, until he was wounded and moved to the Isle of White to recover. He was home to Valbrand and his family for Christmas 1945. David was born in Brechin, Scotland, on December 9, 1905. He received his schooling in Scotland and came to Canada in 1928 to Swift Current and was employed as a farm labourer. When war was declared, he served with the South Saskatchewan Regiment overseas from 1939-1945. He was wounded in the Dieppe Raid, and returned to Canada in 1945. Following his discharge from the Army, he was employed at the Research Station in Swift Current and was there until he retired in 1970. He held a Life Membership in The Royal Canadian Legion and received many awards including the Palm Leaf. He was also a member of the Elks Eagles and Senior Citizens Club. David passed away on February 15, 1990, at 84 years old, and is buried in the Soldier's Plot at Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Swift Current, SK.




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# LANGLEY, William Stephen "Bill"



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
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# LECOUILLARD, Cyril Terrell "Bud"

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




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






# **LENTON, Edwin Claude**



# LENTON, Richard Roderick "Dick"

Richard Roderick Lenton was born in Birch Lake, Saskatchewan on September 23, 1911. His brothers and sisters called him "Dickie Bird", a name given to him by his mother because he always played the mouth organ "like a bird". He has always been called Dick by the family.

Dick joined the Saskatoon Light Infantry along with brother Wilfrid in 1939. He served in England, Italy, and the Mediterranean during World War II. It was in England that he met and courted Rose E. Pitts. Dick and Rose were married in 1942 but when he returned to Canada after the war, Rose remained in England.

Richard met and Matilda (Tilly) Watch and they lived happily in Regina for many years. Rose eventually came to Canada but did not stay long. Sadly, all this did was separate him and Tilly. After Rose went back to England, Dick lived alone with his beloved pets.



Dick and Wilfrid worked together in their younger days, hauling logs by horse, building bridges and roads, and farming. Dick lost the sight of his left eye when he was hit by a piece of steel when he worked at IPSCO, a steel company in Regina.

Dick loved animals, and when he could no longer have pets, he filled his apartment with pictures of animals. He loved music, especially the fiddle. He loved little kids, but he did not have any children of his own. He always had a few coins in his pocket for his nieces and nephews.

Dick lived a long life and passed away on October 12, 2006, at the age of 95.



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# **LENTON**, Wilfrid

WWI

Wilfrid Lenton, Henry and Lucy's second child, was born on October 15, 1878, in Oundle, Northamptonshire, England. He attended Thrapston High School, attaining first place in his exams in 1896, his last year there. From 1896 to 1898, he was a pupil-teacher at the Rockingham Road Board School where he worked for his Teacher's Certificate, excelling in his studies. When war broke out in South Africa, he left his books, enlisted as a Trooper and sailed for the Table Bay in early 1899. After serving as a Trooper and acting non-commissioned officer under various generals, he received a commission as First Lieutenant and went to Johannesburg.

Wilfrid immigrated to Canada about six months after the war ended and entered the Ontario Veterinary College, graduating in 1905 with a gold medal for best general examination, first prizes in pathology and physiology, second in anatomy, third in disease and treatment and honours in three other subjects.

He practiced as a veterinarian in Belmont until July 1906 when he was offered the position of assistant veterinarian at the Agricultural Experiment Station at

the University of Arkansas. In July 1907, he was made veterinarian to that institution and assistant in animal pathology. Later, he took charge of the Department of Veterinary Science. He was also a member of several boards. Known at the University as Professor Lenton, he drew up a bill covering all points of animal sanitation which the legislature of 1907-08 enacted into a law.

It was around that time that he started courting Gertrude Eva Besso, adopted daughter of Charles and Alena Drummond-Hay. No records of a formal adoption were found and Gertrude kept her birth surname until she married.

Wilfrid and Eva were married in the Parish Church in Belmont, Manitoba on October 9, 1907. They had five children: Wilfrid Drummond (August 23, 1908), Ethel Rebecca (April 24, 1910), Richard Roderick (September 23, 1911), Eric Kenneth (June 8, 1913), and Lucy Gertrude (February 6, 1915).

Wilfrid and Eva took up residence in Fayetville, Arkansas where Wilfrid worked at the University of Arkansas for a wage of \$1500 per annum. Their first two children, Wilfrid and Ethel, were born there. They returned to Canada after Ethel was born, settling in Junor, Saskatchewan where the other children, Richard, Eric, and Lucy, were born. The family lived in a log house valued at \$300 in 1910 and \$800 in 1921. A family story is that the roof leaked and Wilfrid, Ethel and a bag of flour were put under the table to keep them dry when it rained.


Wilfrid joined the Veterinary Corp of the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force in December 1914 and was sent to France in 1915. He received the commission of Captain and was awarded the Military Cross. Eva and the children went to Belmont and remained there until after the war. *Veterinary units and over seven thousand horses sailed with Canada's First Contingent to England in October 1914. At its greatest strength, the Canadian Corps had more than 23, 500 horses (from Library and Archived Canada).* 

The family returned to Saskatchewan in 1919. He farmed and raised cattle. In 1927, Wilfrid purchased two acres of land in Medstead and built a two-storey house there. The front gate was a popular place for picture taking in the years that followed.

Wilfrid started working for the Rural Municipality of Medstead, a position he held for about fourteen years. He was well-known in the Medstead district, sat on various committees, was a devoted church member and a member of the Masonic Lodge. He passed away on September 6, 1943, at the age of 65.

Eva was also active in her community, especially the church, and was a devoted mother and grandmother. She passed away on June 22, 1948, at the age of 61.





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# **LENTON, Wilfrid Drummond**

Wilfrid Drummond Lenton was born in Fayetteville, Arkansas, USA on August 23, 1907, and moved with his parents and sister Ethel to Saskatchewan in 1910. He joined the Saskatoon Light Infantry with his brother Richard on September 17, 1939 and served overseas during World War II.

Irene Maria Victoria Lane, daughter of Victor Lane and Maria Sophia Maghdelena Meersman, was born on February 5, 1920 in Loverna, Saskatchewan, but moved to Belgium with her family in 1931. At the outbreak of World War II, the family was forced to flee to England to escape the Nazi rule. While in England, Irene took a job building Blenheim bombers. Her job was to install the windows and radio antennae. Irene quit that job when she married her Canadian Army sergeant. Wilfrid and Irene met in Medstead and Wilfrid started courting her in England when he stopped to visit the Lane family who were friends when they all lived in Saskatchewan.

Wilfrid and Irene were married in Shrewsbury, Shropshire on December 16, 1942. Irene returned to Canada as a war bride, bringing their first-born daughter

with her. They rejoined Wilfrid in North Battleford and they began their life together, living in various places in Saskatchewan throughout the years.

Wilfrid and Irene had five children: Cecilia Elianne (December 10, 1943), Michael Roy (November 26, 1946), Shirley Anne (December 2, 1954), Darrell Wayne (May 17, 1956), and Virgil Lynne (December 17, 1958).

Wilfrid had several occupations throughout his lifetime. He was a policeman in North Battleford and Meadow Lake, had a milk route, worked for the timber board in Meadow Lake, was an agent for the Federal Department of Indian Affairs (1954-1973) in Big River, Fort la Corne (near Prince Albert), Red Pheasant (near Battleford), retiring from Wynyard. He also worked as an insurance salesman and a night watchman at Clear Lake Sawmills in Prince George.

Wilfrid liked to read and play cribbage, whist, chess, doing crossword puzzles, marking kites from newspapers and willows every spring and watching the soaps. He was a good Christian, always supporting his church and staunchly supported The Royal Canadian Legion.

Irene was a homemaker most of her life. She enjoyed reading, sewing, ceramics, and other crafts. She had several dogs over the years and at one time had a huge collection of elephants. She had a keen sense of humour and cared deeply for her family.

Wilfrid and Irene parted in 1970, after 28 years of marriage. Wilfrid moved to Prince George, BC where he met a lady named Mary. They were married in 1982 and made their home in Grand Forks.

# LEWIS, Barnard "Barney"

Barney was born in 1895 and came to Birch Hills from Chicago in 1907 to join his uncle Barnard Saunders who was homesteading in the Fisher district northwest of Birch Hills. The Lewis and Saunders families had originally come from Wales. Barney enlisted in World War I and came back to farm. He married Louise Orton in 1924, and they raised a family of five children on the farm. Barney passed away in 1977, and Louise passed away in 1979.








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
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LEWIS, Joe WWII

# LINDSKOG, Ronald Ferdinand




LINFITT, Victor














# LOVBERG, Leif Ole






# LYALL, William Pascal

He was posted to numerous radar stations and bases across Canada and in the North throughout his 34-year military career. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion for 22 years. Ed retired from the military in 1988 as a Chief Warrant Officer at Air Command Headquarters in Winnipeg, MB. Ed passed away on November 22, 2005.





# MacDIARMID, Robert John "lan"

WWII

Robert was born in Handsworth, Saskatchewan, in 1921. He joined the Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians), serving in Canada, Italy and Holland. He passed away in 1993. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Moose Jaw Branch 59 for 32 years.







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# MacDONALD, Donald Kenneth "Ken"

WWII

Ken was born on April 27, 1919, on the family farm south of Carlyle. In September 1939, he enlisted with the South Saskatchewan Regiment and trained at Shilo, MB, Toronto, and Halifax. Ken participated in the Dieppe Raid, losing many friends and comrades. At Christmas 1943, Ken was assigned to the English Army to attend the Royal Military College at Camberley, where he graduated as a lieutenant of the Canadian Army. On December 20, 1944, during a raid on a German position, Ken was wounded. He was discharged on May 25, 1945. Ken and his wife, Dorothy, spent the rest of their working years at the family farm. Dorothy passed away on March 7, 1992, and Ken passed away on January 9, 1999, after a valiant battle with cancer.

# MacDONALD, Glen Grant

WWII

Glen was born on September 12, 1924, on the family farm south of Carlyle. He spent some time on the farm with his father before joining the Regina Rifles in early 1944. Private MacDonald trained in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan and Shilo, Manitoba. Towards the end of 1944, he was sent from Shilo to Halifax where he boarded a troop ship for overseas. Before he saw any action, peace was declared and he was sent home. He returned to working on the farm for a short time but decided to go to Rossland, BC. In 1953, Glen, his wife Kay, and children returned to Saskatchewan. Glen passed away January 26, 1997.





# MacDONALD, John David

**WWII** 

John was born in 1915 in Zealandia, Saskatchewan. He enlisted with the Canadian Army Active on July 14, 1942. He was a member of the 10<sup>th</sup> Field Squadron of the Royal Canadian Engineers; also known as the "Sappers". The Engineers broke all time speed records in repairing, building, and destroying roads and bridges in Italy. He received his discharge on March 20, 1946 in Regina. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, the 1939-1945 Star, War Medal 1939-1945 and the Italy Star. He was a member of the Rabbit Lake and Spiritwood Branches of The Royal Canadian Legion. John passed away in May 1988.

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


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# MacDONELL, Donald Ross

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
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
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# **MADILL, William Henry Pastor**

Flight Sergeant Emile Mandin paid the Ultimate Sacrifice at the age of 26. Emile was killed in action on June 9, 1942 while among the crew of a Wellington twinengine bomber that was reported missing in action. He is commemorated on the Runnymede Memorial in Surrey, England. The Saskatchewan Geo-Memorial, Mandin Lake is located northeast of Lloyd Lake.

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# MANSON, Kenneth Arthur WWII

Kenneth was born on September 16, 1921, on the farm in Winton, Saskatchewan. He joined the RCAF in 1942, spending four months at training school in Saskatoon, then on to Toronto for basic training, and was posted to Saskatoon #4 SFTS in 1943 and was there until the European War was over in 1945. Ken was discharged from the service in December 1945 and returned home to farm and later moved to Birch Hills and continuing farming there. Kenneth passed away on August 1, 1990.

# MANSON, Merlin Joseph

WWII

Merlin was born on June 17, 1923, in Swift Current, Saskatchewan. He grew up south of Ponteix and attended school at Westerleigh School. He joined the Army in Winnipeg and he was trained at Portage la Prairie. He was shipped overseas in 1943 and fought in Italy on the "Road to Ortona." He served with the Hastings and Prince Edward Regiment in Canada, England and Italy. He died on June 4, 1944 and is buried at the Military Cemetery at Cassino, Italy. 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
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#### MARJERISON, Neil

WWII




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#### MCCONNELL, Robert L.


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
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

















#### McGERRIGLE, Kenneth Alexander "Ken"

WWII

Ken was born on May 25, 1926, in Edam, Saskatchewan and moved to Harlan, Saskatchewan with his family at the age of three.

He came to Harlan with his mother, Ethel, and his siblings, Mae and Gordon, via train from Glaslyn to St. Walburg where they were met by the Pepper family who brought them to Frenchman Butte by team and wagon. Archie Wagner met them there and completed their journey with them to Harlan to reunite them with Mr. John McGerrigle who had been hired to teach at the Harlan School. Ken's brother Don, who was born later in Harlan, completed their family. The McGerrigle family lived in an old house on the school property that also served as the local Post Office ran by Mrs. McGerrigle. Later the house was replaced with a newer version that was eventually moved to the farm where Mrs. McGerrigle continued to run the Post Office.

Ken attended the Harlan school for eight years; he had his first job there doing all their janitorial work during the last three years he was in attendance. At the

age of sixteen, he travelled to Trail, BC and stayed in his cousin's basement on a cot and worked with him cleaning basements after a flood then went to work in a lead burning smelter cleaning tanks, after about a year his company transferred him to a Tungsten mine in Hazleton, BC where he worked with an electrician and shared accommodations with two other men in a bunk house. He spent his time at the mine wiring shacks and only once had to go down the mine to string lights. While home on vacation the mine closed so Ken did some thrashing for local farms then went South to Cabri and Hazelet area to Combine.

In January 1945, he enrolled in the army where he was mustered in Dundurn for the Royal Edmonton Regiment. He took his basic training in Peterborough and advanced training at Petawawa, Ontario. His regiment had been sent home on embarkation leave when the war ended in Europe. Ken along with several other members of his regiment, signed up for the Japanese war and they were sent to Vernon, BC for further training. Ken's regiment was there until the atomic bomb was dropped in Japan and ended World War II after which they were transported back to Shilo, Manitoba and later discharged. Ken came back to Harlan and bought the Stevenson place. Ken and Gordon worked in partnership on their farms for many years with stints at side jobs in a sawmill in the bush and working at the Lloydminster Post Office during the Christmas rush. He also delivered mail from Lloydminster for the Harlan and surrounding area Post Offices. He hired out to combine for other local farmers and even did a couple years of fill in relief running the ferry across the North Saskatchewan River.

Ken and Gordon played ball on the local Harlan ball team most Sundays, eventually the team petered out, so they joined the Alcurve team where Ken met Nancy Jacobson. They were married in 1961 and proceeded to start their own family having three girls: Heather, Sharon and Colleen. Soon the little house they were living in became too small so with the help of his brother Gordon and his brother-in-law, Calvert Johnson, they milled lumber and built the current house which the family moved into in 1968. Over the ensuing years there were many trips to Frenchman Butte for Legion meetings and events, Christmas concerts and parades; many fishing trips to Worthington and Amyot Lake and a couple trips to BC for visits with Nancy's brother Ron and his family. Sunday dinners at the farm always included as many family members as possible followed by many a Canasta or crib game.

Once Ken and Nancy retired from farming, they took a much-loved trip to Sweden and several bus tours throughout Western Canada and into the States. Sunday dinners continued on with their children and grandchildren always making up extra seats at the table. Most summer days Ken could be found in their garden tending enough produce to sustain several families. His participation in the Frenchman Butte Legion increased and he became a member of the Museum association doing rope making displays for the school kids visits. Many a grandchild made an extended stay at the farm with Grandma Nancy and Grandpa Ken always knowing no matter what there was always a bed available if it was needed.

Ken passed away at his residence in Harlan District, Harlan, Saskatchewan on May 12, 2021, at the age of 94.















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#### McGILLIVRAY, Allan Robert

**WWII** 

Allan was born on March 30, 1920, in Central Butte, Saskatchewan, the son of Jack and Lulu McGillivray.

At age 21, in the spring of 1941, after seeding, Allan went to the Royal Canadian Air Force recruiting office in Regina and applied to join the RCAF Air Crew. In the fall, after a poor harvest, he got the call for compulsory training and in November began training as a pilot observer in Brandon, Manitoba. After basic training in March, Allan was posted to bombing and gunnery school in Dafoe, Saskatchewan. In May, they went to Initial Training School in Saskatoon where he was chosen to go to Navigation School. In July, he was posted in Regina to learn practical navigation. They flew training in the two-engined, reliable Avro Anson. Halfway through, they were packed off to Pearce, Alberta. They completed the course in October 1942 and were awarded their wings, some as sergeant, but six of them were given a commission rank (2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant).

In mid-November, they were told they were going overseas and spent three weeks in Halifax before being marched down to a train not knowing where they were going. To their surprise, they ended up in New York harbour boarding with (10 000 troops in all) the Queen Elizabeth, the largest and fastest liner afloat. After six days at sea, a pair of Spitfires escorted them into a shore train. They travelled through the blacked-out countryside to the south coast of England. Ration cards were a necessity for troops in the food-starved England. They spent some time training until the first of April 1943 when they went out training in the Tiger Moth aircraft to get used to finding their way over the different countryside in England.

In May 1943, Allan was promoted to Flying Officer and more training courses completed, they were told they would be assigned to an Operational Unit. In June, they were sent to Northern Scotland. Their flight crew was assembled (Canadian pilot, navigator), and bomb aimer with British wireless operator and rear gunner. They trained for night bombing in the large twin engine Wellington bomber.

In August, they finished training and were considered ready for operations, but as most operational squadrons were now using four-engine aircrafts, their aircrew was posted to a Conversion Unit. It was now November and their conversion to the Halifax bomber was complete and with two new crew members, mid gunner and flight engineer, they were posted directly to operation squadron #158.

It was just over a year since he landed in England, and delays continued as operations were converting from the Halifax MKII to the MKIII and in January 1944 the squadron appeared on the operational board. After several trips without incident, on March 24, on a bombing run to Berlin, the Squadron came upon strong winds that broke up the formation. Their Halifax was struck by cannon fire and one engine was set on fire. They got another blast which knocked out two more of the engines and were put out of control. They were ordered to put on their parachutes and abandon the plane at once. After struggling to open the escape hatch. He just stuck his feet out and the slipstream did the rest.

Allan landed safely in a hay field in enemy territory and there was no sign of the aircraft anywhere. He came upon his bomb aimer, McDonagh in a ditch with a mangled ankle from a cannon shell. He was unable to walk. In the darkened night, Allan found his way to a village and by early morning was able to arouse a village family. They alerted the authorities and Mac was taken by stretcher into town where four of their crew were rounded up and as it turned out, they were the only four that survived. They were taken by rail to Berlin, then with others captured, on to an

interrogation camp near Frankfurt. We got off the train at Frankfurt to a scene of complete destruction and confusion after it had been bombed the previous week. The civilians were hostile to them, spitting and throwing rocks.


They arrived at Dulga Luft interrogation centre with other allied air crews. They were assigned separate, very small, cells that were kept uncomfortably hot. The food was poor and there was not much of it. He was desperately hungry all the time. Every few days, he was taken out for interrogation and then back to the cell again. After two weeks or more, they were released into a holding cage. After two days, they began the long journey to the permanent POW camp Stalag Luft 1 situated on the Baltic Sea. Eight were crowded into a small compartment for three long days on the rail. The POW camp they arrived at was probably one of the best in Germany. The rooms were fairly large with three double bunks, a table, and a stove. After a short while, they had running cold water. There were about 2 000 prisoners of war, 1 400 of them American. The room leader was an English pilot captured by the Italians and was beginning his fifth year as a POW.

In the summer of 1944, morale was high as word of the invasion had raised hopes that the war would be over by Christmas. But this was not to be. By Christmas, the Red Cross parcels ceased to come through, German rations were reduced and coal rations were reduced rather than increased for the winter.

January 1945, everyone was hungry and cold but they were the lucky ones as many of the eastern camps were being marched across the country away from the advancing Russian armies. By the first of April, there was a marked improvement in the behaviour of the German guards as they realized the war was lost.

On May 1, the night before the German guard had locked up the barracks and closed the shutters as usual. The morning saw they had all disappeared into thin air. The senior allied officer took command of the camp and by the afternoon the Russians appeared. There was no sign of motorized vehicles at all just a stream of horses drawn wagons and buggies. Rumours of them going back to Britain through Russia was not appealing. On May 8, VE Day marked the end of the war and the next day, a fleet of American planes began coming to airlift the POW's back to Britain. What a thrill it was to see Britain with light shining all along, as it had never been as long as the war was on. He arrived back to Canada in July 1945 and was discharged a few weeks later.

Allan passed away on December 5, 2016.







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
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#### McGILLIVRAY, Earl Lewis

Earl was born in Central Butte, Saskatchewan in 1918, the son of Alexander and Sara Ann McGillivray. He served with the Royal Canadian Air Force 405 Squadron in Canada and in Great Britain. Sergeant Earl Lewis McGillivray was shot down and killed in action on November 29, 1942, at the age of 24. Earl is buried in Dishforth Cemetery in Thirsk Yorkshire, England.

#### McKIM, Robert Kenneth


WWII

Gilbert was born in 1921. He joined the Royal Edmonton Regiment and served in England, Sicily and Italy. Gilbert was the brother of George, Clifford, Sandy, and Ira, all sons of William and Margaret McWilliams. Gilbert's brother, Ira, was also killed in action in France during World War II.





#### McWILLIAMS, Ira


WWII

Ira was the brother of Sandy, George, Clifford, and Gilbert, who was killed in action in Sicily during World War II. They were the sons of William and Margaret McWilliams.

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#### **MELBY, Palmer James**

He was killed in action on October 11, 1944, at age 30, and is buried at Calais Canadian War Cemetery Leubringhen, France. Palmer was the son of Dahl August and Elise Mathilda Melby, who had originally come from Fredrikstad, Norway, and homesteaded south of Beaubier, SK, and later moved to a farm in Birch Hills.

#### MENG, Clarence

#### **WWI & WWII**

Clarence was born in Mauston, Wisconsin, USA, in 1892 and immigrated to Canada at the age of sixteen. He worked at various jobs and filed a homestead in the Waitville district. In 1915, he joined the 53<sup>rd</sup> Battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces in World War I, and was transferred to the 42<sup>nd</sup> Black Watch Highlanders, returning home in 1919. He married Elsie McNabb in 1921, and they raised a family of five girls and five boys. In 1940, Clarence joined the Canadian Army (Active) for service in World War II, and served with the 28<sup>th</sup> Veterans Guard until 1946, when he returned to farming. He passed away in 1960.





MENG, Viola

WWII

Viola was born in Saskatchewan in 1925, one of ten children born to Clarence and Elsie (McNabb) Meng of Crystal Springs. Viola joined the Canadian Women's Army Corp and served in Canada. She married Ernest Jonas and lived in Waterloo, Ontario. They had no children. She passed away in 2000.

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#### **MERLET, Paul Alexander**

WWII

Paul was born in Estevan, Saskatchewan, on February 4, 1914. He joined the Army and was posted to the Loyal Edmonton Regiment and served as Signaller in Infantry in Italy, Canada and the United Kingdom. He was wounded in action and lost his left leg below the knee. He was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp. He returned to his home of Forget, Saskatchewan, and served as Post Master until his death from cancer in 1954.

#### MILLER, Andrew P.

WWII

Andrew joined the Ghunka Rifles, Captain RCAAC. He passed away on November 27, 1982. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion.

#### MILLER, Joseph M.

wwii

Joseph joined the Royal Canadian Air Force #35 RAF Pathfinder Force as a rear air gunner. On what was to be his last flight, Joe and his crew on their Lancaster Bomber were shot down during a raid over Stuttgart and all were killed in action on July 25, 1944. Joe is buried at Dunbach War Cemetery, Germany. By 1944, he had completed three full flight assignments and was due for a deserved homecoming but never did get his leave of absence. Miller Lake in northern Saskatchewan is named in his honour.



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#### MOHNINGER, Jacob "Jack"

WWII

Jacob "Jack" Mohninger was born on December 27, 1921, on a farm near St. Brieux, Saskatchewan. He was of German and possibly Russian decent having been born in Canada to German immigrants whose history included the Volga Germans who had spent generations cultivating land in Russia. He attended school near the family farm at Little Moose Lake and received his grade 8 which was the highest education available in the area at that time. He was one of seven children, all of whom worked on their family farm. Later he and his brothers hired themselves out to neighbouring farms to earn extra money for the family.

On November 4, 1941, he volunteered for active service early during World War II with the Canadian Army and


served all through Europe receiving numerous medals. He received the 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star, Defence Medal, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and War Medal 1939-1945.

Eventually, at the rank of Private, he received an honourable discharge returning home in November 1945. Unfortunately, his mother had died one month before and the family had been unable to get word to him and his brothers.

Jack met Mary Nagy soon after coming back and apparently it was love at first sight. They married July 2, 1948, and in time moved onto their own land. There they would begin a family welcoming nine children. He gave up farming in 1970 and moved his family to Prince Albert, Saskatchewan and then eventually to Lloydminster, Saskatchewan where he found employment in the oil patch operating a backhoe. He worked until his retirement at age 62 with some support from Veterans Affairs. He enjoyed this break greatly, but it was not to last. He died six years later of cancer at the age of 67, in June 1988.

Jack had an amazing and brilliant mind and had there been other opportunities in his life there is no telling what he could have accomplished. He had seen so many wonders and terrors in this world but from it all, gained so much wisdom. There had been many trials in this man's life, but what is remembered is that he was quick to smile, faster to shoot out a joke or simply amuse you with his witty demeanor. Jack refused to talk about his years in active service and resisted any questions from his curious children. However, after a chance meeting, at the Legion, with an old army buddy he had served with, and after a couple of beverages, the two talked late into the night. His youngest children, still at home, sat at their feet in rapture, not wanting to make a sound in case he remembered they were there and sent them off to bed. They spoke of laughter but also of unshed tears; of men who had made it onto the ship home and of those who did not and why. That night, Jack freed himself of so much that had been going on inside.

Jack loved his children even though nine could almost run him over really. He lived to see many of his grandchildren and the pride in his eyes was undeniable. He loved cards, especially Kaiser and cribbage. He would play long into the night and passed the love of those games and of family time onto his children. He was also a shark at checkers and legend says he was a champion amongst his ranks while overseas. The leaves and branches of the family tree he planted are now immense and although he has been gone for so many years, his legacy and memory live on. His family is immensely proud of his service to this country and for the freedom we all enjoy today. We Remember; we will always remember.











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#### MONTGOMERY, Roy William




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


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#### MOORE, Wesley James "Wes"

Howard was born in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, in 1922. He joined the Canadian Engineers and served in Canada. He passed away in 2001.




#### MORRIS, Brian Charles





















#### MOTHERWELL, Alexander "Sandy"

He was wounded twice and was in hospital in England for seven months before being sent to Shaughnessy Military Hospital in Vancouver where he spent the next one-and-a-half years. He returned to farm in Mawer, but the injuries to his legs affected him his entire life. Huff passed away on February 22, 1998.





#### MURRAY, Charles "Chic"

Charles was born in Perth, Scotland, in 1923. He joined the FIFE & FORFAR YEOMANARY, serving in Holland, Germany and France, and was a tank driver or an operator of the flame thrower with the 7<sup>th</sup> Armoured Division of the Desert Rats. He drove one of the tanks up onto the Gold Beach at Normandy on D-Day. Charles passed away on November 11, 2001.










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












#### MURRAY, Fred L.

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
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#### **NEILL, Quinn Charles**

He worked for many years for J. R. Leach and Sons and Greenland Farm Equipment in Prince Albert. They then moved to P.A. in 1974, and he kept working until he passed away in 1979.





#### **NELSON, Milford "Mel"**

WWII

Milford was born in Broderick, Saskatchewan, in 1922; one of six children born to Joseph and Emma Nelson, who moved to the Hagen district from Broderick in 1933. He served with the Royal Canadian Air Force during the war. He married Ruby Robertson in British Columbia in 1948, and lived there for several years. Mel worked for the CPR, and they moved to Calgary where he worked for Canada Manpower until his passing in 1972.



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#### **NESSETH, Kermit**

WWII

Kermit was born in Pekin, North Dakota, USA, on October 20, 1919. He enlisted in the Army in 1941 as a machinist, serving in France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was discharged in 1946 and lived in West Vancouver and operated a bulldozer. He received the War Medal 1939-1945 and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp. Kermit passed away on May 1, 1985.

#### **NESSETH**, Murnet

WWII

Murnet was born in Speers, Saskatchewan, on May 17, 1925. He joined the Army in 1934 with the motorized infantry, serving in France, Holland and Germany. He was discharged in 1946, and worked in Smith's Radiator Shop north of Battleford, SK. He received the War Medal 1939-1945 and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp. Murnet passed away on February 29, 2004.



#### **NEWTON, Thomas "Tom"**

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
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
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#### **NIESMAN, Gordon Frederick**

A Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp in his honour was received by his sister Mrs. Adelle Ward of Bounty. Corporal Nikirk was also awarded the Italy Star Defense Medal. He is buried at Cassino War Cemetery, Frosinone, Italy.

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
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
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#### **OSHENAK**, Steve

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
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#### PATTERSON, Clyde

WWII



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#### **PENNY, Douglas Richard**


WWII

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


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#### PENNYCOOK, Robert "Bob"

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#### PILLER, Roderick "Roddie"

Roderick Piller, or Roddie, as he was affectionately known by family and friends, was born on the family farm near Grayson, Saskatchewan on December 20, 1924. In an interview, he mentioned that he went to 'the cow barns' in Regina where he enlisted in the Canadian Army in 1943. Rod said, "They had nice showers instead of the small tub on the farm and they had flush toilets. It was quite a change and quite strange to strip with fifty other guys to go for a medical or shower with ten other guys, but it didn't take long to get over the shyness, though." After completing basic training in Prince Albert, he went to Camp Borden in Ontario for advanced training in the tank corps. Roddie found the tanks a little too confusing and asked to become a dispatch rider. After a while, he was not sure which was worse or more dangerous.

After advanced training, he shipped out to England, landing at the Firth of Forth in Scotland. Eventually, he was sent to Italy with the Nova Scotia Regiment, an infantry outfit. There, they trained under the shadow of Mount Etna, at Avalino near Naples. As part of the Canadian Army 1<sup>st</sup> Division, he went to the front

lines at Ortona, and their division saw some of the fiercest fighting in the Italian campaign. The battle, that lasted 21 days, was fought between two battalions of elite German Fallschirmjager (paratroops) from the German 1st Parachute Division and the Canadian troops from the 1st Infantry Division among others. Roddie said, "I remember the stone houses. We had to go through them rather than up the streets of the towns because of the snipers. And a bad thing was the booby traps. Another bad thing was going out on night patrol not knowing if you were going into a minefield. It was fierce fighting. The Germans didn't want to give up Italy because it kept the allies tied up."

By January 1945, the Italian campaign was over, and his regiment sailed to Calais where they began the long march to Arnhem. There they engaged the German forces occupying the Netherlands. In Holland, at a place called Apeldoorn, along with his regiment, the West Nova Scotia Regiment, they liberated the people at a place called Woudhuis (Forest House). A family that he helped, at the time, reached out to him after the war to thank him for his gallantry. As the letter was written in Dutch, it was several years before he could have it translated, after which they corresponded for many years. The regiment was at Scheveningen on the North Sea when VE Day dawned. On the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of the Liberation of Holland, he and his wife went to Amsterdam along with many other servicemen. While there, Rod participated in ceremonies and parades and was able to explore the country in a relaxed setting.

Rod volunteered to be part of the occupational force in Europe after the war ended. He joined the Provost Corps and spent one year in Germany as part of a force that was trying to control the black market that tried to sell everything from boots to trucks to ships. In December 1946, he returned to Canada and would receive his discharge in February 1947. Another quote from his interview, "I wouldn't have missed it, but I wouldn't do it again for all the money in the world. I shouldn't say that because maybe I would, if it was needed. Again, maybe I say that, because I came home in one piece, including my mind." Roddie felt that serving in World War II was one of the most important things he did in his life.

Roddie married in 1950 and raised five children. He worked all over western Canada and the Northwest Territories. He had been born and raised on the farm and if he could have made a decent living at it, he'd rather farm than anything else. His roots were in the land, and he never strayed too far from it.

While living in Calgary, he served in the Provost Corps active reserve. Roddie was active in The Royal Canadian Legion from 1957 until his death on June 25, 1999. He was on the Board of Directors in Camrose, Alberta serving as 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice-President and Vice-President. He was also in the Colour Party.

Roddie shared his gift of music by playing the fiddle that he learned at the age of twelve. He played by ear and even made up his own compositions. After retirement, he served his community by volunteering and helping others. He was a man of honour and integrity. At his death, he left his wife, Agnes, of 48 years, four children, being predeceased by his oldest son, seven grandchildren and one great grandchild to cherish his memory.




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





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#### **PINCHBECK, Victor**








#### PINKNEY, William Joseph


WWI

In November 1946, Adam, his wife Marion and Marion s brother Joe purchased land near Pierceland, SK with the intention of developing a dairy/mixed farming operation. Adam passed away on February 11, 1964.




#### POLONICH, John

















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#### PONTIUS, Jacob "George"

Archie was born on April 13, 1904, in Elkwood, North Dakota and came to Canada in 1911. He attended Gordon School near Hardy, Saskatchewan and Ceylon School. He worked on several farms. He married in January 1927 and they tried to farm in Hardy district in the Dirty Thirties. They moved the farmhouse into Hardy in 1940.

In May 1940, Archie joined the Army with the 25<sup>th</sup> Field Coy, Royal Canadian Engineers to serve during World War II. He went first to Prince Albert, Chilliwack BC and Nanaimo on Vancouver Island. He went overseas in May 1944, returned in December 1945, and was discharged on February 7, 1946. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp and the Defence of Britain Medal 1939-1945.



On February 7, 1946, he was sent to Fort San as he had tuberculosis and he spent a number of years there and one year in Saskatoon San where he had several operations including one to remove one of his lungs. He was discharged from Fort San on May 21, 1953 and they purchased a wartime house in Regina.

Archie worked at a few jobs and he joined The Royal Canadian Legion Regina Branch 1. While at Fort San they had set up the Tuberculosis Veterans Service and he continued to work with that all his life. On December 30, 1963, he was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms at the Saskatchewan Legislature Assembly until 1965. Then reappointed in 1971 until he retired on May 15, 1981. He had two sons and two daughters. Archie passed away in Regina in April 1984.












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#### PORTEN, Archibald M.









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












#### **PORTER, James Robert**

WWI

James Robert Porter was working on a farm near Bounty, Saskatchewan when he enlisted in Winnipeg on July 12, 1915, at the age of 25. Born on October 10, 1890, he was the son of Thomas Porter of Inch Island, Donegal County, Ireland. Corporal Porter was a member of the Canadian Infantry, 13<sup>th</sup> Battalion. He sailed from Halifax on the *SS Lapland* on April 24, 1916. Ninety-eight days later, he found himself in France as a member of the 13<sup>th</sup> Battalion. On the first day of the Battle of Vimy Ridge, April 9, 1917, he was killed in the trenches southeast of Neuville-Saint-Vaast, 3.2 kilometres south of the famous Canadian War Memorial at Vimy Ridge. His name is inscribed on the base of the Vimy Memorial, along with the names of 11,284 of his comrades who do not have a known grave.

#### **POULTON, Alan Ronald**

Alan was born in Saskatchewan in 1925 and enlisted with the First Armoured Car Battery Canadian Armoured Corps serving in England and Sicily. He was killed in action in Sicily in 1943.





#### PTOLEMY, Jesse Fraser

WWI

Jesse was born in Markdale, Ontario, on April 15, 1896. He enlisted with the 1<sup>st</sup> Depot Battalion Saskatchewan Regiment on July 10, 1918, and served in Canada. He was discharged on November 12, 1919, and returned to farm in Saskatchewan. He married in 1927 and raised four daughters. He retired in 1963 in Dinsmore and passed away on October 22, 1979.

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#### PUKAS, Joseph


WWII

While stationed in southern England, Arndal Castle, Kent and other communities, he met Gladys Kimber. They married and had four children. They came home to North Portal, SK, where they farmed until his passing on December 14, 1990.

#### PURSE, James Clarence "Jim"

Jim enlisted as an Ordinary Seaman on December 9, 1942, at HMCS Chippawa in Winnipeg, MB. He was called to active service on March 11, 1943, and served on corvettes as part of the naval convoy escorts to England and Ireland. The living conditions were very basic with few creature comforts. Jim was 6' 1" when he enlisted and always said that he had permanent dents on his head from trying to duck through the doorways inside the ship. Jim qualified as a signalman in June 1943, and served on various vessels including the HMCS Stadacona, HMCS Algoma, HMCS Oakville and HMCS Givenchy. He was demobilized on January 25, 1946. Jim passed away in September 1999. His remains are interred in the Veterans' Cemetery in Esquimalt, BC, called God's Acre.





#### QUAYLE, Herbert Montgomery SPECIAL AREA DUTY & PEACETIME

Herbert was born in Strangford, County Down, Northern Ireland in 1919; the younger son of Hedley and Mary Quayle. Bert married Rowana Brien in August 1948, and served with the Home Guard and Air Force during World War II, serving in England and Ireland. The family immigrated to Canada in 1951 and became involved in farming with his uncle John Strain. They had a family of three boys and one girl and were involved with church and school communities. Bert was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Birch Hills Branch 122 for 54 years. He passed away in 2006.





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
#### **QUINNELL, Clarence Leonard**

Clarence was born in Melfort in 1917. He was farming with his family when he enlisted in Saskatoon in late 1941. Trooper Clarence Leonard Quinnell, of Star City, Saskatchewan, was killed in action on August 8, 1944, in Operation Totalize during the push to Falaise and is buried at Bretteville-sur-Laize Canadian War Cemetery in Calvados, France. He was the son of Charles and Ella Quinnell who came from North Dakota to homestead NE4-44-17-W2 southwest of Star City. Clarence left a wife, Geraldine, and daughter, Marilyn Joan who moved to her home at Battle Heights northeast of Carrot River after he went overseas.


























#### **RAMAGE**, Lawrence Hunter

#### RAMSHAW, Arthur Charles Edward "Art"

WWII

Arthur was born in Nokomis, Saskatchewan on February 18, 1918. He enlisted in the Canadian Army in fall 1940, at age 22 and went to Regina for training. In spring 1941 he was sent overseas where he survived ground action in Europe. At the end of the war in 1945, he met Betty Stitchbury at a dance in England. They married at an Anglican Church in Thundersley on December 22, 1945. In spring 1946, Art was discharged from service and sent home. Art received the French Medal for bravery and was knighted. He went to Chicago on his way back to visit his mother, Ida, and then came by train back to Canada. Art is a sixty-year member of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 290 in Nokomis. Art received a birthday card from Queen Elizabeth for reaching his milestone 100th birthday. On February 18, 2023, Arthur celebrated his 105th birthday.





#### RANDALL, Florence

Florence was born in Hanley, Saskatchewan. She enlisted in the Navy in 1943, serving in Halifax. She married Ed Brotheridge and lived in Waskada, Manitoba. She passed away in 1974.

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#### RANDALL, Robert


WWII

Robert Reeve was born on August 6, 1888, in a village called Wing in Rutlandshire, England. His parents were William Sherard Reeve and Mary Reeve. Before he emigrated to Canada, Robert served four years with the Leicester Imperial Yeomanry. He identified Bounty as his home and farming as his occupation when he enlisted in Saskatoon on November 10, 1914, with the 32<sup>nd</sup> Battalion. He was 26 years old at the time. He sailed from Halifax aboard the *SS Vanderland* on February 23, 1915. His papers indicate that the Theatre of War where he served was France where he began his duties on March 8, 1915. He was killed in action on June 2, 1916, at Sanctuary Wood where the Canadian Corp fought in the defence of Ypres from April to August of that year. He is buried at Larch Wood Cemetery, near leper, Belgium, where there are 542 Canadian casualties. The Canadian Memorial at the Sanctuary Wood site features a 15-tonne block of white Quebec granite. Many of the gravestones in the nearby cemetery bear the date of June 1916. The inscription on Private Robert Reeve's gravestone reads: "Do thy duty that is best/ Leave unto God the rest."





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


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REID, Earl E. WWII

Earl was born in Renown, Saskatchewan, on March 14, 1921. He enlisted in 1941 in the Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps, serving in England, France, Germany and Holland. He was wounded and taken as a prisoner of war until May 6, 1945. In 1967, Edwin was sent to Toronto with the Carlyle Legion to attend a Prisoner of War Reunion where he got to see many old friends. He and his wife were both life members of The Royal Canadian Legion. He attended many reunions and they got to meet Colonel Merritt. Edwin passed away on December 13, 1996.



#### REID (ORTON), Evelyn

WWII

Evelyn was born in Winton, Saskatchewan, on August 20, 1918; the seventh in a family of ten children born to Wilfred Richard and Annie May Orton. She took a correspondence course in stenography and then joined the Canadian Women's Army Corps and was stationed in Ottawa. After the war, she went to Rehab School, and in 1947, she married Frank Evans of New Market, ON, and they had two children: Jean and Dick. After fourteen years of marriage, Frank passed away and the family moved back to Crystal Springs. Evelyn married Arthur Reid in 1967, and they farmed at Crystal Springs until Evelyn passed away on June 22, 1998.






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


















#### **REID, Gordon Albert**

Gordon was born in Canwood, Saskatchewan, in 1924. He joined the Cameron Highlands at the age of nineteen and took his training in Yarmouth, NS, and Borden, ON. He was sent to Holland as a stretcher bearer until the end of the war. Gordon passed away in 1987.

#### **REMOLE**, Douglas William

WWII

Douglas William Remole's parents, Roy Halverson Remole and Minnie Catherine Remole, were married in Outlook, Saskatchewan. They came from Norway to Bounty, Saskatchewan where they set up a homestead in 1911. The couple moved to Vanscoy in 1928 and in 1937 to Carstairs, Alberta. Their son Douglas William attended Vanscoy School for grades 1 to 6 and Carstairs for Grades 7 to 10.

Douglas, age 19, identified Vanscoy as his home address when he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force on October 15, 1942 in Calgary. He was a truck driver and a student at the time. He listed hockey, swimming and hunting as his favourite pastimes.

He had served 494 days, including 117 days overseas with Lincolnshire Squadron 630 of the RAF, when he was killed in a tragic accident. In total darkness on the night of February 20, 1944, Rear Gunner Remole and the



crew of a four-engine Lancaster III bomber took off at 23:43 hours from the RAF airfield at East Kirkley. The aircraft, which was carrying 4,000 pounds of bombs, crashed 200 yards from the airfield and was completely destroyed by the resulting explosion. All six crewmembers were killed. An inquiry determined that pilot inexperience may have been the cause of the accident.

Rev. Norris, a Canadian chaplain, conducted a full-service funeral for Douglas William Remole on February 24, 1944. He was laid to rest at the Stonefell Cemetery in Harrowgate. His mother received her son's Memorial Cross, Operational Wings and Certificate from Chief of Air Staff W. A. Dicks on August 22, 1946. Douglas William Remole's brother, Roy Gordon Remole, served as a RCAF flight instructor in England during World War II.

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
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












# RHODENISER, Willis Edward

Early in 1942, Ross attended The Dominion Provincial Youth Training School for four weeks in Moose Jaw, after which he joined the Royal Canadian Air Force as a wireless mechanic. He spent ten weeks at Wireless School in Queen Mary's Road in Montreal, during which time he was involved in the Precision Drill Team which put on quite a number of parades and shows in Montreal. It was then off to Shelbourne, NS and then on to St. John's, NL by which time he was a Flight Sergeant. His job was to help look after the communications in the St. John's area which was basically supporting the communications effort for the Battle of the Atlantic. After VE Day in May 1945, there was not much work to be done in Newfoundland, so he volunteered to go over to England where there was still a need for people to help solve the problems of repatriating all of the servicemen. He took a cut in rank to Sergeant and was there for nine months during which time he was stationed in Bournemouth, Reading, and Torquay. He was discharged in May 1946. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, Defence Medal and War Medal 1939-1945. Ross passed away on February 28, 2008.





## RICHARDS, David A.

**SPECIAL DUTY AREA** 

David was born on August 15, 1953. He enlisted in the Canadian Army in 1971 and served at Royal Roads Military College in Victoria, BC from 1971 to 1973; Royal Military College in Kingston, Ontario from 1973 to 1975; 1 Service Battalion, 1 Combat Group in Calgary, AB from 1975 to 1977; 450 Helicopter Squadron in Ottawa, ON from 1977 to 1979. David retired in 1979 at the rank of Captain.



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
# RICHARDS (SELINGER), Katharina

Katharina was born on November 4, 1922. She enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force Women's Division in April 1942. She served in Toronto, Ontario for six weeks at a Boot Camp in 1942; Telephone Operator in Brandon, Manitoba in June 1942; went to Gander, NL via Halifax in July 1942; remustered to Code and Cypher in December 1942; took a cypher course in Guelph, Ontario from January 1943 to February 1943; Pacific Headquarters from Vancouver to Prince Rupert, BC; Ottawa RCAF Headquarters in October 1943; St. John's, NL in July 1944; Halifax Headquarters in July 1945; and Regina, Saskatchewan. 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
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# **ROBERTSON, John Charles Ross**

During a twelve-year teaching career, he taught at Rose Valley and Wartime before coming to Outlook district in 1932 as principal of Broderick School.

In January 1940, he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force as an AC2. Jack served overseas in Britain, stationed at bases in York and Bournemouth as flying control officer for three-and-a-half years, obtaining the rank of Squadron Leader. He was awarded the Defence Medal, the Canada Volunteer Service Medal and the War Medal 1939-1945 including oak leaves for being mentioned in Dispatches by order of King George VI.

Upon Jack's return to Canada in 1945 at the conclusion of the war, he entered the automotive business, later known as Reid Motors. In Outlook, he worked as the parts manager until his passing in 1973. He served for a time as chairperson of the Outlook Local School Board and was active in the work of St. Andrew's United Church as a parishioner and, for a time, as a member of the Committee of Stewards.

He passed away on January 2, 1973. His family included his wife Anne, one daughter Allana (Jim Biss) of Saskatoon, three grandsons, John, Jim and Shea and two granddaughters, Amaia and Avery.

# ROBINSON, Reginald "Reg"

Reg was born in 1915 in Birch Hills, Saskatchewan, and enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1938 and took his training in Eastern Canada spending some time in England.

He came back to Canada and was posted to several stations in Eastern Canada. Reg decided to stay in the service, and in 1955, spent three years in France, coming back to Trenton and retiring there. Reg and Helena had two sons and two daughters. He passed away in 1979.







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






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
# **RODGER, William Stewart**

WWII

Stewart was born in Maple Creek, Saskatchewan, on August 26, 1912. At the age of 31, he was considered too old for service overseas by the Canadian authorities. He was one of the over 600 Canadian officers loaned to the British Army. He landed on the beach in France on D-Day and continued through the European campaign and into the occupation of Berlin. He was proud and pleased to serve with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion Devonshire Regiment and with Brigade Headquarters, both of the 7<sup>th</sup> Armoured Division (Desert Rats). He enlisted in May 1942, and was discharged on January 11, 1946. Stewart passed away on May 21, 1986.

# RODGERSON, Emerson Lorne KOREA & SPECIAL DUTY & PEACETIME

Emerson was born in O'Leary, PEI, on May 11, 1930. He joined the Canadian Army on August 13, 1950, and was discharged on October 20, 1952. He joined the RCAF on August 4, 1953, and was discharged on January 31, 1968. He then joined the regular component on February 1, 1968, to December 24, 1972, having served in Korea, Canada and the USA. He received the Korean Star and the United Nations medal. After his release, he worked for the DPW. Emerson passed away on June 11, 1997.



## ROULSTON, George

WWII

George was born in the Ingleside District of Marchwell, Saskatchewan, on April 1, 1919. He joined the 2<sup>nd</sup> Canadian Engineers Eq. workshop RCEME on May 1, 1941 in a motor mechanics and good drivers mechanical course and was assigned to the important position of regimental water duties responsible for purifying all the water for the regiment. He received his motor vehicle mechanics certificate completing a course on diesel mechanics. As a Lance Corporal, he saw active duty in Canada, the United Kingdom, and Continental Europe. He was discharged on October 22, 1945. He married Alice in 1948 and they raised a family of two. George worked in a garage for many years and then operated his own garage in Marchwell and retired to Langenburg in 1980. He enjoyed playing cards and sports, especially golf. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, France and Germany Star, 1939-1945 Star, War Medal 1939-1945, and Defence Medal. George passed away on March 25, 1999.



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
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# **ROULSTON, Leonard**

WWII

Leonard was born in the Ingleside District, south of Marchwell, Saskatchewan, on April 12, 1921. He joined the 101st LAA Battery with the 4th Canadian Division in 1942 and served most of the European countries. After he returned home in the fall of 1945, he was not well because of the memories of the duties as a gunner. He farmed with his brother-in-law and never married, but loved all children. He passed away on May 27, 1990 and is buried at the Ingleside Cemetery, south of Marchwell, Saskatchewan.

# **ROULSTON, Lorne E.**

WWII

Lorne was born in the Ingleside District, south of Marchwell, Saskatchewan, on April 12, 1921. He joined the 42<sup>nd</sup> Canadian General Transport Division in 1942 serving in Canada and the United Kingdom. He was killed in an explosion on October 20, 1944 and his memory is remembered on the Groesbeck Memorial in Nijmegen, Holland. In northern Saskatchewan, there is a lake called Roulston Lake named after him because of his bravery and committed service to his country. Lorne was an easy-going man with a happy disposition and loved teasing and joking around.



# **ROUSE, Charles James**

WWII

Charles was named after his paternal grandfather Charles Rouse of Brampton Hill, Leicestershire County, England. His father Herbert Walter Rouse served with distinction in World War I. Charles was born in Vancouver on April 28, 1922. As a student at Milden School he enjoyed high jump and long jump. He was also interested in hunting. Notes from his service record indicate that he was "intelligent," "industrious" and that "he reflects his good home life." He had just completed his grade eleven provincial examinations and was waiting for the results when he enlisted with the Royal Canadian Air Force in Saskatoon on August 9, 1942 (he passed all his exams). After training, he was posted overseas with RAF Squadron 576. Altogether, he served 502 days until the Lancaster bomber he was aboard on a mission over target Chemnitz, Germany was involved in a mid-air collision with another plane late at night on March 5, 1945. Reported missing, he and the other six members of the flight crew were declared killed in action on March 6, 1945. His Wing Commander, Fraser Alliden wrote to Flying Officer Rouse's parents expressing condolences and describing their son as a "popular officer." His parents, Herbert Walter and Isabelle Rouse, were presented with a Memorial Cross and Operation Wings on behalf of their son who is commemorated at the famous Runnymede Memorial near London.



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# **ROUSE**, Herbert Walter

WWI

Corporal Herbert Walter Rouse of the 128th Battalion, Saskatchewan Regiment, was born in Groby, Leicestershire County, England on July 29, 1893. He arrived in the Milden district in 1911 where he lived on a farm. At the age of 22, he enlisted in Moose Jaw on December 9, 1915. His military service occurred in England and France. While serving with the 46th Battalion, he suffered a gunshot wound to his left leg on August 12, 1918 and recuperated in Bear Wood Hospital between August 23, and September 18 when he was declared fit for service. In total, he served 21 months in France where he was awarded the Military Medal on April 30, 1918. He was discharged in Regina on January 22, 1919, at the age of 25. After the war, he returned to Milden where he resumed farming. He and Isabelle Baird were married in Milden on June 18, 1919. They had two sons, Milton Thomas and Charles James. Flying Officer Charles James Rouse of RAF Squadron 576 was killed in action on March 6, 1945. Herbert Rouse also served in the Home Guard during World War II. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion. Herbert Walter Rouse died on May 20, 1969, at the age of 75. He is buried in the Milden Cemetery.

# **ROYAL**, Willis Randolf



Willis Randolf Royal, Regina Rifles Whitecap Dakota Nation

Willis Royal was born on May 20, 1930. He attended Brandon Residential School. He also spent time living with relatives on the Fort Peck Reservation in Reservation in Montana.

During the years of Occupational Forces in Germany, Willis Royal enlisted with the Regina Rifles, training at Valcartier, Quebec. He was later transferred to the Winnipeg Rifles. He joined the forces August 21, 1950 and was sent overseas November 8, 1950. He remained on active duty stationed in Hanover, Germany. After two years duty in Northern and Central, he sailed for home on November 8, 1953; he spent November 11, out in the Atlantic. A "Kahomni" was held on the reserve for his return home. After a visit at home, Willis was posted, in Calgary, with the 1st Battalion, Queens Own Rifles of Canada, from January to May 1954. He was discharged May 24, 1954 in Regina.



Willis married Victoria Eagle in 1957. They raised a family of six daughters. He worked as a carpenter, laborer and custodian and has contributed to the community of Whitecap over the years. He designed the Whitecap Dakota Nation logo in 1996. He also helped with the design of the outside of the school when it was first built.

In 1999, Willis Royal received a Special Service Medal in recognition of serving with the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO); servicing in a Special Duty area (SDA) in Western Europe know as "Cold War Era". A "sincere congratulations" accompanied his award. His family honored him with a round dance and feast in April 2000.

On Tuesday October 9, 2012 Elder Veteran Royal was presented with a Queens Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal for significations contributions. On September 19, 2014, His Royal Highness Prince Edward, the Earl of Wessex, unveiled the "Spirit of Alliance" War of 1812 Monument as part of his visit to Saskatchewan. The monument was commissioned by the Whitecap Dakota Nation.





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


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RUPERT, Earl WWII

Earl was born in Melfort, Saskatchewan on September 4, 1922. He enlisted in Prince Albert straight out of high school, the day before Canada declared war. He was wounded by an enemy artillery shell at Valguarnera. Sergeant Earl Rupert (Saskatoon Light Infantry) died on July 20, 1943 of his wounds and is buried at Agira Canadian War Cemetery in Enna, Sicily, Italy. He was the son of Roy and May Rupert. # **RUSK**, David Graydon

WWII

David was born in 1923 on his grandparents' farm. He joined the Army in 1941 and went overseas in 1942, spending two-and-a-half years in England and one year in France, Holland, and Germany with the Montreal Black Watch Regiment. He was wounded in Germany in April 1945, and was discharged from the Army in 1946. In December 1949, he married Mary Brickson from Cookson and raised three boys: Raymond, Brian and Garry. He loved the farm and his family. David passed away from cancer in 1990, and Mary passed away in 2004.





# RUSK, Joseph "Joe"

WWII

Joe was born in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, on August 17, 1919. He joined the Army in April 1941, serving with the 110<sup>th</sup> Battery, 15 Field Regiment, Royal Canadian Artillery in England, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He returned to Canada in November 1945, and received his discharge on January 7, 1946. In June of 1964, Joe married Kay Hreneyk, a registered nurse in Samburn, SK. In December 1966, they went to Los Angeles and settled in San Diego, California. Joe and Kay later returned to British Columbia and in 1980 bought land and built a home in Stump Lake, SK. Both Joe and Kay were active in the Seventh Day Adventist Church. He passed away on January 4, 2003.









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# RUSK, Joseph Alexander "Alex"

WWI

Alex was born in Ravena, Ontario, on October 23, 1890. He was stationed in Moose Jaw, SK, with the 229th Battalion in 1916, where he met Adeline and got married on May 27 of that year. He was transferred to Camp Hughes, where the soldiers were living in tents. Because of the rain, Alex got very sick and was sent home for one month to recover, but when he returned to camp, he was discharged as he still had not recovered. Alex and his wife homesteaded at Belle Plain, SK, and raised seven boys and one girl. Alex passed away in 1964, and Adeline passed away in Kamloops, BC, in 1989.

# **RUSSELL, Joseph Vincent**

WWII

Joseph was born in 1920. He enlisted in the Air Force in June 1941, serving in Canada and Germany. He was awarded the Conspicuous Gallantry Medal. He passed away on February 21, 1944 and is buried at Bontenheim Cemetery in Germany.



# RYBINSKI, Henry (Hieronim)

WWII

Henry was born in 1914 in Runda, Pomorze, Poland. He took part in the campaign in Poland from September 1 to September 22, 1939, and rejoined the Polish Forces under French command in France on May 1, 1940. He evacuated to the United Kingdom and arrived on June 23, 1940 and came under British Command on July 1, 1940. He served with 1st Polish Armoured Division in the United Kingdom in the United Kingdom from 1940 to 1944 and on the continent from 1944 to 1945 where he took part in the operations in France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He returned to the United Kingdom on August 2, 1945, served with 24th and 25th Supply Coy in the United Kingdom and with the PRC until discharged on emigration to Canada. He received the 1939-1945 Star, France and Germany Star and the Defence Medal. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Melfort Branch 30. Henry passed away on November 16, 2001.



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
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# RYLAND, Robert William "Bill"




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# SANDERSON, William B.

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# SATHER, Kristen


WWII

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
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
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# SCHELL, Charlie

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
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
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# SCHLICHEMEYER, Henry



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
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# SCHUWEILER, Stephen George

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
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SHAW, Robert WWI

WWII



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
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# SHORT, Grover Eber



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#### SIMPSON, Thomas Russell



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
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#### **SKELLY, Edward Ambrose**

#### SMITH, David Harold








#### **SMITH, Percy Charles William**

WWII








#### STEADMAN, George Harry



Allan was posted from Cape Breton Island to Vancouver Island and then went overseas on the ship Amsterdam arriving in Scotland and serving with the Regina Rifles 3<sup>rd</sup> Division as a gunner. He was stationed in England and fought the Germans in Belgium, France and Germany. He was in a barn in Emden, Germany, when the war was over and he did guard duty in Utrecht, Holland. After returning on the ship Queen Elizabeth and on to Ontario by train, he signed up to go fight the Japanese but the war with them was soon over so he didn't go. He returned to Le Roy in early 1946 and farmed for many years, first at Le Roy, then Buchanan, and eventually moving to Yorkton, where he worked several years as a night auditor in a hotel. He had four children. Allan passed away on April 14, 2001.

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


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
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#### STEWART, Charles Milton


WWI

Charles Milton Steward was born January 29, 1888, in Lanark, Ontario. Charles was 26 years old and listed his occupation as farmer. Prior to enlistment, he served several years with the Canadian Militia. He was attached to the First Canadian Mounted Rifles, Saskatchewan Regiment, rising to the rank of Lieutenant. Charles landed in France on September 22, 1915. On September 16, 1916, he received a shrapnel wound to the right side of his chest. He spent a month in hospital before he was declared medically fit for service. Charles Milton Stewart was killed in action at Vimy Ridge on April 9, 1917. He was awarded the Military Cross. Lieutenant Stewart is buried at Thelus Military Cemetery north of Arras.

#### STEWART, John

WWI

John was born in Perth, Scotland, on August 21, 1885. He enlisted with the 96<sup>th</sup> Battalion Canadian Highlanders in 1916, and served at Vimy Ridge, Hill 70. He was wounded and was discharged in 1918 and worked at carpentry in Calgary. He returned to farm at Mervin in 1921, and was a founding member of The Royal Canadian Legion Mervin Branch until his passing in April 1976.



#### STEWART, John Alan Gordon

WWII

John was born in Daysville, Saskatchewan, on October 8, 1921. He enlisted in the Army as a leading aircraftsman in 1939 and served in England, Ireland and Scotland. He was discharged in 1945 and returned to Canada to work in road construction. He married Leena Belche, and they had one daughter and resided in North Battleford, SK. John passed away in November 1978. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Mervin Branch 121 for 33 years.



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



Harry was born in Canada in 1893. He enlisted with the CHA Corps in September 1914, and served in France. He was discharged in May 1919 and received the General Service Medal and the Victory Medal. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Earl Grey Branch 137.

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#### STRACHAN, George Alexander

WWII

George was born in 1917 in Melfort, Saskatchewan. He enlisted in the Army on July 2, 1940. He was a cadet in both Pleasantdale and Melfort before enlisting and had expected to be called up and he was not, so he enlisted instead. George went overseas and was assigned to Artillery, and became a member of the 1st Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment and was stationed in England. In 1943, his unit became part of the Italian campaign. During this campaign, his gun crew had driven over a landmine and were blown up. George suffered permanent hearing loss. He was discharged on August 7, 1945. George passed away in 2009.

#### STRACHAN, Joseph

Joseph was born in 1887 in Edzell, Scotland and came to Canada settling in Vancouver, BC. When World War I broke out, he was called up by the British Government as he was enlisted in His Majesty's Reserves. He was able to get permission to enlist with a Canadian unit from Vancouver and went overseas with a transport battalion of the Army Service Corps. He was exposed to gas but managed to finish the war. Upon his return to Canada, he joined his brother in Pleasantdale and homesteaded.

Margaret was born on September 2, 1923, to Frank and Kate Langley. She was raised on the farm situated between Speers and Maymont. She enlisted in Saskatoon on May 29, 1943 and was assigned to HMCS Bytown in Ottawa. She was transferred to Conestoga Base in Galt, Ontario on January 27, 1944, then to Cornwallis, NS on March 25, 1944. She then went back to Ottawa in May then shipped out on December 27, 1944 to HMCS Niobe, the British headquarters of the Royal Canadian Navy based in Inverclyde, Scotland. She returned to Peregrine Base in Halifax on July 8, 1945; to Shelburne, NS on September 19, 1945; back to Halifax on November 29, 1945; then to Donatona Base in Montreal on January 16, 1946. She was discharged to the Nurse's Residence at the Victoria Hospital in Montreal. With the Women's Royal Canadian Navy, she was a WREN writer and drafted various office records. She was granted an eight-week harvest leave from August to October 1944. Her father requested the leave so she could come home and help drive truck, tractor, and combine for harvest. Margaret married Chuck Strautman and moved to the farm between Speers and Mayfair where they raised three children. They eventually retired to Saskatoon where she resided until her death on September 4, 2018, at the age of 95.

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
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
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#### **SUTTON, Arthur William**

Arthur was born in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, on August 27, 1920. He enlisted with the RCNVR Naval British Aircraft Carriers on September 22, 1939. After training, in 1943, he served on Squadron 1830 HMS Saker, Squadron 1830 HMS Blackcap, and Squadron 1830 HMS Industrious. He was recommended for the Victoria Cross but the award was denied because it was not determined that he was alive and in control of the aircraft in the final moments of the attack destroying Japanese aircraft. George was born in Brovst, Denmark, in 1921. He enlisted in the Army in Saskatoon and was sent to Calgary for training. He got scarlet fever, which takes a long time to recover, and was sent to Shilo and got sick again, taking a longer time to recover. He took extra training in Winnipeg and Hamilton, before being sent to Nova Scotia and then to England, serving in Belgium and the Netherlands. When the war was over, he worked in the kitchen until he came back to Saskatchewan. After his discharge, he farmed for thirty years before retiring to British Columbia. He passed away in 2000.





#### **SVENDSEN, Harry**

WWII

Harry was born in Brovst, Denmark, in 1916. He joined the Army with the C.I.R.U. from March 5, 1942 to February 14, 1946, and served as an "Officer's Batman" in Canada and England tending to their equipment, shoes, medals, etc., and also doing their chauffeuring. Harry passed away in 1976. He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion Canwood Branch 132.



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


#### **WWI & BOER WAR**

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
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#### **TARVES, Howitt**

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
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#### THOMPSON, Lloyd Victor

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
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#### TORRIE, George

**WWI & WWII** 

George was born in Longlaketon, NWT, in 1894. He joined the 68<sup>th</sup> Battalion in Regina in December 1915, and went overseas in early 1916, and was transferred to the PPCLI in France. He was wounded at Passchendaele on October 26, 1917. He returned to action and was decorated with the Military Medal for action in the Battle of Canal du Nord in the fall of 1918.

George was discharged on March 20, 1919, and returned to farming. At the outbreak of hostilities in 1939, George enlisted and was taken on in the Veterans Guard and guarded POW camps at Espanola, ON, Seebee and Medicine Hat, AB. He was also posted to St. Georges, British Guyana guarding the loading of ships.


He was discharged in 1945, and passed away on March 28, 1981, at age 86.

#### **TUCKER, John Bertram**

WWI

John Bertram Tucker was born in Honiton, Devonshire, England on November 3, 1893. His father, John Tucker, was a law clerk. His mother was Martha May Tucker. The family, consisting of two boys and two girls, lived in Honiton, Devonshire, England.

Prior to his enlistment in Canada, John Bertram served with the 4<sup>th</sup> Devonshire Territorials for two years. He was working as a bank teller with the Union Bank of Canada in Bounty when he enlisted in Rosetown on August 8, 1914. He was sent to Valcartier, Quebec for basic training. He served with the First Division Artillery Brigade. In France, he served as both a driver and a gunner. He suffered shrapnel wounds to both legs, as well as his wrist and hand. He was awarded the Memorial Cross.



John was killed in action on June 13, 1916, at the age of 23, at Mount Sorrel. His death took place during fierce fighting in the Ypres Salient between June 2

and June 13 when, after setbacks, the Canadian Army drove the Germans back and recaptured lost ground. The battle lasted two weeks and resulted in over 8,000 Canadian casualties. John Bertram Tucker was laid to rest in Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery in Belgium where 1,057 other Canadians are buried alongside 9,727 English, Australian, New Zealand, South African and Indian soldiers. His gravestone has this inscription: "Remember him with Honour and Thanksgiving."

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
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TURNER, C. Gordon

Gordon was born in Moosomin, Saskatchewan, in 1907. He joined the RCOC No. 2 Platoon-1 Coy, serving in Canada. Gordon passed away in 1999.

#### **TURTLE, Leonard Edger**

wwii

Leonard was born in Melfort in 1919, educated in Fartown school and Marshall and was farming when he enlisted in Saskatoon in 1940. Flight Lieutenant (No. 124 Communications Squadron RCAF pilot) Leonard Edgar Turtle, of Marshall died on September 15, 1946 and is buried at Woodlawn Cemetery, Saskatoon. He died in the horrific crash in Estevan while ferrying lend-lease planes back to the United States. He spent the war as a flight instructor at various bases across Canada of flying No. 10 Bomber Reconnaissance Squadron on the east coast. He was the son of Alfred Ernest and Kathleen Isobel (Isaac) Turtle who homesteaded NE30-50-25-W3 south of Hillmond and later moved to the Cavalier area northwest of Meota. He married Zola Maxine (Jones) in Ruddell in 1942, she and their daughter Eloise Lenore Maxine later lived in Saskatoon.



#### TYACKE, John Wesley

WWII

Jack was born in 1914, in Broadland, Beadle Co., South Dakota and educated in Lucan, Mossdale, and Silver Park Schools. The extended Tyacke family moved to McElhanney north of Weeks during the late 1930s. Jack and his wife Ethel Mae (Enders) and sons Eugene Wesley and Merlyn John were farming in Chagoness when he enlisted in Saskatoon in 1940. Private (Saskatoon Light Infantry) John Wesley Tyacke, of Chagoness east of Pleasantdale, was killed in action on December 8, 1943, by enemy artillery fire and is buried at Moro River Canadian War Cemetery in Ortona, Chieti, Italy. He was the son of Thomas Gilbert and Lillian Mae (Lanphear) Tyacke who came from Wilbur Co., Nebraska to homestead SW5-43-17-W2 east of Silver Park in 1918. Interestingly, both of Jack's sons served in the Canadian Armed Forces in Saskatoon in the 1960s. His sister Mildred also served in the Army during the war.

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
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#### TYRIE, Charles

Charles was born in Dumbarton, Scotland, on September 4, 1909. He enlisted in the Army with the Regina Rifles in 1940, and served in Canada, England, Normandy and Holland. Carl was born in Hagen, Saskatchewan, in 1921. He joined the Army and served during World War II. He passed away in 2004.



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




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VANG, Jorgen WWII

#### **VENNE, Harry**

Harry was born in Muskeg Lake Cree Nation, Saskatchewan, on April 25, 1916. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Artillery on June 1, 1940, and served in Canada, Britain and Northwest Europe. He was discharged on November 29, 1945, and received the 1939-1945 Star, Defence Medal, France and Germany Star, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp and War Medal 1939-1945. Harry passed away on August 14, 1988.

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
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
#### VOSHELL, Earl Joseph

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


WALL, John WWII

Master Corporal Jeffrey Walsh was killed in an incident that occurred on a major highway twenty kilometres west of Kandahar, Afghanistan, the southern Afghan province capital where the Canadian Forces were based. MCpl Walsh had been in Afghanistan for only six days, and he was on a familiarization operation when he was shot. He was based in Shilo, Manitoba just before he was shipped out for Afghanistan and was a member of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, a regiment that has lost several other soldiers in the Afghan counterinsurgency. MCpl Walsh was called a "solid, well-respected soldier and leader" who had a promising career in the army. He received a Mention in Dispatches citation awarded on June 26, 2008, Sacrifice Medal (posthumous) and Canadian Peacekeeping Service Medal. He was the son of Benjamin Morris and Margie Walsh of Regina, Saskatchewan.



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
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


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#### **WANAMAKER**, William James

He was wounded in 1917 in which he lost his hearing permanently. He was a faithful member of The Royal Canadian Legion Tompkins Branch from the time it formed. He attended Legion Conventions as a Delegate all of his life. Alfred passed away in 1976.

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#### WATLAND, Sigvert



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




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#### **WEEDON, James Frederick**

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
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#### WELTER, Kenneth Leslie

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


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




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#### WILDEY, George Thomas "Ole"



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
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


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#### **WILKINS, Theodore Charles**

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
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#### WILLIAMS, Patrick Joseph






#### WILSON, Douglas

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
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
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#### WILSON, George Watson


WWII

George was born in 1914 in Pleasantdale, educated in Gravelsbourg and Neidpath and was working as a mechanic for Massey Harris when he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force in Saskatoon in late 1939. Sergeant (No. 419 Moose Squadron RCAF aero engine mechanic) George Watson Wilson of Saskatoon died on September 15, 1942, and is buried at St. Nicholas churchyard extension, Cottesmore, Rutland, England. Wilson's Wellington was on a two-hour oil consumption test when it crashed suddenly in Thursby east of Stamford, Lincolnshire. He was the son of William George Watson and Bertha (Eastwood) Wilson and left a wife, Helen Gertrude (Malcolm) and children Deirarie Mabel and Allan Watson in Saskatoon.

#### **WISBEY, Frank Samuel**

Frank Samuel Wisbey was born on December 26, 1892, in London, England. His parents were Edward and Sarah Wisbey. There were six brothers (including Frank) and three sisters in the family. Frank was farming near Bounty, Saskatchewan when he enlisted in Moose Jaw on February 19, 1916, at the age of 23. He had immigrated to Canada and homesteaded at Bounty. Before arriving in Canada, he had served with the third Battalion of the Royal Berkshire Regiment. He served Canada's Canadian Expeditionary Force with the 46th Battalion Saskatchewan Regiment, of the Canadian Infantry. His service on the battlefields of northern France resulted in a gunshot wound to his left arm on August 27, 1917. Frank Samuel Wisbey was killed in action on September 28, 1918. He was part of the last hundred days offensive in World War I. Approximately 45,000 Canadian Troops assaulted a formidable 2,300 metre gap at the Canal du Nord. On September 28, Canadian Troops crossed the Canal du Nord and advanced as much as two kilometres in a day of heavy fighting during which Private Wisbey was killed. He is buried at Haynecourt British Cemetery near Cambrai, France. Twenty-one of his comrades from the 46th South Saskatchewan Battalion are buried in the same cemetery. His mother Sarah received the Memorial Cross in his honour on June 25, 1920.





#### WISSER, Wilfred Henry

WWII

Wilfred was born in Marysburg, Saskatchewan, on December 26, 1922. He enlisted in the Army and served with the Cameron Highlanders of Ottawa during World War II. He served in the Netherlands and was a translator during the Nuremburg trials. Wilfred passed away on November 5, 2004.

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


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












#### WOLOWIDNYK, George

Lieutenant (South Saskatchewan Regiment) Robert Andrew Woolard, of Star City, was killed in action on August 19, 1942, in Dieppe and is commemorated on the Brookwood Memorial near London, England, for those who died during raids on the continent, etc. and who have no known grave. He was the son of Charles Robert and Helen Woolard, Charles practiced law in Star City and later moved to Melfort.





#### **WOTHERSPOON, Albert Edward**

WWII

Albert was born in Langenburg, Saskatchewan, on January 1, 1925. He joined the #103 Squadron Royal Air Force - Air Gunner as a pilot officer. Albert was on a final mission in a Lancaster Bomber over Germany when his plane was shot down on March 17, 1945. He was on a night raid on Nuremberg. He is buried at Durbach War Cemetery near Bad Tolz Germany. The province of Saskatchewan named a lake in northern Saskatchewan after him: Wotherspoon Lake.

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#### **WOTHERSPOON, John Wilfred**

WWII

John was born in Melville, Saskatchewan, in 1921. In June 1941, he joined the Royal Canadian Air Force as a leading aircraftsman with #111 Communications Flight, and served in Canada, the United Kingdom, and Continental Europe. He was discharged in 1945. John rejoined the RCAF after his discharge for a further tour of duty in 1948. He rejoined again in 1954, and was part of the Search and Rescue Branch and served there until his untimely death in a helicopter accident over Lake Winnipeg on November 30, 1958, while doing a mercy rescue mission. His body was recovered in the spring. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp, France and Germany Star, and War Medal 1939-1945.

#### WRIGHT, Frank

WWI

Frank was born in Wooler, Ontario, on May 15, 1889. He moved with his parents in 1891 to Keys, Manitoba. In 1907, he came to the Armley District to homestead and returned to farm his father's land in Manitoba until 1917. Frank then joined the Army and served overseas with the Canadian Battalion until the end of the war. 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
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
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#### **WRIGLEY, Alfred**

WWII



Ralph was born in Alpena, Michigan, USA, in 1895. He joined the Regina Regiment and served in Canada. He passed away in 1972.



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
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#### YONGE, Douglas Landrigan

WWII



And we are

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

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
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
